Council held a planning retreat Wednesday, October 30, 2002 beginning at 9:00 am.

The retreat was called to order and Council went to visit the Heritage Center Museum and the Rees Building.

When session resumed Mrs. Martha Baily, Library Director and Mrs. Mimi Hunt the following phases of Library needs to Council:

- Phase I Renovation/Expansion of Seneca Library at estimated cost of \$5,045,583
- Renovation of Walhalla Library at estimated cost of \$2,881,174
- Phase II Renovation/Expansion of Salem Library at estimated cost of \$1,029,832
- Phase III Renovation/Expansion of Westminster Library at estimated cost of \$740,704
- Phase IV Building of Oakway/Fairplay Library at estimated cost of \$1,486,111

Mrs. Lindsay Addis & Mrs. Mimi Hunt addressed Council regarding repairs of the following items at an estimated cost of \$40,000:

- Roofing of kennels
- Kennel doors
- Laundry room floor
- Door and frame to kennels
- Windows frames falling out
- Creaked cement
- Tear out gas chamber to make room for freezer
- Replace fencing

Mr. Dan Whitehurst presented Council with drawings of changes to be made to the DSS Building to house DSS and DHHS as the county is required to house these agencies.

Mr. Paul Lewis, Mr. Steve Goldie, Mr. Allen Pope and Mr. Daniel Lewis briefed Council on the County Infrastructure Plan to include the following:

- Sewer Issues
- Water Issues
- Solid Waste
- Transportation
- Storm Water
- Water

Mr. Russell Campbell of MGT discussed a proposal to conduct a fire study for Oconee County; it was the consensus of Council this study be approved by Council.

Present were: Tim Mays, Chairperson; Pat Cromer, Eva McGowan, Tamasee-Salem Recreation Corporation; Ken Davis, Mike Lemons and Vickie Satterfield

The meeting was called to order by Mr. Mays and the invocation given by Mr. Lemons. Both Mr. Lemons and Mr. Davis had been hospitalized recently for very serious illnesses and the commission expressed to them how thankful they were to have them back with us.

1. Mr. Mays then recognized Ms. Eva McGowan of the Tamasee-Salem Recreation Corporation. Ms. McGowan requested the following fund for organized youth basketball:

Game Official Fees 2002 - 2003 Basketball Season (<i>\$10/official per game, 6 games per week, \$300 end of season tournament</i>)	\$ 1,020.00
Rubber bumpers for adjust-a-goal Backboards installed at the DAR Gym	250.00
Uniforms for the 2002-2003 season 70 each with name and number	1,000.00
Total Request	<hr/> \$ 2,270.00

Upon a motion by Mr. Davis, seconded by Mr. Cromer and unanimously carried, the Commission voted to recommend to County Council that Tamasee-Salem Recreation Corporation be given \$2,270.00 for organized youth sports and that the funds be taken from Item Number 010-202-30901-00000 District I Funds.

2. The Commission then discussed the need for continuity among our youth sports programs and wishes to pursue the issue of one of our groups not being allowed to play in Dixie Youth like the rest of the County. Mrs. Satterfield will speak with Brad Norton.

3. Upon a motion by Mr. Lemons, seconded by Mr. Crömer and unanimously carried, the Commission recommends to Oconee County Council to increase recreation building and shelters at the parks. There has not been an increase in several years and with a marked increase in the number of individuals using these shelters has resulted in increasing additional staff to maintain these areas. This price would still be comparable to other facilities in the County if not less. (See attached proposed fee schedule)

4. The point shelter at South Cove Park is being moved to another location and being replaced with 12 prime camping spots on the water. Mrs. Satterfield had met with the Oconee County Tourism Promotion Commission and they voted to recommend to Oconee County Council the spaces go for a premium price. Upon a motion by Ken Davis, seconded by Mike Lemons the Commission voted to recommend to Oconee County Council the spaces should be rented at a premium price and suggested \$20 per night.

5. The master plan is near completion. It has taken a little longer. Response from the questionnaire came back at about 12%, which was good but time consuming. When the final document is completed the Commission asked if Mr. Cunningham could be with them and discuss the results.

The meeting was adjourned at 6:05 p.m.

OCONEE COUNTY COUNCIL

ORDINANCE 2002-

Oconee County Council, in session duly assembled, hereby adopts and proclaims the following ordinance as hereinafter set forth:

TITLE: "THIS ORDINANCE SHALL BE KNOWN AS AN ORDINANCE TO DEFINE AND REGULATE THE USE OF ALL OCONEE COUNTY PUBLIC PARKS AND RECREATION AREAS DESIGNATED FOR THE BENEFIT OF THE CITIZENS OF OCONEE COUNTY, SOUTH CAROLINA, REPLACING ORDINANCE 92-3."

WHEREAS, Oconee County Council has determined that the best interests of the citizens of the county would be served by the continued regulation of activities in the public parks and recreation areas in the unincorporated portions of the County; and

WHEREAS, such regulations are necessary to promote good order, peace, public health, morals, safety and comfort of the citizens of the County in these areas; and

WHEREAS, the Oconee County Council, cognizant of the provisions of Section 16-17-530, Code of Laws of South Carolina (1976), as amended, has determined that such regulations are required and in the due and proper exercise of the police power vested in the County government; and

WHEREAS, Oconee County has entered into an agreement with the United States Army Corps of Engineers wherein Oconee County has agreed to provide law enforcement services in and upon recreation areas located upon Hartwell Lake, Oconee County, South Carolina;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY OCONEE COUNTY COUNCIL, AND COUNCIL DULY ASSEMBLED, UPON THIRD AND FINAL READING AS SET FORTH HEREIN;

SECTION I

The Director of Oconee County Parks, Recreation and Tourism, with the approval of the Oconee County Parks, Recreation and Tourism Commission and the Oconee County Supervisor, shall have the authority to implement necessary rules and regulations concerning the conduct, admission and regulation of users of all Oconee County parks, recreation areas and facilities open to the general public, not inconsistent with the provisions of this Ordinance. The Director shall notify the Oconee County Council Clerk and the Oconee County Council in writing thirty (30) days prior to the implementation of such rules and regulations. The Oconee County Council may change any rules upon a majority of Council with quorum present.

SECTION II

Definitions

A. "Hartwell Lake Recreation Areas" as used herein shall mean all public parks, public recreation areas and facilities located on or adjacent to Hartwell Lake in Oconee County, South Carolina under the concurrent jurisdiction of the United States Army Corps of Engineers and the Oconee County Sheriff's Department.

B. "Public parks, recreation areas and facilities" as used herein shall mean all public parks, public recreation areas and facilities located in the unincorporated portions of Oconee County, South Carolina, including public access areas, public recreation areas, camping areas and all areas designed and established for the use of public, to include those areas for the parking of motor vehicles, to gain access to Lake Jocassee, Lake Keowee, Chauga River, Ramsey Creek and all other rivers, streams and waters located within the boundaries of Oconee County and parking and recreational areas for access to public lands and Sumter National Forest or other wilderness areas (EXCLUDING HOWEVER, Oconee State Park or any other state operated and maintained park or facility within the County which is under the jurisdiction of the South Carolina Department of Parks, Recreation and Tourism).

C. "Alcoholic beverages" and "alcoholic liquors" as used herein shall be defined to mean any beer, malt, wine, spirits, liquors or other beverages whose sale is regulated and licensed by the South Carolina Alcoholic Beverage Control Commission.

D. "Commission" shall mean the Oconee County Parks, Recreation and Tourism Commission.

E. "Corps" shall mean the United States Army Corps of Engineers.

F. "PRI" shall mean the Oconee County Parks, Recreation and Tourism Department.

SECTION III

It shall be unlawful for any person to commit any of the following acts at or in any Hartwell Lake Recreation Area or any public park, recreation area or facility under the jurisdiction of the Oconee County Parks, Recreation and Tourism Department.

(A) Destroying, defacing, disturbing, disfiguring or removing any part of any building, sign, structure or equipment.

(B) Destroying, cutting, breaking, removing, defacing, mutilating, injuring, taking or gathering any tree, shrub, other plant or plant part, rock, mineral or geological feature except by permit issued by the Commission.

- (C) Building any fire in any place other than those specifically designated for such a purpose.
- (D) Disposing of litter, garbage or other refuse in places or receptacles other than those specifically provided for such purpose. Such unlawful disposing of litter, garbage or refuse shall include:
 - (1) Dumping any refuse or waste from any trailer or other vehicle except in places or receptacles provided in such use.
 - (2) Cleaning fish, or food, or washing clothing or articles for household use in any sink or at any faucet located in restrooms.
 - (3) Polluting or contaminating any water used for human consumption.
 - (4) Using park refuse containers or facilities for dumping household or commercial garbage or trash brought as such from private property.
 - (5) Depositing, except into receptacles provided for that purpose, any body waste, or depositing any bottles, cans, clothes, rags, metal, wood, stone or other damaging substance in any fixture in any restroom or other structure.
- (E) Possessing any firearm, airgun, explosive or firework except by duty authorized park personnel, law enforcement officers or persons using areas specifically designated by the Director of PRT or the Corps for use of firearms, airguns, fireworks or explosives.
- (F) Operating vehicles in a careless manner, or in excess of posted speed limits, or in areas other than those specifically intended for vehicular traffic. A violation of the following provisions shall constitute the unlawful operating of vehicles:
 - (1) Motorbikes, minibikes, mopeds, motorscooters, go-carts and any other type motorized vehicle shall not be driven in any area or on any trail not intended for their use. Only licensed motorized vehicles shall be allowed on park roads, unless specifically approved by the Director of PRT or the Park Superintendent.
 - (2) No motorized vehicle of any kind shall be allowed on horse trails, hiking trails or beach areas.

- (3) Motor vehicles shall not be driven on roads in developed recreation sites for any purpose other than access into or egress out of the site by persons lawfully using or occupying said areas.
- (4) No motorized vehicle of any kind shall be operated at any time without a muffler in good working order, or in such a manner as to create excessive or unusual noise or annoying smoke, or using a muffler cut-off, by-pass or similar device.
- (5) No person shall excessively accelerate the engine of a motor vehicle or motorcycle when such vehicle is not moving or is approaching or leaving a stopping place.
- (6) Vehicles shall not be permitted in a cabin or camping area unless the operator thereof is a registered guest within the area, except for the expressed intent of renting such area or with prior permission of authorized park officials.
- (G) Using privately owned boats or gasoline motors on any waters lying within the jurisdiction of Oconee County in a reckless or careless manner or in violation of any posted rules and regulations including, but not limited to, wake zones.
- (H) No person using or occupying public parks and recreation areas which come within the Hartwell Lake Recreation Areas and/or within the jurisdiction of the Oconee County Parks, Recreation and Tourism, as defined in Section II (B) herein, shall drink, consume or possess any unsealed or opened containers of alcoholic liquors and beverages, including beer and wine, nor shall any person consume any alcoholic liquors or beverages, including beer and wine, nor shall any person consume any alcoholic liquors or mixtures thereof within the boundaries of such parks or recreation areas. The Oconee County Council may allow a public park or recreation area under the jurisdiction of the Oconee County Parks, Recreation and Tourism as defined in Section II (B) above, to be used for a private social function at which alcoholic beverages may be legally consumed at such place, time and circumstances as allowed by Council.
- (I) Acting in a disorderly manner or creating any noise which would result in annoyance to others. Acting in a disorderly manner shall include inciting or participating in riots, or indulging in boisterous, abusive, threatening, indecent or disorderly conduct. In addition to other authorized penalty provision anyone in violation of this subsection may be ejected from the park and shall not be entitled to a refund of any fee or rental.

- (J) Entering or remaining within the limits of the park or facility while in an intoxicated or drugged condition.
- (K) Entering or remaining within the limits of the park or facility while in an intoxicated or drugged condition.
- (L) Operating or using audio devices, including radio, television, musical instruments or any other noise producing devices, such as electrical generators, and equipment driven by motor engines, in such a manner and at such times as to disturb other persons and no person shall operate or use any public address system, whether fixed, portable or vehicle mounted, except when such use or operation has been approved by the Director of PRT, the Park Superintendent or Corps officials.
- (M) Engaging in or soliciting business within a park or facility except where authorized by the Director of PRT and no person shall distribute, post, place or erect any bills, notices, paper or advertising device or matter of any kind without consent of the Director of PRT.
- (N) Swimming in areas not designated for the purpose and failing to obey all posted rules while swimming.
- (O) Bringing a dog or any other animal into the park or facility unless it is crated, caged or upon a leash not longer than six feet or otherwise under physically restrictive control at all times. For this purpose:
- (1) No person shall leave any dog or other animal unattended within any park, recreation area or facility.
 - (2) No person shall keep in the park or retain in the park a noisy, vicious or dangerous dog or animal or one which is disturbing to other person after he has been asked to remove such animal.
 - (3) No person shall bring a saddle, pack or draft animals into a site, which has not been developed to accommodate them.
 - (4) No person shall bring an animal into any beach area, except where said animal is necessary to assist the owner with a physical handicap.
 - (5) The owner of any animal shall be responsible for cleaning up and properly disposing of any waste from said animal.
- (P) Entering a facility or area without regard to restrictions on public use. These restrictions on public use shall include the following provisions and

a violation of such provisions shall be considered to be a violation of this subsection.

(1) All public parks, recreation areas and facilities located within the unincorporated boundaries of Oconee County as defined herein shall be closed between the hours of 10:00 p.m. and 7:00 a.m. each day, including Sunday. The Director of PRT, with approval of County Council, may designate different hours of operation for the various public parks. It shall be unlawful for any person to enter or to remain in such public parks, recreation areas and facilities during closed hours, with the following exceptions:

(a) When such use or entry is for the exclusive purpose of launching or removing boats, and then only if such launching and retrieval of boats takes place within a reasonable time;

(b) Those areas contained and encompassed in such parks or recreation areas designated for camping or occupancy by recreational vehicles, and then only if such occupants are lawfully engaged and occupied in camping and/or parking of recreational vehicles or are the invited guests of any person so lawfully occupied;

(c) When such use or entry is for the exclusive purpose of fishing and then only if such persons who are fishing are not disturbing others in the surrounding area.

(2) No person shall make, use or gain admittance to attempt to use or gain admittance to facilities within any park, for which a charge is made, without paying the fee.

(3) No person shall remain any facility if he refuses to pay the required fee to enter and use the facility or service in a posted, designated area.

(4) No person shall enter any park or any park area or facility when it is closed to the public.

(5) No person shall willfully provide erroneous information for any campsite or cabin registration.

- (6) No person or persons shall occupy a campsite for a consecutive period longer than thirty (30) days without permission from the Director of PRT or the Park Superintendent.
- (Q) Killing, harming or harassing any mammal, bird, reptile or amphibian or hunting in any area except those areas designated for hunting by the commission or Corps.

SECTION III

Any person who is directed by park officials or other law enforcement officials to abandon or leave the park, and who, after such notice refuses to do so as directed shall be guilty of trespass and punished in accordance with the dictates of this ordinance. In the event that a person has multiple violations of park and/or recreation area rules, the Director of PRT may expressly notify in writing said person that said person no longer has permission to use county parks or recreation areas for a period of time not to exceed one (1) year. Any person who receives such notice may appeal the Director's decision to County Council. After receiving such notice, any person who violates the restrictions set out in the notice shall be guilty of trespass and shall be punished in accordance with the dictates of this Ordinance.

SECTION IV

Any person violating the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined not less than twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars nor more than five hundred (\$500.00) dollars, or imprisoned for not more than thirty (30) days for each violation.

SECTION V

If any provision, paragraph, word, section or article of this ordinance is invalidated by any Court of competent jurisdiction, the remaining provisions, paragraphs, words, sections and articles shall not be affected and shall continue in full force and effect.

SECTION VI

Oconee County Ordinance No. 92-3 entitled "An Ordinance to Define and Regulate the Use of All Oconee County Public Parks and Recreation Areas Designated for the Benefit of the Citizens of Oconee County, South Carolina" is hereby repealed. All regulations or ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with any part of this ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent of such inconsistency or conflict.

SECTION VII

This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after passage, approval and publication, as provided by law.

Enclosed please find a bid tabulation for the above referenced project. We have reviewed their bid and it appears to be complete and balanced. We only received two bids, Seigie Grading Company submitted a low bid of \$98,505.00.

We have reviewed Seigie's current work schedule and it appears that they will have sufficient crews and equipment available to promptly begin the project and complete it on schedule.

This low bid is higher than we anticipated and the only two bidders that responded are grading contractors (We anticipated having more utility contractors bid the project. Utility contractors are generally more accustomed to working with trenches). The County could elect to re-bid the project, however, DHEC has already extended the deadline on the project to March 1, 2003. If the project is re-released to bid with a tighter construction schedule, then the County may not receive a lower bid. With this in mind, it is our recommendation that the County award the Five Forks Methane Remediation Project to Seigie Grading.

I am very grateful that you are encouraging caution in regards to the demolition of the Old Stone Building. I am sure that many regard the proposed demolition as a tragic error.

As I understand it, the OSB was constructed during the Depression by the CCC and the WPA, and that the stone came from the Stumphouse Tunnel project. These things make this building unique as well as historic. The building is probably the only time the CCC and the WPA collaborated on a project and thus is a unique monument in the entire USA. The source of the stone ties the building in with South Carolina's heritage, which is a well publicized feeling of pride in the State.

The asbestos and lead paint are not real problems. No children are going to be chewing on the woodwork. And, since the building has been in active use since the floor tiles were installed without any adverse effects on any ones health demonstrates that is a very minor hazard.

I pray that there is some way to retain the Old Stone Building as the historic monument that it is and that it will eventually be listed in the National Register.

Project Description:

Keowee-Ebenezer Fire Department is requesting funding for the replacement of sixteen (16) Substandard sets of bunker gear.

Pertinent Information:

In light of the events surrounding "9/11", our Fire Department realized how crucial it is to have all our volunteer fire fighters ready for any emergency or potential attack of terrorism. Our fire station is one of 3 primary responders located less than 5 miles from the Oconee Nuclear Station, which is operated by Duke Energy. Presently, few of our fire fighters are equipped to respond if a disaster comparable to "9/11" occurred in Oconee County. The funding we are requesting would allow Oconee County to do our part in Homeland Security by protecting the citizens of South Carolina.

Project Benefits

Our Fire Department has been in existence since 1985 and have always operated with substandard PPE. Let me repeat that statement, in our history, due to insufficient annual funding, we have never had all our volunteers equipped with current NFPA standard PPE.

The benefits derived from having a volunteer fire fighter equipped with proper PPE are self-evident. Tangible benefits are obvious- firefighters require OSHA approved gear in order to be an effective tool on a fire scene. An intangible benefit is the professional confidence the PPE gives our volunteer fire fighter, which will carry over to their actions on the fire ground. Our department is 100% volunteer, and proper equipment is a small price for members who risk life and limb for NO PAY.

Our bunker gear wears out or becomes outdated faster than we can buy it. We presently can afford only one full set of bunker gear per year. Our force wears hand-me-downs, and keeps outdated equipment on hand for any new volunteers.

Financial Need

Keowee Eberozor continues to search for funds to meet the needs of our Fire Department. Two years ago we were forced to take out a loan to expand our station to house a much-needed vehicle.

Our present budget amounts to less than \$12,000 per year. Our yearly budget items include: \$5,250 for building loan, \$8,200 for operations, dues, fees, utilities & insurance, and \$300 for NFIRS software updates / support.

Throughout the year, attempts are constantly made for general funding through the municipal budget, only to have them passed over for higher countywide priorities. Oconee County has experienced a 13% population growth over the past five years, and this trend is expected to continue through 2010. The rapid population growth is placing demands on the County's entire infrastructure, especially on Rural Fire Departments, where the majority of growth is occurring. It will be years before the revenue stream from the growth catches up with the problem it creates. Our volunteer fire fighters need to be equipped now for the disasters they may face, and even more so due to our status as one of 3 Oconee County stations who provide first-line fire protection to Oconee Nuclear Station.

To help offset our financial shortcomings, we as a station hold fund-raisers every other year. This helps cover operating expenses and utilities, but it is not enough to fund the extensive equipment requirements already discussed above.

Project Timeline

Upon award notification, we will issue a Press Release citing and thanking FEMA for placing safety at the top of their funding priorities. We will utilize our County procurement department to place all items up for bid within 30 days of award notification. All purchases will be finalized within 90 days of approval, unless there is a delay with the suppliers.
