# MINUTES, OCONEE COUNTY COUNCIL MEETING

The regular meeting of the Oconee County Council was held Tuesday, June 3, 1997 at 7:00 pm in Council Chambers with all Council Members and the County Attorney present.

The meeting was called to order by Supervisor Call to - Chairman Orr who welcomed the guests and media.

The invocation was given by Mr. Timms.

Mrs. Hughes made a motion, seconded by Mr. Hamilton, approved 5 - 0 that the minutes of the regular meeting held May 20, 1997 be adopted as printed.

Ms. Burrell made a motion, seconded by Mrs. Hughes, approved 4 - 0 (Mr. Timms abstaining) that the minutes of special meeting held May 27, 1997 be adopted as printed.

Upon recommendation of Mr. Robert Winchester, Sewer Commission Superintendent & Mr. Howard Adams, Chairman, Mr. Thomas made a motion, seconded by Ms. Burrell that the attached proposed 1997-98 Sewer Commission Budget be adopted.

Mr. Hamilton made a motion, seconded by Ms. Burrell, approved 5 - 0 that the motion be amended to include an expression of appreciation to the Sewer Commission Members for their hard work and dedication.

Also upon recommendation of Mr. Wilson & Ms. Dillard, Ms. Burrell made a motion, seconded by Mrs. Hughes, approved 5 - 0 that the bid for food for the Law Enforcement Center be awarded on the low bid per item basis as delineated on the attached bid sheet:

After a brief discussion, Mr. Hamilton made a motion, seconded by Mrs. Hughes, approved 5 - 0 that the county initiate action regarding the Newry Sewer problem by asking the SC Appalachian Council of Governments to submit grant requests to the state and the Abney Foundation for the renovation of the Newry Sewer system.

Newry Sewer

Mr. Thomas, Chairman, Roads & Transportation Committee, informed those present that revisions to Ordinance 82-14 and Ordinance 91-9 were on hold temporarily, he also expressed the desire for two (2) priority lists, one (1) for roadways that have been in the county system for a long time and

one (1) for roadways that have been recently accepted.

Roads

Mr. Orr assigned the proposed Land Use Plan to a committee comprised of all Council Members with Mr. Hamilton serving as chairman.

Land Use

Council also went on record commending the Planning Commission for the work they had done regarding the Land Use Plan.

Mr. Hamilton stated he would like to meet July 15, 1997 at 2:00 pm in Council Chambers to discuss the plan and would like for Council to consider the following regarding the plan:

- (1) That the long range and short range goals not be separated.
- (2) That the long range goal number 2 on page 51 of the plan which states "While the most immediate need is for the enactment of land use restrictions in the airport service area, the governing body of Oconee County shall have the option to enact such other regulations consistent with applicable law as are necessary and appropriate for the protection of health, safety and welfare in other areas of Oconee County be deleted from the plan.
- (3) Oconee County will continue to support economic and industrial development and Oconee County will seek high quality, environmentally sound growth for new and existing business and industry, both domestic and international be combined as one goal.
- (4) The map be delineated as a Projected Future Land Use Map and that it further be delineated in bold print as non binding and non regulatory.

Mr. Timms made a motion, seconded by Mr. seconded by Mr. seconded by Mr. Hamilton, approved 5 - 0 that Resolution 97-6 "A RESOLUTION HONORING MS. NAN JONES AS TEACHER OF THE YEAR OF THE YEAR" and Resolution 97-7, A RESOLUTION HONORING MS. KATHERINE OVERCAMP, 1997 ORATORICAL WINNER" be adopted on first and final reading.

Mrs. Hughes made a motion, seconded by Mr. Hamilton, approved 5 - 0 that Supervisor-Chairman Orr be given the authority to enter into JTPA contracts for departments that request summer employees through this agency. The county is not responsible for any expenses for these employees.

Mr. Orr appointed Mrs. Hughes & Mr. Hamilton to represent Council on the committee to select architectural firms to be interviewed for the Seneca Health Clinic.

Mr. Hamilton made a motion, seconded by Mr. Thomas, approved 5 - 0 that the county proceed with examination of proposals received for property and liability insurance and worker's compensation.

Mr. Thomas made a motion, seconded by Mr. Timms, approved 5 - 0 that due to Rosa Clark not receiving their proposed budget amount in time to appeal that they be allowed to appeal just prior to the public hearing for the 1997-98 proposed budget.

Mr. Orr announced a meeting of the Highway 11 Committee Tuesday, June 17, 1997 at 1:00 pm in Council Chambers.

Mrs. Hughes made a motion, seconded by Ms. Burrell, approved 5 - 0 that Council go into executive session for the purpose of discussing contractual matters and enforcement acts by a state agency.

When open session resumed, there was no action taken.

# COMMENTS RELATED TO OCONEE COUNTY ATAX GUIDE SHEET

The eligibility of the Oconee Community Theatre, Inc. and the proposed Oconee Community Center falls under the following categories ( as listed on the Guide Sheet ):

#2 Promotion of the arts and cultural events

The stated purposes of the facility are to provide exhibit, display and program space for arts, crafts, historical and cultural events within Oconee County and, in addition, provide a performing area not only for the Oconee Community Theatre and its related Youth Theatre and Drama Workshop, but also for touring groups of professional performers and others.

#3 Construction of infrastructure for civic and cultural events.

Other than for normal and usual service area setasides, the entirety of the 31,000 plus square foot facility is dedicated to serving civic and cultural events. Even excluding areas dedicated to storage, workshops, public facilites and the like, there remains in excess of 21,000 square feet which is available for civic, cultural, community, social, corporate or other groups.

When fully operational, and with the completion of the landscaping program, including that for the plaza on North Second Street and the main grass/garden/eating area on the East side of the building--adjacent to the City PArking Lot, we will have created a "park-like" atmosphere around the proposed facility. Additionally, during the times of arts, cultural, historic, crafts and other events and/or exhibits, restroom facilities will be open to the public on the main and lower levels.

# OCONEE COMMUNITY THEATRE, INC. Notes to Financial Statements June 30, 1996 and 1995

Oconee Community Theatre, Inc. is a non-profit organization and has been granted income tax exempt status under Section 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code of the United States of America since August 1979. The Theatre's primary function is to produce staged theatrical performances for the benefit of the residents of Oconee County, South Carolina.

# Note 1 - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The financial statements of the Theatre have been prepared and presented on the accrual basis of accounting. The significant accounting policies followed are described below to enhance the usefulness of the financial statements to the reader.

#### Fund Accounting

In order to account for funds according to their sources and uses, the accounts of the Theatre are maintained in accordance with the principles of fund accounting. The seven funds utilized by the Theatre are as follows:

- Unrestricted fund, which represents the portion of expendable funds that are available for the support of current Theatre operations.
- Investment fund, which represents the portion of excess unrestricted funds and
  donations received toward the construction of a new theatre and community complex,
  that have been placed in various investment vehicles.
- Advertising fund, which accounts for the net revenues and expenses of the Theatre attributed directly to use of advertising media. There are no restrictions placed on the use of these funds.
- Youth theatre wing fund, which accounts for the net revenues and related expenses of the youth theatre which began operations in fiscal 1996. There are no restrictions placed on the use of these funds by the donors.
- Concessions fund, accounts for the net revenues and related expenses of the Theatre's making concessions available to patrons during performances. There are no restrictions placed on this fund. This fund began operations during fiscal 1996.
- Utica assets fund, which accounts for fixed assets and related liabilities currently in
  use and funds collected for future capital expenditures during fiscal 1995. There are
  no restrictions placed on these funds. During fiscal 1996, fixed assets and funds
  collected relating to the building of a new theatre have been accounted for in the
  Townville Street Building Fund.
- Townville Street building fund, accounts for all capital expenditures toward the construction of a new theatre and community center complex in downtown Seneca, South Carolina. Donations are restricted for the construction of the new complex and have been maintained in the investment fund until they are required for capital purchases. This fund began during fiscal 1996.

# Fixed Assets and Depreciation

Uses of operating funds for fixed asset aquisitions and debt service payments, not related to the contruction of the theatre and community complex, are accounted for as transfers to the building fund. Depreciation of buildings and equipment is provided over the estimated useful lives of the respective assets on a straight-line basis.

The Theatre purchased one limited partnership unit on March 11, 1994 from J&B Brookstone, LP upon approval of the Board of Directors. There is no expiration to this investment, and the 11% monthly distribution is gauranteed for six years. Effective March 26, 1996, J&B Brookstone, LP completed refinancing of mortgages it maintains on real estate. As a result, \$30,520.03 of partnership capital was returned to the Theatre. The remaining \$69,479.97 is invested in Grand Court Life, LP which assumed the obligations to the limited partners of J&B Brookstone, LP. Both of the partnerships are invested in retirement community real estate.

Of the \$30,520.03 return of capital from J&B Brookstone, LP, \$30,000.00 is invested in a secured note payable with American Alarm Associates I, LLC. The note is secured by alarm monitoring contracts. Each alarm monitoring contract provides \$20.00 to \$65.00 in monthly revenues of 36 to 60 months to the partnership.

On August 23, 1995, the Theatre invested in a 12% secured note with Security Alarm Financing Equity I, LP. The note matures on June 1, 2000 and is secured by alarm monitoring contracts.

### Note - 4 Pledges

The Theatre is agressively seeking donations for the construction of a theatre and community center on land which the Theatre owns in downtown Seneca, South Carolina. The following donations have been expressly committed to the Theatre for this purpose.

On June 30, 1994, the Theatre received a committment from the City Council of the City of Seneca, South Carolina for \$375,000.00 payable at \$75,000.00 per year. The committment is conditioned upon the formation of a legal authority which will retain ownership of the constructed facility. The legal authority has not been formed and the pledge is not recorded in the Theatre's books of account.

# SPECIAL MEDICAL NEEDS SHELTERING AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT, entered into this	, by the participating parties hereto:
Oconee Memorial Hospital, Oconee County Emergence	y Preparedness, Appalachia I Public Health
District, and the Oconee Chapter of the American Red	Cross.

WHEREAS, each of the parties hereto desire to provide mutual sheltering of patients and residents for each other wherein a disastrous event requires one or the other's emergency evacuation and,

WHEREAS, such sheltering agreements are authorized by the authority of :

- A. Oconee County Ordinance 80-13 dated December 22, 1980.
- B. South Carolina Legislative Act Number 199, May 30, 1979.
- C. Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act, Sub Chapter 6, Public Law 103-337, Title VI, October 5, 1994.

WHEREAS, each party certifies that Sheltering, Transportation, and Staffing Plans are a part of an Emergency Evacuation Plan.

NOW THEREFORE, the parties do mutually agree as follows:

### ARTICLE 1 - TERM

This agreement shall commence at \_\_\_\_\_ and automatically renew annually as long as the signing officials and operations remain the same subject to the rights of each party to terminate sooner as provided herein.

# **ARTICLE II - SERVICES**

- A. In the event of a disaster which requires the emergency evacuation and sheltering of patients or residents, all parties hereto agree that at the request of any party hereto the others will accommodate, as is possible, patients and/or residents and act as a sheltering facility as long as the respective officials of the sheltering jurisdiction, in their discretion, determine such persons can reasonably be accommodated at the time without placing their own community in jeopardy.
- B. Since time is of the essence during emergencies as herein referred to, the authority to actuate emergency evacuation or provide sheltering in accordance with the terms and conditions of this agreement shall be delegated to the chief official or acting chief official of the organization which are the parties hereto.
- C. The evacuating party shall be responsible for the delivery of patients and/or residents, their continuity of care during evacuation, and appropriate transitional or permanent staffing as necessary upon arrival in their facility. Oconee Memorial Hospital as a sheltering facility will provide primary staffing for sheltered patients in their facilities.
- D. Upon arrival at the sheltering location, the evacuating party shall report to the Nursing Supervisor or other acting chief official or his/her designee of the sheltering facility to assure completion of all aspects of the transfer.

- E. All equipment, records, and personnel evacuated, transferred, or loaned hereunder shall be returned as soon as practical upon the cessation of the emergency.
- F. Oconee Memorial Hospital as a sheltering facility will provide food and bedding for all sheltered patients.
- G. The Red Cross will provide assistance, as available, with registration, administrative duties, etc. The Red Cross may, if resources are available, provide assistance with feeding.
- H. SC DHEC will augment services as needed and as resources are available.

# **ARTICLE III - PAYMENT**

No charges shall be assessed for services rendered by any party hereto.

# **ARTICLE IV - TERMINATION**

This agreement may be terminated by any party upon at least thirty (30) days prior written notice to the other.

# **ARTICLE V - INTEGRATION**

This agreement contains the entire understanding between the parties, and there are no understandings or representations not set forth or incorporated by reference herein. No subsequent modifications of this Agreement shall be of any force or effect unless in writing signed by the parties.

AN ORDINANCE TO PROVIDE FOR ASSISTANCE BY OCONEE COUNTY IN PROVIDING OFFICE SPACE FOR THE APPALACHIAN COUNCIL OF GOVERNMENTS THROUGH THE JOINT ACQUISITION WITH THE OTHER COUNTY MEMBERS MEMBER COUNTIES OF THE COG OF AN UNDIVIDED INTEREST IN A BUILDING TO BE CONSTRUCTED ON CERTAIN REAL PROPERTY, THE LEASING OF THE BUILDING TO THE COG, THE ENTRY INTO CERTAIN AGREEMENTS WITH RESPECT TO THE SUCH ACTIVITIES TO INCLUDE THE A LEASE, AN ADMINISTRATION AGREEMENT, A TRUST AGREEMENT AND ANY OTHER AGREEMENTS NECESSARY OR APPROPRIATE IN CONNECTION THEREWITH.

WHEREAS, Oconee County, South Carolina (the "County") together with Anderson, Cherokee, Greenville, Pickens and Spartanburg are the county members (the "County Members") member counties (the "Member Counties") of the Appalachian Council of Governments (the "COG"); and

WHEREAS the County and each of the other County Members Member Counties is empowered (i) to acquire real property by purchase or gift, to acquire tangible personal property, and to lease, sell or otherwise dispose of real and personal property; (ii) to make and execute contracts; and (iii) to appropriate funds, loan, lease or sell facilities, equipment and supplies to the COG; and

WHEREAS Article VIII Section 13 of the South Carolina Constitution and Section 4-9-41 of the Code of Laws of South Carolina, 1976, as amended, the County is authorized to provide for the joint administration of any function and exercise of powers with other counties; and

WHEREAS, the COG has requested the assistance of the Member Counties in the provision of suitable office space for the operations of the COG through a program involving the construction of a building on certain land heretofore acquired by the COG and the entry into a lease thereof to the COG; and

WHEREAS it appears to the County that such a program will be of benefit to the COG and the County through the long-term reduction of costs;

NOW THEREFORE be it ordained by the County Council of Oconee County as follows:

- Section 1. <u>Basic Authorization</u>. The County is hereby authorized to join with the other Member Counties in the leasing from the COG of the land described on Exhibit A hereto (the "Site") and the construction of thereon of an approximately \_\_\_\_\_\_ square foot building (the "Building") for lease to the COG all as more fully set forth herein.
- Section 2. County Share. The County shall pay a share (the "County Share") of the cost of the Building and be entitled to a like share of the rent therefrom and, in the event of a sale or other disposition of the Building, a like share of the proceeds of such disposition. The County Share shall be 6.43% and the amount to be contributed towards the cost of the Building is \$54,650. The County shall be under no obligation to pay any amounts in excess of the County Share.
- Section 3. <u>Joint Administration of Project; Trust Agreement.</u> In order to facilitate the joint exercise of powers and the joint administration of the construction of the Building, the entry into the lease of the Building to the COG as provided in section 5 hereof and the administration of said Lease, the County is hereby authorized to enter into a trust agreement (the "Trust Agreement") among the County and the and

the other County Members Member Counties and \_\_\_\_\_\_ as trustee (the "Trustee") specifying the terms pertaining to the deposit and use of the County Share, the construction of the Building and the terms of the Lease. The Trust Agreement shall be in substantially the form before the Council at the third reading of this ordinance, with such changes, amendments and alterations as are, in the opinion of the County Attorney, consistent herewith.

Section 4. Design and Construction. The COG is hereby authorized to take such action as it deems appropriate to enter into a contract for the design of the Building, to enter into other contracts for services relating to design and engineering and to provide for the construction of the Building; provided, however, that the COG shall not obligate the County beyond the County Share and the COG shall enter into no contract unless the sum of the funds available to it from funds on hand, the contributions of all the Member Counties and the County (which such sums all the Member Counties have agreed to pay) and other funds legally available will be sufficient to complete the Building, including the provision of such contingency as is appropriate therefor. The COG shall be solely liable under all contracts for the construction or acquisition of the Building or any part thereof for any cost overruns or other expenses associated with such contracts. No further action shall be required by the County Council to approve any action of the COG taken pursuant hereto.

Section 5. <u>Lease</u>. The Trustee is hereby authorized to execute and deliver a lease with the COG (the "Lease") providing for the occupancy of the Building by the COG and the payment of rent.

Section 6. General Authorization. The Chairman of the County Council, the County Administrator and the Clerk to County Council, for and on behalf of the County, are hereby each authorized and directed to do any and all things necessary to effect the execution and delivery of the Trust Agreement and the performance of all obligations of the County under and pursuant thereto; and the Trustee is hereby authorized to receive and receipt for the proceeds of the County Share from the County and to hold, invest and disburse all funds held by it in accordance with the provisions of the Trust Agreement.

Section 7. Severability. The provisions of this ordinance are hereby declared to be separable and if any section, phrase or provision shall for any reason be declared by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unenforceable, such declaration shall not affect the validity of the remainder of the sections, phrases and provisions hereunder.

Section 8. Effective Date. All orders, resolutions, ordinances and parts thereof in conflict herewith are, to the extent of such conflict, hereby repealed and this ordinance shall take effect and be in full force from and after its passage and approval.
