Information for Council Meeting - May 16, 1995

Mr. Chairman, ladies and gentlemen of County Council:

Thank you for this opportunity to address you on behalf of the School Board, the School Administration, approximately 1,200 employees, and approximately 10,000 school children. Since all of Oconee County benefits from a good school system, the budget is presented in your behalf and all of the citizens of Oconee County.

The budget I present to you this afternoon calls for no additional personnel, 1 less assistant superintendent, and 3 less directors in the county-office. One and one third (1 & 1/3) less assistant principals and 10 other ^{less} positions. These reductions total approximately \$345,000. Further reductions are in department and school non-allocated expenses totaling \$578,000.

The budget that is presented to you is designed to maintain our present level of operations without cutting programs in the schools. Further cuts than those mentioned above could damage programs.

The budget presented was developed using the Senate passed version of the State educational budget. This bill calls for a 4% inflation rate. It is my

understanding that the required local maintenance of effort would call for \$25,888,200. or an increase of \$1,115,240 over FY95.

I'm sure that you are aware that we are requesting an additional \$1,357,000. to balance the budget as presented.

The bulk of monies requested result from a 4.25% increase in salary for all employees on their present salaries: that includes state salary schedule and local supplement.

I have given you a general synopsis of the FY96 School District Budget. Mr. Herring and members of the staff are here to answer specific questions if you have any at this time. Mr. Herring will make a few remarks about the budget.



**Re: Schlumberger Expansion and
Cane Creek Sewer Pump Station Upgrade**

Dear Mr. Crain:

Recently Oconee County applied to ARC for a sewer grant to upgrade the Cane Creek wastewater pumping station due to the proposed expansion at Schlumberger. A preliminary engineering report was prepared by Goldie & Associates to accompany the application for potential funding (copy attached).

Mr. Dirk Reis of the ACOG informed me last week that his agency cannot administer ARC funds and that FmHA would be the agency to do so. This change will require that the PER be revised to meet FmHA requirements. FmHA also requires an engineering agreement with the PER.

I have met with Steve Goldie and discussed revising the PER to meet FmHA requirements to include a formal engineering agreement. Steve has agreed to work with the County in preparing this grant information and enter into an engineering agreement with the understanding that if the project is approved they will provide the engineering services. In essence, they will do the work and basically take the risk of furnishing the effort without payment if the project is not funded.

The Sewer Commission voted at the May 1, 1995 meeting to recommend that Oconee County waive the process of requesting formal proposals for engineering services for this project. This recommendation is based upon the fact that it is in the County's best interest to do so, and they are a local in-County firm willing to provide the services contingent upon project funding.

I have discussed this matter with Ms. Dillard in County Purchasing and hope she will concur with the OCSC recommendation.

SCHLUMBERGER INDUSTRIES SEWER SERVICE EVALUATION

I. BACKGROUND

Schlumberger Industries is planning an expansion of their West Union, South Carolina facility. This expansion of the West Union operations will result in eighty (80) additional employees hired at the facility and will generate additional domestic wastewater.

II. OBJECTIVE

The objective of this report is to investigate viable alternatives to serve the proposed expansion with sewer service. This report will provide preliminary cost opinions for construction and will discuss the physical transfer of the waste stream to the Oconee County Sewer Commission treatment plant.

III. EXISTING SEWER SYSTEM ASSESSMENT

Schlumberger Industries is currently served by a pumping station and a gravity sewer trunk line. Wastewater currently flows from Schlumberger into gravity collection lines to the Cane Creek pumping station. This pumping station also receives wastewater flow from adjacent residential and commercial areas.

The Cane Creek pumping station is a duplex flooded suction arrangement with the pumps and wet well in separate underground vaults. The pumping station was designed for a flow of 1250 gpm @ 157' TDH. The waste stream from Cane Creek is pumped to a 21-inch diameter gravity collector main by means of a twelve (12) inch force main approximately 5300 feet long. The collector main flows parallel to SC Hwy. 28 and discharges into the Coneross Creek pumping station adjacent to the OCSC Wastewater Treatment facilities as shown in Figure 1 attached.

The existing Cane Creek pumping station has an average daily discharge of approximately 411,000 gallons per day over the last 26 months. The Cane Creek pumping station has a relatively small working volume of approximately 6100 gallons. This relatively small working volume may allow spillages to occur in the collection system if surge loads are applied to the system. The existing wet well and pumping station are not capable of keeping up with sewage flows from the 18 inch influent line during peak flow periods. The result can be spillages from the manholes just upstream of the pumping station wetwell. We propose to construct additional wet well capacity as part of this upgrade to minimize potential for raw sewage spillages from occurring.

Flow records indicate that the design flow for Cane Creek pumping stations has been exceeded on 54 days from January 1994 through February 1995.

The data for the Cane Creek station is as follows:

The flow conditions above are based on pump run times from motor hour meter readings and pump data associated with same. The data above indicates that the stations reviewed operate above design capacity 13.6% of the time. These findings indicate a trend where commercial and residential development is steadily increasing in the OCSC service area. The additional flows produced by the expansion of Schlumberger industries will add to a system which is operating at or above its design flows presently.

ALTERNATIVES FOR SERVICE

In order to provide sewer service for the Schlumberger expansion and other facilities currently served, an upgrading of the existing Cane Creek pumping station and construction of additional wet well storage capacity will be necessary.

We envision the pumping station will be upgraded as follows:

OPINION OF PROBABLE COSTS

The following is an opinion of probable costs for the upgrade of the pumping station and construction of additional wet well capacity. The proposed improvements downstream of the Schlumberger facility are necessary to accommodate additional industrial growth in that area. Construction costs are based on recently bid projects of similar nature in Oconee County, Pump Vendor information and Means Construction Cost data text.



CONCLUSIONS

In order to provide sewer service to the proposed expansion at Schlumberger Industries, the Cane Creek lift station should be upgraded to handle additional flows that will be generated by the facility.



A Little 911 education goes a long way

Former worker teaches kids service

Simply dialing 911 in case of an emergency is no simple task unless it's done correctly. Elementary school students throughout Ocassee County are learning to do just that, thank to the efforts of Ocassee County 911 instructor Bob Little.

A Southern Bell retiree, Little has made it his mission to help kids from kindergarten to third grade learn the right way to use the 911 system.

Little began the program last year in Spyanburg, where he educated at least 2,000 students.

However, having made his home in Staeca, he had a desire to reach out to the great youth as well.

That's why the 911 educational program has been well received by the different communities and the county as a whole.

Reaching it even more has been the support of area companies within the Emergency Medical Services unit, the county's fire

**COST ESTIMATE TO OCONEE COUNTY
FOR NOTIFICATION AND WELL SAMPLING SERVICES FOR
RESIDENTS NEAR SENECA LANDFILL
GOLDIE & ASSOCIATES PROJECT 22.9.7**

BACKGROUND

Due to repeated detection of volatile organics in ground water at the Seneca Landfill, further assessment of the ground water and closure of the landfill is planned. Because of the presence of these compounds, the potential exists for area residents with wells to consume water that does not meet public health standards. Therefore, Oconee County officials have decided to contact landowners living within a one mile radius of the landfill to inform them of the Seneca Landfill assessment and closure process, identify wells that are located on their property, request permission to test their wells, and sample and analyze their well water.

PROJECT GOAL

The goal of the project is as follows: mail letters to landowners within a one mile radius of the Seneca Landfill to inform them via U.S. mail of the landfill assessment and closure process; identify the wells located on landowner's property; request permission to test wells; and sample and analyze water from identified wells.

SCOPE

The scope will include the following:

1. Property Owner Identification

Identify property owners within a one-mile radius. This will include acquiring updated tax maps and identifying property owners within a one-mile radius of landfill; referencing landowners by the tax i.d. numbers; giving tax I.D. numbers to tax assessor's office and requesting complete list of landowners as well as three copies of mailing labels; comparing map data and list to verify that owners have been identified.

2. Mailing Labels

Obtain mailing labels for letters, envelopes, and return postcard.

3. Printing

Coordinate printing of all materials. Printing costs will include paper, envelopes and card stock as well as printing and folding costs.

4. Process Mailing

Apply mailing labels to letters, envelopes, and return postcards; stuff and seal 1200 envelopes; apply postage and assemble for mailing.

5. Certified and Return Receipt Forms

Fill out 1200 certified and 1200 return receipt forms by hand and apply certified label and return receipt form to each envelope.

6. Documentation and Recordkeeping

Maintain accurate documentation of all property owners that were mailed a letter with certified forms and verify that return receipts have been received and documented.

7. Postage

The postage costs are the costs to mail 1200 pieces by certified mail (\$1.10), return receipt requested (\$1.10), first class mail (\$0.32), and postcard (\$0.20 stamp placed on it to return survey) for a total of \$2.72 per piece. The cost entered below is based on 1200 pieces. An actual count will be done when list is obtained from tax assessor's office and exact fee for postage costs will be determined. Oconee County will pay Goldie & Associates each Thursday for postage fees incurred provided that Goldie & Associates submits an invoice before noon Wednesday of the same week. These postage costs are for stamps for the postcard and charges on the Goldie & Associates postage meter for letters specifically used for this mailing.

8. Sampling/Analysis

After property owners with wells are identified, arrangements will be made to sample and analyze wells. Wells will be analyzed for the volatile organic compounds that have been detected at the Seneca Landfill from monitoring well and hydropunch analysis. EPA sampling procedures will be utilized including purging wells three well volumes prior to collecting samples. Because of the variety of well depths (possibly as deep as 300 feet) and well diameters (4" to 48"+), the amount of purge volume may exceed 1000 gallons for each well. We plan to use the most efficient collection method to purge and sample the wells according to the EPA requirements, but anticipate that a pump will temporarily have to be installed into each well that has no existing working pump. The fees for the sampling associated with this project include obtaining the pump, cleaning the pump and tubing between wells, installing the pump,

operating the pump, providing a power source to the pump if one is not available, purging the wells using the pump and removing the pump after purging is complete. If wells are identified with working pumps that are active at least for home owner consumption use, then temporary installation of pumps by Goldie & Associates may not be required and sampling/analysis fees will be adjusted to \$ 175/well. Samples will be handled and transported using EPA protocol and analyzed in a SC Certified Drinking Water Laboratory.

9. Report

A summary report will indicate the following: the number of letters mailed, the number of certified mail return receipts received, the number of post cards received and the number of respondents who indicated that they have a well on their property. A table will be included of the respondents who indicated they have a well on their property and will include the respondent's name, phone number (if provided by respondent), tax i.d. number, and responses to questions on postcard. In addition, one copy of tax assessor's property owner list will be provided with the following additional information indicated on the list: certified mail number, date letter was mailed, date return receipt was signed by landowner, date postcard was returned, and whether they indicated a well was present on their property. In addition, analysis results of wells will be provided with a summary of the results and a map indicating approximate well locations. Additional written reports and compiling of data is beyond the scope of this project and can be provided for additional costs.

10. Liaison with Property Owners

We foresee that area property owners may contact Goldie & Associates with questions. Therefore consulting costs will be required to address property owner questions. This cost will be billed at \$50/hour. Although the total cost is not known for this item, we recommend that \$1500 be budgeted. However, if liaison costs exceed this value, additional fees will be billed.

11. Meetings with Oconee County

We anticipate planning meetings with County Administrators, County Council meetings, meetings with DHEC, as well as preparation for meetings may be necessary as a result of the sampling and analysis program. Although the actual number of hours spent in these meetings and in preparation is not known yet, we recommend that \$ 1,000 be budgeted. However, if meeting costs exceed this value, additional fees will be billed at Goldie & Associates standard fees which are attached.

Our records indicate that your property is within 1 mile of the Seneca Landfill. Because of your proximity to the landfill, we want you to be aware of the following, and if you have a well to offer you the opportunity for us to test the well water at no cost to you.

As part of assessment and closure of the Seneca Landfill, the firm Goldie & Associates has been requested to assist us. As a part of this work, our consultants have conducted test borings on the landfill site. Preliminary results from these test borings indicate that the potential exists for impact upon adjacent groundwater. However, the extent of any such impact is unknown at this point.

The purpose of this notice is

1. To notify area residents within a one-mile radius of the potential impact, especially those with wells, and
2. To obtain further information on area wells.

If you have a well or plan to construct a well then please be advised that there may be some impact from the landfill onto ground water. Please note, most residents in the area receive their water from the City of Seneca which does not come from ground water.

It is the property owners responsibility to notify tenants and other residents on their property that may be affected.

Again, this testing will be provided at no cost to you.

I'll be looking forward to hearing from you on these matters.



Please be advised that the Appalachian Regional Water Quality Management Plan has been amended to include the following changes:

1. The Upstate Roundtable 20-Year Sewer Plan has been adopted as official 208 policy for the Saluda, Reedy, and Enoree River Basins. Copies of the Roundtable Plan are available for public review at the ACOG offices in Greenville. See attached copy of amendment for specific language.
2. The language of Chapter 2, page 9, Item (a), with respect to land application has been changed to make local governing board approval optional rather than mandatory. See attached copy of amendment for specific language.

In order for the ACOG to know which which option each county chooses, please complete the attached form and return as quickly as possible in the pre-addressed envelope enclosed.

We are asking that each county council let us know whether they want to defer land application conformance review to our agency, to approve the process locally, or to not allow land application in the county at all. In all cases, if a land application project is certified as conforming with the 208 Plan, it will also be subject to DHEC and review and permitting.

The county *delegates* 208 conformance certification of all land application/reuse projects to the Appalachian Council of Governments.

NOTE: Choosing this option will allow the ACOG to review and certify proposed land application/reuse projects within the county's jurisdiction. This is the manner in which all current wastewater discharge permits are reviewed and certified as conforming with the 208 Water Quality Management Plan.

The county *approves* land application/reuse as an alternative method of wastewater disposal.

NOTE: Choosing this option indicates approval for land application/reuse projects within the county's jurisdiction. The ACOG will review and certify land application/reuse projects as they are proposed.

The county *disapproves* land application/reuse as an alternative method of wastewater disposal.

NOTE: Choosing this option indicates disapproval for land application/reuse projects within the county jurisdiction. The ACOG will not certify any land application/reuse project proposed within the county.

CHAPTER 2

New Technology and Alternative Methods of Wastewater Disposal

The use of new or updated technology and alternative methods for wastewater treatment and disposal is encouraged, subject to the following:

1. *Before implementation of any technology or method not specifically allowed in the 208 Plan, an amendment process shall be conducted. This process shall include, but is not limited to; 208 committee/staff review, public review, approval by the ACOG Board of Directors, and approval by SCDHEC; and*
2. *Before implementation, the method or technique shall be permitted by DHEC using State and Federal Guidelines; and*
3. *Shall not conflict with or be in violation of the discharge permit or overall intent and purpose of this plan, state or federal laws; and*
4. *Shall not result in a lower/lesser treatment level than the level which is being achieved with existing techniques, nor shall it result in any environmental or public health degradation; and*
5. *Shall be consistent with the Basin Sub-Plan for the locations involved.*

Accordingly, the following alternative techniques have been approved:

- a) *Disposal of effluent by land application/reuse.*
Prior to 208 conformance approval of a land application/reuse project by the ACOG, the local governing body for the jurisdiction in which the land application is proposed, shall have the option of reviewing and approving land application as an acceptable method of wastewater disposal in that jurisdiction.

CHAPTER 2

New Technology and Alternative Methods of Wastewater Disposal

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1. *Before implementation of any technology or method not specifically allowed in the 208 Plan, an amendment process shall be conducted. This process shall include, but is not limited to; 208 committee/staff review, public review, approval by the ACOG Board of Directors, and approval by SCDHEC; and*
2. *Before implementation, the method or technique shall be permitted by DHEC using State and Federal Guidelines; and*
3. *Shall not conflict with or be in violation of the discharge permit or overall intent and purpose of this plan, state or federal laws; and*
4. *Shall not result in a lower/lesser treatment level than the level which is being achieved with existing techniques, nor shall it result in any environmental or public health degradation; and*
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CHAPTER 21

Basin and Sub-Basin Plans

The Appalachian Region consists of three primary hydrologic drainage basins. From west to east, they are: the Savannah River Basin, the Saluda River Basin, and the Broad River Basin. Each of those basins contain a number of sub-basin watersheds which provide the tributary flows to the primary drainage system. The three primary basins serve as the 208 Water Quality Planning Areas, and as such will have basin plans. Each significant sub-basin watershed will in turn have a sub-basin plan.

Each basin and sub-basin plan shall be updated on a regular basis as per SCDHEC and ACOG agreement. All 208 conformance reviews shall be made in strict accordance with such plans as they are adopted by the ACOG Board of Directors. Conformance reviews for those plans which have not been updated shall be in accordance with existing 208 policies.


A Basin Planning Committee(BPC) shall be established for each primary river basin in the Appalachian Region. The purpose of the committee is to prepare basin plans and make policy recommendations to the ACOG Board of Directors for adoption as 208 Water Quality Management Policy. Additionally, the BPC's will be responsible for conducting any "major" 208 conformance reviews and make recommendations to the ACOG Board.

is \$25.00, that is no problem.



S. C. APPALACHIAN COUNCIL OF GOVERNMENTS

The S. C. Appalachian Council of Governments is a cooperative organization of local governments in Anderson, Cherokee, Greenville, Oconee, Pickens, and Spartanburg Counties. The organization began in 1965 as the Appalachian Advisory Commission, a 12-member board created to advise the Governor of South Carolina on the use of Appalachian Regional Commission funds. In 1971, through state enabling legislation, these same counties joined together and reorganized the Commission to form the S. C. Appalachian Council of Governments.

In the years since 1971, the Council has evolved into a multi-faceted service organization for area local governments. The Council of Governments assists these six counties and their forty-three municipalities by helping them to acquire state and federal funds for economic and community development (nearly \$250 million in grants since 1965); administering a wide variety of services to the elderly under the Older Americans Act; and working with local governments to improve their services in areas such as planning, financial management, public works, purchasing, computerization, personnel systems, and general public administration.

Some services provided through the Council benefit both the public and private sectors. For example, the Council annually publishes multi-family housing surveys for each of the six counties, as well as county economic profiles and economic activity reports. The Council also provides geographic information system computer mapping products and other types of demographic and economic information on the region in response to both public and private requests. Loans for expansion of business and industrial firms are also available through the Council's Revolving Loan Fund.

INFORMATION SERVICES

The Information Services Division uses the latest technology, equipment and resources to provide timely, accurate and relevant information to local government and private sector decision makers in the region. The division's main functions fall into the categories of data services, geographic information systems (GIS) and telecommunications. The data services and GIS areas collect, maintain, analyze and distribute information. The telecommunications area, using *APPnet*, an on-line network, provides connectivity among the suppliers and users of information.

The Data Services staff maintains an extensive demographic and economic database for the region's six counties and makes the information available to representatives of government and business. In order to best serve the needs of our clients, we produce a variety of reports, including:

Economic Profiles - Reports published annually for each county covering:

- Demographic trends and forecasts
- Economic conditions

Economic Activity Reports - An inventory of major commercial and industrial development activity for each county published quarterly.

Multi-Family Housing Surveys - Annual publication for each county. Detailed information on apartment and condominium properties:

- Names, location, bedroom composition, square footage, rental rates, amenities, etc.

The Data Services staff also fields statistical requests and provides consultation in response to questions concerning:

- Data availability and use
- Census data and documents
- Maps
- Custom demographic profiles
- Site location assistance

The GIS staff maintains a Regional Geographic Information System Center. As part of a state-wide GIS data network with the S. C. Department of Commerce, USC, and other state agencies, access is available to a wide range of digital databases, including map layers of major road systems, hydrography, water and sewer systems, industrial locations, and other information. The 1990 Census TIGER files are also resident on the system.

The GIS staff provides GIS training, technical assistance, data distribution, and completes mapping-related projects. A Regional Geographic Information System Committee has been established, which meets quarterly for the purpose of sharing information and guiding GIS work.
