MINUTES, OCONEE COUNTY COUNCIL MEETING

The Oconee County Council met Tuesday, August 15, 2000 at 3:00 PM in Council Chambers, 415 South Pine Street, Walhalla, SC with all Council Members and the County Attorney present.

Press:

Members of the press notified (by mail): Keowee Courier, Westminster News, Anderson Independent, WGOG Radio, & WPEK Radio, Journal/Tribune.

Members of the press present: Dick Mangrum – WGOG Radio, Dave Williams – Anderson Independent & Catherine Hunter –Journal/Tribune.

Call to Order:

The meeting was called to order by Supervisor-Chairman Orr who welcomed all those present.

Invocation:

The invocation was given by Mr. Hamilton.

Minutes:

Mrs. Hughes made a motion, seconded by Mr. Hamilton, approved 5 – 0 that the minutes of the August 1, 2000 meeting be adopted as printed.

Public Hearing (Ordinance 2000-10)

The first item on the agenda was a public hearing to receive written and/or oral comments regarding Ordinance 2000-10, "AN ORDINANCE SETTING FORTH ROCK PRICES AT THE OCONEE COUNTY ROCK CRUSHER".

There was no one present with either written and/or oral comments regarding this ordinance.

Open Session:

Dr. Edward Booker addressed Council expressing an interest in obtaining the old 911 office site for a medical clinic for his son and wife who will be graduating medical school in the near future and would like to locate in Oconee County. Mr. Orr referred this request to the Purchasing, Contracting, Real Estate, Building & Grounds Committee.

Mr. B. J. Littleton expressed concerns regarding the old 911 site being needed for parking for the new judicial facility; he also expressed concerns about the cost per bed of the proposed Lila Doyle expansion. Mr. Littleton expressed a desire for the Council to become as involved with issues affecting the mountainous areas and streams as they were with the Waterfest. He further expressed feelings that Council should adopt the subdivision regulations and he expressed concerns regarding the regulations for mobile homes.

Adult Entertainment:

Mr. Brian Seal addressed Council regarding regulations for adult entertainment establishments in Oconee County. Mr. Seals discussed the differences in Oconee County and Anderson County's ordinance regulating adult entertainment industries and urged that Oconee's be made stricter. Mr. Timms made a motion, seconded by Mr. Hall, approved 5 – 0 that this matter be referred to the Planning Commission. (See attachment)

KOBA Proclamation:

Upon request of Mr. Bob Buse, KOBA, Mr. Hall made a motion, seconded by Mr. Timms, approved 5 – 0 that the attached proclamation declaring August 25 & 26, 2000 as "ZERO TOLERANCE FOR LITTER DAYS" be adopted by Council.

"Old Tobacco Barn":

Mr. L. G. Moss & Ms. Betsey Comiskey addressed Council regarding Oconee Heritage Center, Inc. using the "Old Tobacco Barn" as a museum. Mr. Orr referred this matter to the Purchasing, Contracting, Real Estate, Building & Grounds Committee for a recommendation. Mr. Hall made a motion, seconded by Mr. Hamilton, approved 4 – 0 (Mr. Thomas abstaining) that the committee discuss the matter with the intent of allowing the Heritage Center to use the building with an agreement being worked out between the County Attorney and the Heritage Center Attorney.

SHARE Program:

Mrs. Lindsay Miller, Sunbelt Human Advancement Resources, Inc. addressed Council regarding the different programs of SHARE. Mrs. Miller informed Council the main goal of SHARE is to help a household move toward self-sufficiency. Mrs. Miller further informed Council some of the programs of SHARE are Homeless Services, Headstart, Medical & Nutritional Needs, Disability Programs in Headstart, Training Programs to Promote Self-Sufficiency and Help with Purchasing a Home. (See attached)

Mr. Timms committed Council Members to giving a total donation of \$100 (not county funds) to the SHARE Program.

Millage for FY 2000-01:

Upon recommendation of Mr. Kenneth F. Williams, County Auditor, Mr. Timms made a motion, seconded by Mr. Hall, approved 5 – 0 that the operating millage for fiscal year 2000-01 be set at 182.5 mills.

Mr. Williams also informed Council that as a result of some of the bonds being retired, he was able to decrease the millage by some eleven mills this year. However, if the county does issue bonds for the courthouse project and the Lila Doyle project he will have to increase bond millage to take care of the amount of bonds to be issued.

Courthouse:

Mr. Hall made a motion, seconded by Mrs. Hughes, approved 5 – 0 that the county commit to issuing bonds in the amount of \$8,000,000 for the new courthouse.

Lila Doyle:

Mr. Hamilton, Chair, Budget & Finance Committee informed Council it was the recommendation of the committee that the county issue bonds in the amount of \$4,115,000 with the stipulation that if the administration of Lila Doyle is changed before the bonds are retired, the change will have to be approved by Council. This recommendation was defeated 2 - 1 (Mrs. Hughes voting for, Mr. Timms & Mr. Hamilton voting against)

Mr. Hamilton stated he voted against the recommendation in order to make another motion that the annexation of the hospital property into the city limits of Seneca be included in the approval of the bond issue.

Lila Doyle Continued:

Mr. Hall & Mr. Thomas did not participate in this action, as they are both Hospital Board Members.

After considerable discussion, it was the consensus of Council to try to schedule a meeting with the Hospital Board to discuss the issue of annexing the hospital property into the city limits of Seneca.

Veterans Affairs:

Upon request of Mr. Jerry Dyar, Veterans Affairs Officer, Mr. Hamilton made a motion, seconded by Mr. Thomas, approved 5 – 0 that the Veterans Affairs Office and the Clerk of Court's Office be permitted to enter into an agreement for the Veterans Affairs to receive, record and maintain recorded military discharges pursuant to Section 30-15-60, SC Code of Laws, 1976.

Tax Refund Request:

Mr. Gerald Mattison addressed Council regarding a refund he felt was due on taxes he had paid since 1983 as he had used a Greenville business address and had not received the residential ratio. This matter was referred to the County Attorney.

Economic Development Board Member:

Mr. Timms made a motion, seconded by Mr. Hall, approved 5 – 0 that Mr. Alfred C. Hunt's resignation from the Economic Development Commission be accepted and Mr. J. Richard Glymph be appointed to fill that unexpired term representing District V.

Emergency Preparedness:

Upon request of Mr. Henry Gordon, Emergency Preparedness Director, Mr. Timms made a motion, seconded by Mr. Thomas, approved 5 – 0 that the attached *Local Hazard Mitigation Grant Program (LHMGP) Application* be adopted.

Voter Registration/Elections (Contingency):

Upon recommendation of Mr. Carl Hayden, IT Director & Mr. Robert Brock, Voter Registration/Elections Chairman, Mr. Thomas made a motion, seconded by Mr. Hall, approved 5 – 0 that \$3,000 be taken from contingency for the purpose of continuing the funding of on-line state services for the Voter Registration Office. (See attachment)

Networking of Law Enforcement Center & Courthouse:

Upon recommendation of Mr. Carl Hayden, IT Director & Ms. Marianne Dillard, Procurement Director, Mr. Timms made a motion, seconded by Mr. Hamilton, approved 5 – 0 that the bid process be waived as per Section B: *Formal Bid Process*, Subsection 4: *When in the Purchasing Agent's judgement, and with concurrence of County Council, it is to the advantage of the County's interest to do* and the county proceed with networking the Law Enforcement Center, Magistrate's Office and Courthouse using Bellsouth as the data service provider and QS1 as the hardware provider and system integration. (See attachment)

GIS Phase II:

Upon request of Mr. Jon Caime, County Engineer and Mr. Hayden, Mr. Thomas made a motion, seconded by Mr. Hall, approved 4 – 0 (Mrs. Hughes out of room temporarily) that the county proceed with seeking an agreement between Oconee County and the City of Seneca for the funding of GIS Phase II.

Change Order for Road Department:

Upon recommendation of Mr. Caime & Mr. Hoyt Orr, Road Foreman, Mr. Hall made a motion, seconded by Mr. Thomas, approved 5 – 0 that the attached change order to Hubbard's contract in the amount of \$18,544.70 be adopted with funding coming from the 2000-01 fiscal year.

Extension of Waterfall Road:

Mr. Caime presented the attached proposal from Crescent Resources, Inc. for the county to fund paving two extensions to the Waterfall Road and Crescent Resources refunding the county for this paving. After discussion this matter was referred to the Roads & Transportation Committee. (See attached request)

Uniforms for LEC:

Upon recommendation of Captain Terry Wilson & Ms. Dillard, Mr. Timms made a motion, seconded by Mr. Thomas, approved 5 – 0 that the bid for uniforms for the Law Enforcement Center be awarded to Whole Armor Uniforms, Inc. at a cost of \$17,573.85 for an approximate number of uniforms with an option to renew for an additional four years. (See attached bid sheet)

Uniforms for LEC (Contingency):

Captain Wilson informed Council that uniforms for the Law Enforcement Center had been order from Frank's Uniforms last fiscal year but were not delivered, therefore the funds went back to general funds. Upon request of Captain Wilson, Mr. Hall made a motion, seconded by Mrs. Hughes approved 5 – 0 that \$3,000 be taken from contingency for the purchase of these uniforms. (See attached letter)

Surplus Equipment Listing:

Ms. Dillard presented Council with a listing of surplus equipment to be auctioned September 2000. She informed Council that although items could be deleted from the listing, none could be added at this time.

Boy Scout Troop:

Council recognized Scout Troop 120 from Keowee who came to observe the Council Meeting.

Ordinance 2000-15:

Mr. Hall made a motion, seconded by Mrs. Hughes, approved 5 – 0 that Ordinance 2000-15, "AN ORDINANCE TO PROVIDE FOR THE TRANSFER OF FUNDS NOT TO EXCEED \$1,000,000 FROM THE FUND BALANCE ACCOUNT OF OCONEE COUNTY, SOUTH CAROLINA FOR THE DESIGN OF COURTHOUSE, SITE PREPARATION & OTHER MATTERS RELATING THERETO" be adopted on second reading.

Resolution 2000-15:

Mr. Thomas made a motion, seconded by Mr. Hamilton, approved 5 – 0 that Resolution 2000-15, "A RESOLUTION TO EXPRESS THE INTENTION OF THE COUNTY COUNCIL OF OCONEE COUNTY TO REIMBURSE OCONEE COUNTY FOR CERTAIN COSTS FOR THE CONSTRUCTION OF A COURTHOUSE INCLUDING THE ACQUISITION OF LAND AND NECESSARY EQUIPMENT AND FURNISHINGS THEREFOR, RELATING TO THE ISSUANCE OF GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS" be adopted on first and final reading.

**Law Enforcement, Safety, Health, Welfare & Services Committee
Recommendations:**

Mr. Hall, Chair, LEC Committee, informed Council the primary concerns of the Home Builders Association regarding the proposed Land Development Ordinance centered on the vagueness of definitions and confusion surrounding requirements of the county. There was no action taken by the committee regarding this matter

Mr. Hall, further informed Council that it was the recommendation of the Law Enforcement, Safety, Health, Welfare & Services Committee that the Emergency Preparedness Director coordinate with the Seneca Chamber on the storage and handling of the fuel tank to be used by the boat racers during Waterfest 2000 and also that the County Attorney discuss legal concerns with Mr. Mac Flemming. Both these recommendations were unanimously adopted.

Further, Mr. Hall informed Council the County Risk Manager would be looking into the county's liability insurance for the boat races, the Seneca Chamber and ODBA will present the county with liability coverage certificates naming the county as a covered party by the end of August in the amount of \$3,000,000 from the Seneca Chamber and \$5,000,000 from the ODBA.

Written Plan for Waterfest:

Mr. Hall made a motion, seconded by Mr. Hamilton, approved 5 – 0 that although it was not discussed in the LEC meeting, a copy of the Seneca Chamber's written plan for the event to be delivered to the county risk manager and County Council.

Policy Regarding Usage of Parks:

Mr. Hall made a motion, seconded by Mr. Timms, approved 5 – 0 that the County adopt a policy whereby any non-traditional usage of the county parks will have to be approved by Council prior to any plans regarding same being made.

**Personnel & Intergovernmental/Budget & Finance Recommendation
(Contingency):**

Mr. Hamilton informed Council it was the joint recommendation of the Personnel & Intergovernmental Committee and the Budget & Finance Committee that \$26,950 be taken from contingency for a secretary to be hired in the Communications Department beginning in September through the remainder of this fiscal year.

Zoning Board of Appeals:

Mr. Hamilton made a motion, seconded by Mr. Hall, approved 5 – 0 that Mr. Donald Havice be appointed to represent District III on the Zoning Board of Appeals.

Budget & Finance Committee Recommendation (Contingency):

Mr. Hamilton, Chair, Budget & Finance Committee, informed Council it was the recommendation of the committee that \$39,000 duplicated in the budget in line item 10 009 00150 00860 be transferred in the contingency line item.

House at Airport:

To Mr. Thomas' inquiry, Mr. Norton informed Council the lease agreement for the Civil Air Patrol to use the house located on airport property is completed.

Zoning Board of Appeals Meeting:

Mr. Thomas informed Council that the next public hearing to be conducted by the Zoning Board of Appeals is scheduled for August 24, 2000 and it is very important that all members be there, as the last hearing had to be cancelled due to a lack of a quorum present.

DAVCO Lease:

Mr. Thomas made a motion, seconded by Mr. Hamilton, approved 5 – 0 that the DAVCO Building lease agreement prepared by the County Attorney be adopted.

Liability Insurance:

Mr. Thomas made a motion, seconded by Mrs. Hughes, approved 5 – 0 that Mr. Orr assign the assessment of the overall liability insurance needs of the county to the proper committee for a recommendation.

Special Event Coverage:

Mr. Timms made a motion, seconded by Mr. Hall, approved 5 – 0 that the Procurement Director pursue special event insurance coverage for Waterfest 2000.

Minutes:

Mrs. Hughes requested that her motion to adopt the minutes of the August 1, 2000 meeting be rescinded, as she was not in attendance of that meeting.

Minutes Continued:

Mr. Thomas made a motion, seconded by Mr. Hall, approved 3 – 0 (Mrs. Hughes & Mr. Timms abstaining due to their not being at the meeting) that the minutes of the August 1, 2000 meeting be adopted as printed.

Library Board Resignation & Appointment:

Mrs. Hughes made a motion, seconded by Mr. Thomas, approved 5 – 0 that Mrs. Julia Ballenger's resignation from the Library Board be accepted and Mr. Ray Morrison be appointed to fill that unexpired term representing District IV.

Purchasing, Contracting, Real Estate, Building & Grounds Committee Recommendation (Contingency):

Mr. Thomas, Chair of the Purchasing, Contracting, Real Estate, Building & Grounds Committee informed Council it was the recommendation of the committee that \$5,000 be taken from contingency for repair of the Lunney Museum roof. This recommendation was adopted unanimously.

Personnel & Intergovernmental Recommendation:

Mr. Timms, Chair, Personnel & Intergovernmental Committee, informed Council it was the recommendation of the committee that an individual or company to perform aircraft maintenance at the airport be selected through the bid process rather than hiring personnel. This recommendation was adopted unanimously.

Personnel & Intergovernmental Committee Report:

Mr. Timms, Personnel & Intergovernmental Committee, informed Council the job description of the Registration & Elections Director erroneously had this individual reporting to the County Supervisor rather than the Election Commission and this will be corrected.

Roads & Transportation Committee Meeting:

The Roads & Transportation Committee scheduled a meeting Tuesday, August 22, 2000 at 6:00 PM in Council Chambers for the purpose of discussing requests regarding Duncan-Ward Roadway, Dusty Lane, extensions to Waterfall Roadway and the request of Fort Hill Natural Gas Authority for an ordinance for utility right-of-way. (See attached requests)

Purchasing, Contracting, Real Estate, Building & Grounds Committee Meeting:

The Purchasing Contracting, Real Estate, Building & Grounds Committee scheduled a meeting Tuesday, August 22, 2000 for the purpose of discussing several building and grounds issues.

Emergency Medical Services:

Mr. Hall made a motion, seconded by Mr. Hamilton, approved 5 – 0 that the Emergency Preparedness Director and Commission explore the feasibility of establishing additional ambulance and paramedic services in the county.

Old Motor Pool:

Mr. Timms made a motion, seconded by Mr. Thomas, approved 3 – 2 (Mrs. Hughes & Mr. Hall voting against) that the county initiate actions to tear down the old motor pool building.

BellSouth Request:

Mr. Hall made a motion, seconded by Mr. Thomas, approved 5 – 0 that the request of BellSouth for a proposed easement on county property near the intersection of Airport Road & Shiloh Road be referred to the Roads & Transportation Committee. (See attached request)

Probation, Parole & Pardon Services Request:

Mr. Orr requested that the attached request of the SC Department of Probation, Parole & Pardon services for additional space be addressed at the next Purchasing, Contracting, Real Estate, Building & Grounds Committee Meeting.

Old Motor Pool Doors:

Mr. Hall made a motion, seconded by Mrs. Hughes, approved 5 – 0 that the sliding doors at the old motor pool be donated to the Long Creek Fire Department.

Brandt Property:

Mr. Orr requested that the Purchasing, Contracting, Real Estate, Building & Grounds Committee discuss the acquisition of the Brandt property adjacent to the courthouse at their next meeting.

Mr. Hall made a motion, seconded by Mr. Thomas, approved 5 – 0 that the county proceed with obtaining an appraisal on the Brandt property.



Comparison of Anderson County and Oconee County Ordinances Regulating Sexually Oriented Businesses

The following outline compares the Ordinance of Anderson County, SC 98-015 to the Ordinance of Oconee County, SC 99-14. Section references in parenthesis are to the preceding Oconee County Ordinance 98-5.

1	Permit requirements	Section 2.6 (220) See comments to left.
2	Issuance of permit	Section 2.7 (230) See comments to left.
3	Annual permit fee	Section ? \$1000.00
4	Inspection	Section 2.9 (240-04) Same except employees need only an ID.
5	Expiration of permit	Section 2.10 (240.05) Similar.
6	Suspension of permit	Section 2.11 (240.06) suspends permits for similar reasons.
7	Revocation / Reissuance of permit	Section 2.13 -2.14 (240.07) revokes in the cases listed in bold but/and adds: In the case of obscenities as specified in SC code 16-15-305. Two revocations in 36 months = no permit for 5 years.
8	Judicial review of permit denial, suspension, or revocation.	Section 2.15 (250) provides for recourse via the Oconee County Board of Appeals.
9	Transfer of permit	Section 2.16 (260) Same - different wording.
10	Location of sexually oriented business	Section 2.18 (340) Applies only within unincorporated county areas. Not within 1000 feet of those in bold to the left.

11 Sexually oriented business employee license	Section 42-419 calls for a \$25 annually renewed license. The licensee must apply in writing providing much detailed information including a conviction background.

Section 42-420 requires a license and continuously manned "manager stations" from which all areas where patrons are allowed are directly visible. One person to a viewing area... no holes between them. Lighting everywhere to be > 2.0 foot candle intensity everywhere in the premises.	
13 Prohibitions regarding minors and sexually oriented businesses.	Section 42-421 declares misdemeanors for 4 different offenses.

Financial Information

SHARE maintains the highest standards of accountability in handling cash accounts, volunteer services and other in-kind contributions. We prepare financial statements in compliance with generally-accepted accounting principles. These are submitted to independent auditors on an annual basis.

SHARE's funding is provided predominantly by federal allocations, some of which are granted through state or local programs such as Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP), Community Development Block Grant, Community Services Block Grant or Vocational Education funds.

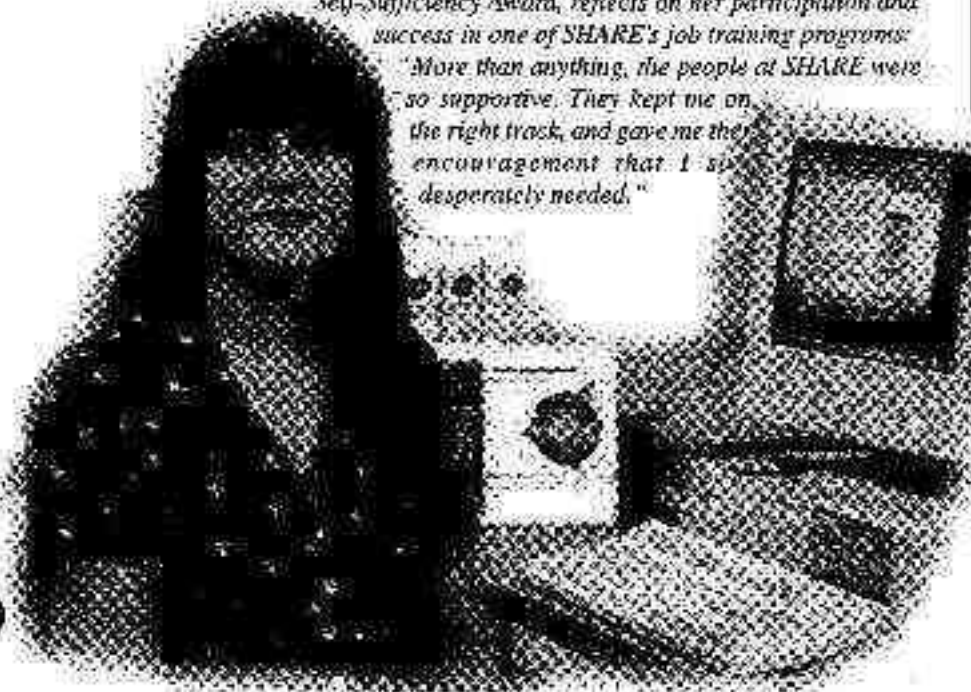
Because SHARE receives federal funds, the agency is required to use matching funds from non-federal sources as a percentage of its annual operating budget. Tax-deductible contributions from individuals, businesses, civic organizations as well as grants or allocations from city, county or state government are vital to the operation of programs at SHARE. Volunteers and in-kind contributions also make a tremendous impact on the success of SHARE and its programs.

Since the administrative cost for all of SHARE's programs is just 6%, the agency is able to use 94% of its funds to directly benefit our clients.

The total expenditure of funds was returned to the local economy in terms of goods purchased, jobs generated, and taxes paid. Funds benefit the area economy in addition to directly benefiting the target populations. Since such funding is considered to turn over at least three times in the community, SHARE was responsible for generating more than \$37 million in 1999.

Debbie Alexander, recipient of SHARE's 1999 Lottie B. Gibson Self-Sufficiency Award, reflects on her participation and success in one of SHARE's job training programs:

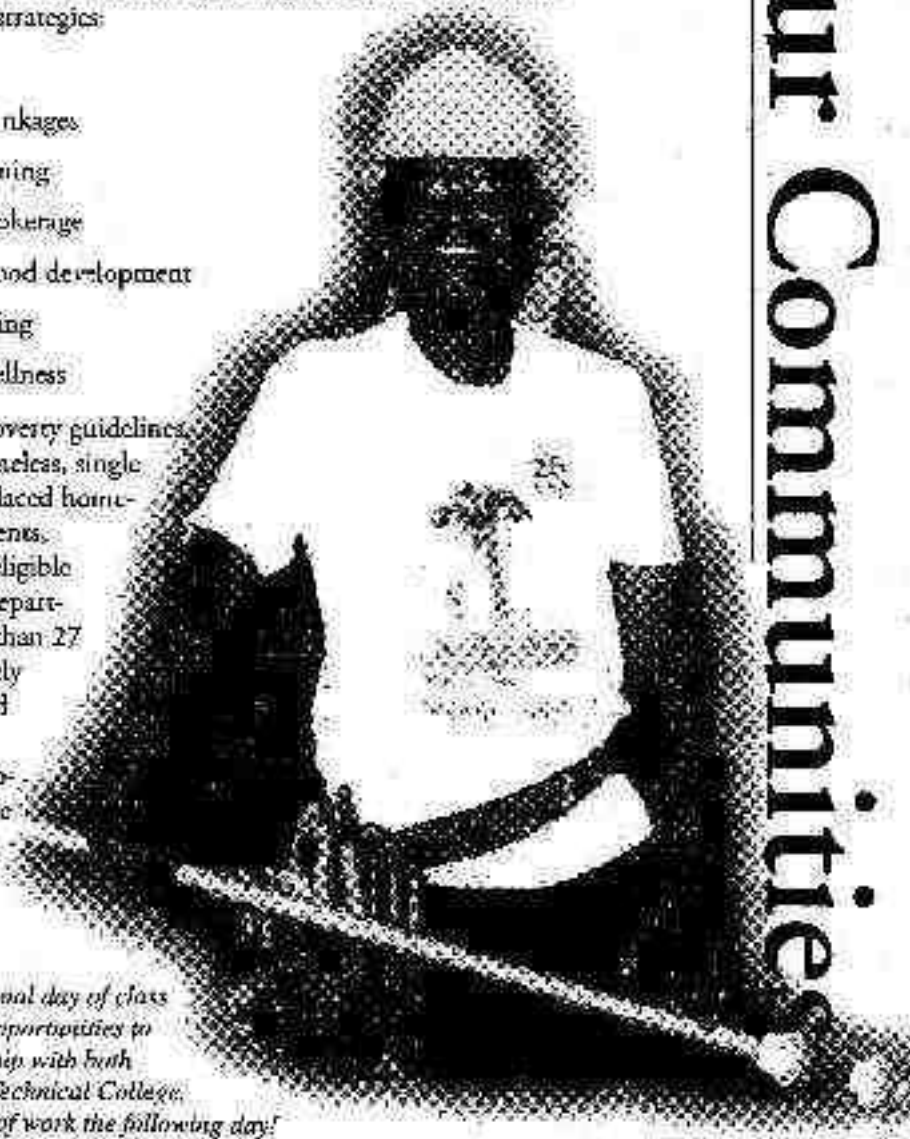

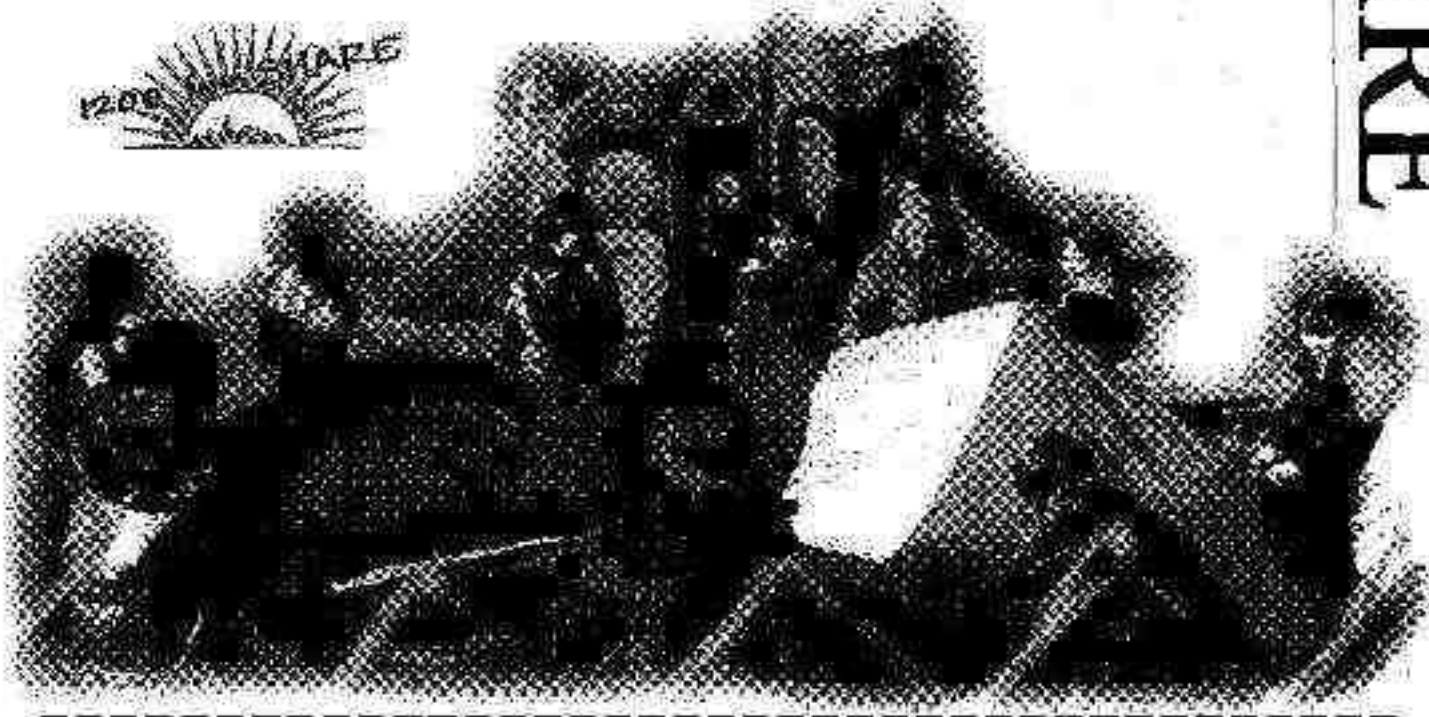

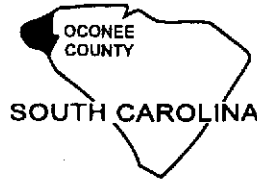

AN ACT TO AMEND SECTION 30-15-60, CODE OF LAWS OF SOUTH CAROLINA, 1976, RELATING TO THE RECORDATION OF VETERANS' DISCHARGE AND OBTAINING CERTIFIED COPY OF REGISTERED DISCHARGE, SO AS TO CHANGE THE PROVISIONS REGARDING FEES, PERMIT THE REGISTER OF MESNE CONVEYANCES TO DESIGNATE THE COUNTY VETERANS' AFFAIRS OFFICER TO RECEIVE APPLICATIONS FOR CERTIFIED COPIES AND FURNISH THE COPIES AS PROVIDED BY THIS SECTION, AUTHORIZE THE CLERK OF COURT AND THE COUNTY VETERANS' AFFAIRS OFFICER TO ENTER INTO AN AGREEMENT PURSUANT TO WHICH CERTAIN RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE CLERK OF COURT MAY BE DEVOLVED TO THE COUNTY VETERANS' AFFAIRS OFFICER, AND PROVIDE THAT, UPON TRANSFER OF THE RECORDS, THE COUNTY VETERANS' AFFAIRS OFFICER MAY ISSUE COPIES AS REQUESTED.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of South Carolina:

Fees; clerk of court and register of mesne conveyances, duties

SECTION 1. Section 30-15-60 of the 1976 Code is amended to read:

"Section 30-15-60. Any person desiring a certified copy of any discharge or certificate of lost discharge, registered under the provisions of this chapter, shall apply for it to the clerk of court of the county in which the discharge or certificate of lost discharge is registered and the clerk of court shall furnish a certified copy. Fees for furnishing a certified copy of discharge or DD 214 form may be established by each county but may not exceed fifty cents.

The clerk of court or the register of mesne conveyances may designate the county veterans' affairs officer to receive these applications and furnish these copies as provided by this section. Subject to the approval of the county governing body, the clerk of court and the county veterans' affairs officer may enter into a written agreement pursuant to which the responsibilities of the clerk of court under this chapter to receive, record, and maintain recorded discharges may be devolved to the county veterans' affairs officer. Upon transfer of the records, the county veterans' affairs officer may issue copies as requested."

Re: Funding of Registration and Elections data lines

Council Members,

I would like to add my input to the Registrations and Elections request for continued funding of their communications line to the state board of elections.

- In December of 1999 the state sent technicians to Oconee to review what network capabilities were available to registrations/elections. At that time there were none.
- When I started in January of 2000, I set out to lay the groundwork for Oconee's data infrastructure.
- I contacted the state OIR (Office of Information Resources) and was told that by July 2000 the state registrations would be handled via TCP/IP connection over the Internet. I made certain that Tammi's office met the minimal requirements.
- I was given copies of two letters from the state OIR regarding the migration of election and registrations to standard Internet connections and dropping the proprietary leased lines.
- Before the final budget reading as well as after, I had several more phone conversations with the persons involved in the state migration and was assured they would be ready for the transition.

On the basis of the OIR letters and conversations it was decided to drop the request for funding of the state lines from the 2000/2001 budget.

- In June of this year two of the key people heading the state project left. This has delayed the statewide implementation; but is still being worked on. There is no firm ETA of completion though.
- I have investigated "piggy backing" Tammi onto the Auditor's state lines used for DMV (Dept of Motor Vehicle) registrations. For technical reasons (serial lines, not route-able through our network) and costs (minimum of 4 cables run from the auditor's room to voter/reg, expansion card for the auditor's multiplexer); I am convinced this is not the wisest course of action.

It would be cheaper, and much easier; to continue funding the state leased lines for the foreseeable future. This is my considered recommendation.

Council Members,

We are at a point of integrating the county offices. This is what the majority of the Information Technology funding was requested for in the 2000/01 budgets.

I have been laying out the network plans and am at a point of proceeding with the final phase.

What I would ask Council's approval of is proceeding with Bellsouth as the data service provider (Frame relay, domain reservation, internet service); and QS1 as the hardware provider and system integration.

This makes sense first of all as Bellsouth owns the circuits and lines in this region and they continue to be our telephone provider. Other companies would be middlemen, essentially leasing Bellsouth service and selling it to the county. If there were problems, I would rather be dealing directly with the source. Also, newer emerging companies tend to come and go; being bought, sold, and traded like baseball cards. Take for instance the dial up Internet service our remote office started using less than 2 years ago. We started with *Carolina Online*, which sold out to *State.Net*, which fell on hard times and was taken over by *Trivergent*. At least "Ma Bell" and her local "Baby Bell", Bellsouth, have a family tree with roots.

Choosing QS1 as the hardware and system integrator also is of overriding concern. QS1 is a sister company with Smith Data which is currently Oconee's primary source for government computer applications. Part of the networking project is the merging and sharing of Smith Data information across buildings and departments. Minimizing disruption of county services is paramount. Other service integrators could match the hardware and software configurations; but do not have the expertise to manipulate the Smith Data software as QS1 does.

As part of this project, the Law Enforcement Center will also be having work done in conjunction with the magistrates. I cut the IT department's request to fund this portion when it was found that we had a state block grant to be used by the sheriff. Steve Pruitt and I have been working together with the upgrading of the LEC and Magistrates network and tying it into the rest of the county at the same time I bring the rest of the offices on-line.

The hardware upgrades, networking, and linking of the magistrates under the LEC are therefore also included in the request that we proceed jointly with Bellsouth and QS1.

The costs are consistent with the approved IT 2000/2001 budget and approximations are broken down below.

- \$24K one time IT hardware and installation costs for equipment and connection between courthouse, LEC, and Pine street.
- \$30K one time LEC hardware and installation costs for upgrading PC's, networking, wiring, data merging for LEC and magistrates (using block grant money).
- \$1500 monthly recurring costs for Bellsouth data services (frame relay and Internet).

This is a tradeoff. We will immediately be dropping dialup over a dozen dialup Internet accounts, some of which were averaging \$100 monthly. This will also allow us to immediately drop the Innovanet ISDN line in Pine Street. Additionally, when the state OIR completes their transitions we will be set to discontinue the antiquated leased lines to Voter registration and DMV; both of which are over \$200 each. Purely from a cost standpoint, a good percentage of our long distance telephone calls and postage to other state and county agencies will migrate toward electronic mail, which is unlimited in my proposal.





WHEREAS, Oconee County heretofore adopted Oconee County Ordinance 2000-07, known as the Oconee County Budget Ordinance for fiscal year 2000-01; and

WHEREAS, Section 4-9-140 of the Code of Laws of South Carolina (1976), as amended, provides that a County Council may make supplemental appropriations which provide that funds appropriated in the annual budget may be transferred for purposes other than as specified in such annual budget when such transfers are approved by the County Council; and

WHEREAS, the Oconee County Council has identified a need for a new free standing judicial facility at a cost not to exceed \$8,069,066; and

WHEREAS, the County Council has determined that the construction of such facility would benefit the general public welfare of the County and other purposes; and

WHEREAS, Section 4-9-30 of the Code of Laws of South Carolina (1976), as amended, provides that a County Government has the power and authority to construct improvements and facilities as needed for county purposes.

NOW THEREFORE, be it ordained by the Oconee County Council in session duly assembled with a quorum present and voting, as follows:

SECTION I: It is hereby ordered that an amount not exceeding the sum of \$1,000,000 shall be transferred from the fund balance account of Oconee County to such operational accounts as may be directed by the Supervisor of Oconee County to be used for the purpose of preliminary expenditures such as architectural, engineering, surveying, site preparation, land acquisition and soil testing prior to the construction of said judicial facility.

SECTION II: The Supervisor-Chairman of the Oconee County Council, the Clerk to the County Council and the Finance Director for Oconee County and any other proper officer(s) of the County shall be and each of them is hereby authorized and directed to execute and deliver any and all documents and instruments and to cause to be done any and all acts and things necessary or proper for carrying out the transaction contemplated by this Ordinance.

SECTION III: All unexpended funds from this appropriation shall remain in and/or revert to the fund balance account(s) of Oconee County.

SECTION IV: The provisions of this Ordinance are hereby declared to be separable and if any section, phrase or provision shall for any reason be declared by a Court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unenforceable, such declaration shall not affect the validity of the remainder of the sections, phrases and provisions hereunder.

Dear Ms. Hughes:

As the Engineer at Fort Hill Natural Gas Authority, I have seen many problems with the lack of dedicated rights-of-way on various roads within Pickens, Anderson and Oconee counties. I am sure you are aware of the possible complications and conflicts present for road maintenance and utility installation without adequate right-of-way. This is a problem throughout our service area as well.

It is unfortunate that our society has complicated some aspects of our procedures to provide service to potential customers. We make every effort to avoid right-of-way infractions; however, some instances can be an oversight or unknown until we begin installing new gas mains in an area.

Through my career with public entities, I have experienced many situations with the necessity of appropriate right-of-way for utility, drainage and roadway maintenance or improvements. I am unsure of the appropriate measures, but it seems possible that the County Council could initiate an ordinance to acquire necessary rights-of-way on the remaining county maintained roads without deeded right-of-way. A "blanket" ordinance (if possible) or an individual listing adopting the new right-of-way would be very beneficial to Oconee County Maintenance and utility companies. It seems that the normally acceptable right-of-way width is 25 feet from the road centerline.

I have spoken with Mr. Brad Norton, your attorney, about the possibility of an overall resolution to this problem. He advised me to contact you with this possibility for your consideration during council meetings. I am also going to contact Anderson and Pickens counties about such possibilities. As I explained to Mr. Norton, I feel it appropriate to bring forth such a recommendation due to the enormous amount of work Fort Hill

On or around February 8, 1999 a Mr. Hoyt Orr came to our home and left his card. After calling him, he made a request for right of way for improving Ducan Ward Road. At that time, I told him that I was not interested in giving right of way. On April 4th driving down Ducan Ward Road, I saw stakes with orange ribbons lining both sides of the road, apparently for the road improvement boundaries. So I called Hoyt Orr, but was only able to talk to Frank Nicholson. Frank informed me at that time to just pull the stakes up on my property if I did not like where they were. Shortly after our conversation, Frank showed up at my home. Asking me to ride with him to look at the easement. During our ride, Frank told me that he had already told the neighbors that all easement agreements had been signed. He also told me that he had a signed agreement form Leland Duncan and Dorothy Duncan for my property that gave them 15 feet right of way. Also at that time he told me I might need to reset my boundary pins and that trees would be cut along my right of way line. Frank also pulled up all the stakes that were on my property. Frank said that the right of way would still be altered according to their signed agreement with the Duncans. On April 26, I called Hoyt Orr asking for a copy of the Deed to Right of Way that the Duncans had signed that I was preparing a letter to Harrison Orr stating I was going to hold them liable for upsetting any of my boundary pins. Later that day Frank called me implying he could not understand why I was upset. I was upset with the fact that I was told by Frank that the boundary Pin locations were my responsibility. Again, I requested a copy to be faxed of the Deed to Right of Way signed by the Duncans. Frank also told me that they had 15-foot right of way and they would be taking it. I then received the information I requested. After looking over the information I realized the Deed had been signed the year

after, I brought my property. Therefore, the agreement was for land that the Ducan's still owned on that road, not for my property. I called Hoyt Orr's office and they said they would look into the dates and get back to me. I called Hoyt Orr's office again this morning the 27th, the secretary put me on hold while she went to get the information. But then Frank came on the line and asked "Just what do you want Randy?" I mentioned that the Deed to Right of Way was not a legal Deed for my property. Frank then said, " I guess we don't have the right of way" He then said "Fine we will still build the road without touching your property." Because my wife was on the other line also wanting to hear the results. We were both taken back by Franks attitude and tone.

I have concerns that I need to discuss with someone other than Frank.

One of my concerns is, Frank made a comment about the sloppy work contractors do. That my boundary pins could be disturbed. In addition, I would have to take on the responsibility of resetting the pins. I do not feel I need to be the one responsible for them. Being there is no easement agreement. I need to know who will be responsible for my pins and boundary line.

There is also an access to my property off Ducan Ward Road that I expect will be maintained.

The ditching that the County put in 20 years ago is inadequate on my property. There is a wash starting which I would like to have stopped.

Again, I request to talk to someone other than Frank that can give me answers to my questions and concerns stated above.



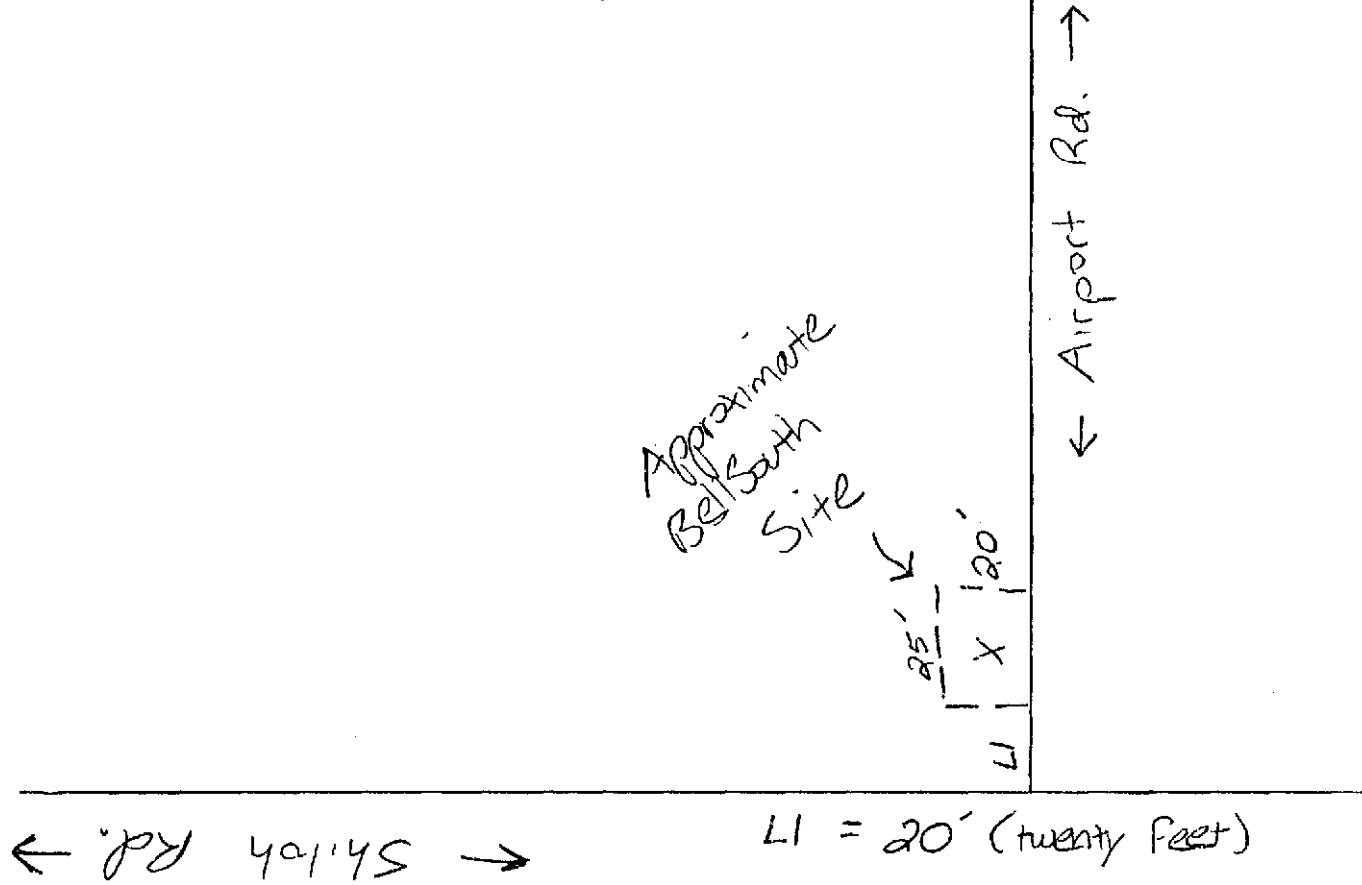

Rural Emergency Medical Initiative ~~XXXX~~

The increase in population in Oconee County and its increasing dispersion has pointed to the need to review the coverage of emergency medical services in particular to those areas which are relatively remote from ambulances and paramedics.

For this reason, I move today that we ask the Emergency Preparedness Director and Commission to explore the feasibility of establishing additional ambulance and paramedic services in Oconee County.

Some, but certainly not all, of the criteria that I recommend be incorporated into this study include:

1. Establishment of a minimum accepted response time for ambulance/paramedic services.
2. Obtain information from OMH on frequency and geographic location of emergency calls.
3. Review of the emergency response system in surrounding counties (i. e. Pickens County).
4. Determination of placement of new stations if needed.
5. Determination of third party providers of this service along with cost estimates.

**Law Enforcement, Safety, Health, Welfare and Services Committee
Reports:**

Meeting of 8/10/00 findings:

Input from primarily home builders association concerning proposed Land Development ordinance. Centered mainly on vagueness of definitions and confusion surrounding requirements of county. No action taken by committee.

1. Ask emergency preparedness director to coordinate with Seneca Chamber on storage and handling of fuel tanker, HAZMAT issues.

Several months ago, Regional Director Thomas L. Copeland wrote concerning the office space situation in Oconee County. As the Director of the South Carolina Department of Probation, Parole and Pardon Services, I would also like to appeal to you with a request for suitable office space. Please allow me to reiterate some of our concerns.

As you are already aware, present office space is inadequate due to staff increases over the past several years. With the continued offender growth within Oconee County and the need to meet our mission, it is anticipated that another position could be added. This would stretch our physical resources to an even greater extent. Additionally, I am concerned with the lack of Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) requirements being met, e.g. bathroom accessibility and access to upstairs offices. We are also forced to compromise confidentiality requirements not only where offenders are concerned, but victims and staff as well. This is due to agents sharing offices, the office layout in general, and no common waiting area which allows conversations to be easily overheard.

In closing, I would respectfully request that you consider these concerns and seek adequate office space for our staff. Please feel free to contact Mr. Copeland, Ms. Murr, or myself with any questions you may have concerning this request. I look forward to hearing from you regarding this matter.
