MINUTES, OCONEE COUNTY COUNCIL MEETING

The regular meeting of the Oconee County Council was held Tuesday, March 2, 1999 at 7:00 PM in Council Chambers with all Council Members and the County Attorney present.

Press:

Members of the press notified (by mail): Journal/Tribune, Keowee Courier, Westminster News, Anderson Independent, Greenville News, WGOG Radio, WSNW Radio, WCCP Radio, WPEK Radio, The Times Upstate, Northland Cablevision, WYFF TV, WSPA TV & WLOS TV.

Members of the press present: Laura Gabrels – Anderson Independent, Ashton Hester – Keowee Courier & Brian Fulkerson – Journal/Tribune.

Call to Order:

The meeting was called to order by Vice Chairman Hamilton who conducted the meeting. Mr. Hamilton welcomed the guests and media.

Invocation:

Mr. Thomas gave the invocation.

Minutes:

Mr. Thomas made a motion, seconded by Mrs. Hughes, approved 4 – 0 that the minutes of the regular meeting held February 16, 1999 be adopted as printed.

Council on Aging:

By consensus of Council, Mr. Douglas A. Wright, Acting Executive Director, Council on Aging Addressed Council regarding their agency purchasing the building they are presently housed in located at 101 Perry Avenue Seneca, SC. Mr. Timms made a motion, seconded by Mr. Hall, approved 4 – 0 that this request be referred to the Purchasing, Contracting, Real Estate, Building & Grounds Committee.

Public Hearing Regarding Ordinance 99-1:

The first agenda item was a public hearing to receive written and/or oral comments regarding the proposed Ordinance 99-1, "1998-99 OCONEE COUNTY SUPPLEMENTAL APPROPRIATION ORDINANCE".

Mrs. Lombard, Finance Director, informed Council the following changes had been made to the proposed ordinance since second reading:

After Mrs. Lombard explained these changes, Mr. Hamilton asked for oral and/or written comments regarding the proposed ordinance. There were no oral or written comments from the audience.

Mr. Thomas made a motion, seconded by Mr. Timms, approved 4 – 0 that Ordinance 99-1, "1998-99 OCONEE COUNTY SUPPLEMENTAL APPROPRIATION ORDINANCE" be adopted on third and final reading to include the changes as explained by Mrs. Lombard.

Sewer Commission:

Upon recommendation of Mr. Robert Winchester, Superintendent, Sewer Commission, Mr. Hall made a motion, seconded by Mr. Timms, approved 4 – 0 that the attached supplemental budget for the Sewer Commission be adopted.

Mr. Winchester informed Council the selection of an engineering firm for the Colonel's Fork Flow station would be removed from the agenda.

Aeronautics:

Mr. Timms, Chairman, Purchasing, Contracting, Real Estate, Building & Grounds Committee, informed Council it was the recommendation of the committee that Council endorse the concept of looking into financial arrangements to get bids for hangars at the airport in accordance with the purchasing policies and procedures. This recommendation was adopted 4 – 0.

Fee-in-Lieu Policy:

Mr. Timms requested that a time around the first of April be scheduled for Council to discuss a fee-in-lieu of taxes policy for the county.

Greenbriar Subdivision:

To Mr. Timms inquiry, Mr. Cain, County Attorney, informed Council the matter of Greenbriar Subdivision was still in progress.

County Sewer:

Mr. Timms made a motion, seconded by Mr. Hall, approved 4 – 0 that Council create a committee comprised of a member of the Sewer Commission, Economic Development Commission, Planning Commission, a representative of Council (Mr. Timms volunteered to serve) and a technical advisor to study the feasibility of expanding the county sewer system.

Big Ridge Road:

Mr. Thomas, Chairman, Roads & Transportation Committee, informed Council the attorney for the plaintiff on Big Ridge Roadway had agreed to keep the roadway open if the county would cease maintenance of the roadway.

Old & New Business:

Mr. Hall made a motion, seconded by Mrs. Hughes, approved 4 – 0 that all agendas of regular Council Meetings include Old Business and New Business.

Executive Session:

Mr. Thomas made a motion, seconded by Mrs. Hughes, approved 4 – 0 that Council go into executive session for the purpose of discussing contractual matters and receipt of legal advise subject to attorney-client privilege.

Open Session:

(Support of Sewer Commission):

Mr. Thomas made a motion, seconded by Mr. Timms, approved 4 – 0 that Council go on record endorsing the action of the Oconee County Sewer Commission in legal proceedings against a contractor for breech of contract and negligence.

(Pending Litigation):

Mr. Cain, County Attorney, informed those present that Council had received a briefing regarding pending litigation.

(Item #15 on Agenda):

Council deemed it appropriate to postpone consideration of bids for roof renovations for Pine Street Administrative Offices until Monday, March 8, 1999 at 6:00 PM.

(Employee Alcohol & Drug Testing Policy):

Upon recommendation of the Council Clerk, Mrs. Hughes made a motion, seconded by Mr. Timms, approved 4 – 0 that Mr. Thomas A. Bright, HAYNSWORTH LAW FIRM be engaged to author an employee alcohol and drug testing policy for the county.

(Rural Fire):

Mr. Thomas made a motion, seconded by Mr. Hall, approved 4 – 0 that the Rural Fire Commission be invited to attend the March 16, 1999 Council Meeting in order for Council to get a better understanding of the structure of that department and their needs.

Ordinance 99-2

Upon recommendation of Mr. Henry Gordon & Mr. Tony Klutz, Mr. Timms made a motion, seconded by Mr. Hall, approved 4 – 0 that Ordinance 99-2, “AN ORDINANCE TO ESTABLISH FOR OCONEE COUNTY PROVISIONS TO IDENTIFY AND MONITOR HAZARDOUS CHEMICAL/WASTES TO PROTECT THE WELL BEING AND HEALTH OF OCONEE COUNTY RESIDENTS” be adopted on third and final reading to include the changes as delineated by Mr. Gordon.

ATAX Committee:

Upon recommendation of Mr. Andy Davis of the ATAX Committee, Mr. Thomas made a motion, seconded by Mrs. Hughes, approved 4 – 0 that an ATAX Grant in the amount of \$4,000 to the Seneca Chamber of Commerce be adopted.

Mrs. Hughes made a motion, seconded by Mr. Thomas, approved 4 – 0 that \$7,000 allocated to the county September 26, 1996 for landscaping of the “WELCOME TO OCONEE COUNTY” signs be credited back to the ATAX Committee as per the attached letter.

County Museum:

Mr. L. G. Moss & Mrs. Louise Bell addressed Council regarding a county museum, they suggested that a steering committee select a site for the museum and they also petitioned Council not to raze the old motor pool building until a plan is developed to start a museum.

Mrs. Hughes made a motion, seconded by Mr. Timms that in conjunction with Ordinance 85-1 that the old motor pool building, otherwise known as the old Smith Chevrolet building remain unmolested until such time a decision is made by County Council as to its use.

Mr. Thomas made a motion, seconded by Mr. Hall, approved 4 – 0 that the motion be amended to include the Rock Building adjacent to the courthouse.

The motion, as amended, was then adopted 4 – 0.

Mr. Timms requested that the Arts & Historical Commission attend the next Council Meeting to discuss funding for such a museum.

Tourism Committee:

Mr. Don Moss addressed Council regarding the need for a Tourism Committee in Oconee County, Mr. Moss informed Council that tourist brought \$581,000,000 into the State of South Carolina last year impacting 13,570 jobs and contributing \$48,000,000 in local and state taxes. He further informed Council that Oconee County is centrally located between Asheville and Atlanta, which attracts many travelers. (See attachment)

Mr. Jerry Alexander of the Pendleton Historical Society expressed feelings that Council might want Mr. Hurley Badders to address this matter as it may not be necessary to have a separate committee for this purpose.

Rock Crusher:

Upon recommendation of Ms. Marianne Dillard, Purchasing Agent, Mr. Thomas made a motion, seconded by Mr. Timms, approved 4 – 0 that the bid for a submersible pump for the Rock Crusher be awarded to Interstate Equipment Company who was low bid at \$15,400. (See attached bid sheet)

Groundwater Sampling:

Upon recommendation of Mr. Jack Hirst, Solid Waste Director & Ms. Dillard, Mr. Timms made a motion, seconded by Mr. Thomas, approved 4 – 0 that the bid for sampling analysis of groundwater be awarded to Goldie & Associates who was low bid at \$17,460. (See attached bid sheet)

Aeronautics:

Upon recommendation of Mr. Marion Lyles, Airport Manager & Ms. Dillard, Mrs. Hughes made a motion, seconded by Mr. Hall, approved 4 – 0 that the bid for lease of maintenance hangar at the airport be awarded to Performance Air, Inc. at \$350.00 per month with the county receiving 3% of gross sales up to \$10,000 per month, 4% up to \$15,000 per month and 5% over \$15,000 per month. (See attached bid sheet)

Chau Ram Park:

Upon recommendation of Ms. Dillard, Mr. Hall made a motion, seconded by Mr. Timms, approved 4 – 0 that the bid for a composting toilet for Chau Ram Park be awarded to Clivus Multrum US who was the only successful bidder. (See attached bid sheet)

(Resolutions 99-2 & 99-3):

Mr. Timms made a motion, seconded by Mr. Thomas, approved 4 – 0 that Resolution 99-2, “A RESOLUTION HONORING THE LATE MARVIN SINGLETON CELY” and Resolution 99-3, “A RESOLUTION HONORING KENNETH F. WILLIAMS” be adopted on first and final reading.

(Road Department Contingency Funds):

Upon recommendation of Mrs. Phyllis E. Lombard, Finance Director, Mr. Thomas made a motion, seconded by Mr. Times, approved 4 – 0 that \$35,000 be taken from contingency to repair a bulldozer for the road department and \$5,500 be taken from contingency to repair a back hoe for the road department.

(DAVCO Property):

Upon recommendation of the County Attorney, Mr. Thomas made a motion, seconded by Mr. Timms, approved 4 – 0 that the funds for the purchase of the DAVCO Building be placed in an escrow account until the matter of another option on the property, which is good until September is settled.

(Sewer Commission Appointment):

Mr. Timms made a motion, seconded by Mr. Hall, approved 4 – 0 that Mr. Howard Adams be reappointed to represent the City of Westminster on the Sewer Commission.







Heritage tourism in S.C. brings \$581 million to the state

Approximately 2,700,000 heritage visitors travel to South Carolina destinations annually, spending an average of \$214 per visitor per trip. Altogether, they spend an estimated \$581 million annually, which directly impacts 13,570 jobs and contributes \$48 million in local and state taxes.

Overall, South Carolina has a 1.8% share of the U.S. heritage travel market, ranking 20th among the 50 states. Considering the state's enormously rich, diverse and well-known heritage, great opportunities exist to develop this market more extensively.

- About one-fourth of American adults—53.6 million—annually take a trip to visit a historic place or museum
- Forty percent of the historic visitors in the U.S. visit the South, and 34% live in the South
- Nationally, heritage visitors spend 60% more than visitors in general

South Carolina's distinctive history and culture is one of its greatest natural resources. As author William Faulkner said, "the past is not even past," and nowhere is this more true than in the heart of the American South. From the conflicts and accomplishments of South Carolina's past flows a rich heritage of houses, timebound sites, stories, family histories and mellowed beauty that speaks volumes to today's tourists.

By comparing heritage visitors with South Carolina visitors overall, this report draws a profile of the unique characteristics of the heritage market segment. It also reports on the U.S. heritage traveler market and its implications for the future of the South Carolina travel market. The purpose of this report is to help the South Carolina tourism industry gain a better understanding of the ways to market and service the important heritage visitor segment.

Competing for Heritage Tourists

The Tourism Works for America Council reports that there were 65,604 properties in the National Register of Historic Places in 1996 and 14,000 bed and breakfast inns located in renovated historic buildings. Designated historic districts include another 850,000 historic properties.

Destinations of all types are developing heritage tourism products. Las Vegas has introduced a series of culturally focused tours. In Virginia alone there are over 15 new heritage focused thematic itineraries under development. Missouri's Barn Again, an African-America tour of restored barns and farm-life in rural parts of the state, has met with award-winning success.

Noted early regional projects such as the Fox-Wisconsin Rivers Heritage Corridor (the 17th Century route of explorers Marquette and Jolliet), the Lac du Flambeau Chippewa Reservation Heritage (Indian community), and the Ethnic Settlement Trail (19th Century settlements) have paved the way for new heritage projects such as the South Carolina Heritage Corridor.

Group tour operators report strong interest in Black history, storytellers of local history, agricultural history, soft nature-based adventure, and grandparents/grandchildren tours, with shopping and nighttime entertainment components added to the package.

A survey of America's 20.6 million international visitors in 1995 showed that 63% enjoyed city sightseeing (often including historic sites), 31% visited historical places and 20% enjoyed guided tours.

Taking tourists back to a slower, less calculated lifestyle

Heritage tourism seeks to draw visitors to historic and cultural sites. Aging baby boomers are especially interested in their cultural and historic roots. According to Rutgers University's Center for Urban Policy Research, baby boomers have greater interest than their parents in things historic and in preservation. In addition, people behind historic places are banking on motor-coach travelers, primarily adults aged 65 and older, to also enjoy this niche. This consumer interest has in turn attracted major corporate sponsors to support Heritage tourism, such as American Express Travel and Alamo Rent A Car.

Entertainment expert Michael Jenkins calls historic interest one of the major trends driving early 21st Century entertainment development, along with nature and environmental trends. He notes that it is human nature to "prefer to go back in time before going forward," explaining why historic and futuristic attractions exist side by side at Disney and similar venues. Jenkins, a key speaker at the 1998 South Carolina Governor's Conference on Tourism, reminds tourist developers that visitors prefer close-at-home escapes, want to be treated as individuals, value nostalgia and place a premium on quality service. Heritage tourism helps them experience a little of the slower, less calculated lifestyles that once characterized American culture.

Heritage visitors are easier for communities to serve because they are more educated, more environmentally aware and more sensitive to unique and fragile community cultures. They are interested in the authentic, real, natural and interesting and do not need or want contrived offerings or invented activities. They want to learn about, understand and experience unique heritage and local cultures. Heritage visitors seek a combination of education, entertainment, engagement and experience.

Equally important in the economic sense, heritage tourism preserves a region's character, instills local pride and generates dollars. It allows even small towns to receive the benefits of tourism and economic progress. Rural communities with attractive cultural, scenic and historical resources are one of the fastest growing tourism destinations.

Heritage tourism experts point out that communities need to develop a critical mass of activities around historic sites, including services like restaurants and shops. Because the public is sophisticated and knowledgeable, they have to be sold on what is particularly unique about the site. Good transportation access and directional signage are important, as are cultural-tourism partnerships.

Among the most popular destinations for U.S. and foreign heritage tourists are battlefields, of which South Carolina has some of the best in quality and historic importance.

Heritage Tourism in America

In August 1997 the Travel Industry Association of America published a detailed study of American travelers who participate in historic and cultural activities. It revealed that over one-fourth of U.S. adults, or 53.6 million, took at least one trip in the previous year to visit an historic place or museum as a trip activity. It also uncovered significant overlap between cultural travelers and historic travelers.


Over 10 million Americans reported to TIAA that visiting a museum or historic place is the primary reason for their trip. Personal enjoyment is the major motivation for 44% of the historic travelers. Personal education and education of children are the next two most popular motivations.

Comparing the seasons, spring and summer attract a higher share of historic travelers, while fall and winter attract a higher share of cultural travelers. July is an especially popular travel month for historic travelers, followed by August, June and April. Thirty-nine percent of historic travel occurs in the summer, followed by 25% in the spring, 22% in the fall and 14% in the winter. Historic travel tails off in November and December across America.

The majority of historic travelers are on a pleasure trip, although a significant 16 percent visit historic sites in conjunction with business trips. Five percent of historic travelers are attending conventions at the time of their historic site visits. For pleasure travelers, historic site visits often go hand in hand with visiting entertainment sites (33%) and with visiting friends and relatives (32%).

Where S.C.'s Heritage visitors live

Eighty-six percent of the heritage visitors coming to South Carolina destinations are from out-of-state. Sixteen percent (over 400,000) hail from North Carolina and 13% (over 300,000) from Georgia. Fifty-seven percent come from longer distances, such as Florida (5%), Virginia (5%), Ohio (5%), New York (5%), Tennessee (4%), and Alabama (4%).



Atlanta and Charlotte top the list of the 11 metropolitan areas where 54% of South Carolina's heritage visitors live. These geographic areas of dominant influence (ADIs) differ for heritage visitors and for South Carolina visitors in general.

The age, income and other characteristics of S.C.'s Heritage travelers

Historic travelers, more than cultural travelers and travelers overall, journey by air. One-fourth are air travelers. Sixty-one percent visit the historic site in their own vehicle.

Children are more often included on historic site visits than on cultural site visits. The average historic travel party size is two. Historic travelers are less likely to travel alone. Nationally, eight percent of historic travelers are part of group tours, which are very popular among historic tourists.

Historic travelers are more likely to stay overnight than travelers overall—91% to 82%. In contrast, day trips are more common among cultural travelers and overall travelers.

Historic travelers take longer trips—5.2 nights away from home versus 3.3 for overall travelers. In fact, 35% of historic travelers stay away from home 4 to 9 nights and 15% stay away 10 or more nights.

Commercial lodging—hotels, motels and bed and breakfasts—is far more popular with historic travelers (61%) than with overall travelers (42%). Thirty-one percent of historic travelers stay in private homes, usually with friends and family. Only small numbers stay in RVs, tents, timeshares, condos or have no overnight stay.

On average, historic travelers spent a mean amount of \$688 per trip, far more than the \$373 per trip for non-historic travel or the \$425 per trip for total travel overall. A whopping 20% of historic trips spend \$1000 or more.

Historic travelers engage in an average 2.7 activities per trip, compared to 1.1 activities for non-*(continued on next page)*

The demographic profile of the households of South Carolina's heritage visitors largely mirrors the characteristics of state visitors overall, except that significantly more are age 55 and over. Nearly half have household incomes of \$50,000 or more, over half the household heads completed college and over half are managers or professionals.

- 16% (vs. 23% total South Carolina visitors) have a head of household under age 35,
- 43% (vs. 45%) are age 35 to 54;
- 41% (vs. 33%) are 55 and over;
- 92% (vs. 90%) are Caucasian and 5% (vs. 7%) are African-American;
- 46% (vs. 45%) have a household income of at least \$50,000,
- 17% (vs. 21%) have a household income of \$75,000 and over;
- 55% (vs. 54%) have a head of household with a bachelors or post graduate degree;
- 51% (vs. 50%) have a head of household in a managerial/professional occupation;
- 18% (vs. 16%) have a head of household who is retired;
- 52% (vs. 53%) have home computers; and
- 73% (vs. 72%) subscribe to cable service.

A PRIZM analysis of the households of South Carolina's heritage visitors indicates that many hail from small towns (T groups) and from high socio-economic groups (1 groups) in terms of education and affluence.

historic travelers. On nearly every activity, historic travelers have higher participation than travelers overall: shopping, outdoor recreation, beaches, park visitation, cultural events, amusement parks, and nightlife entertainment.

Nationally, golf is equally popular with historic travelers and with travelers overall. Gambling and sports events are marginally more popular with travelers overall than with historic travelers.

Notably, almost half of historic travelers enjoy shopping, and nearly one-third enjoy visitation to state and national parks.

Historic travelers are more likely to include multiple destinations in their itinerary. Almost half visit two or more states.

The South Atlantic both originates the most historic travelers (18%) and attracts the most (26%). The next largest market share—in terms of origination and destination—is the Pacific region, too geographically distant to compete for many of the same tourists as the South Atlantic.

Overall, the combined regions of the South originate 34% of historic travelers and play host to 40% of historic travelers.

Among historic travelers, the household head is an average 48 years old, is employed full-time, and typically attended college (79%). Over 50% completed college and 20% have post-graduate education. Forty-two percent are employed in professional or managerial positions, and 43% have children present in their household. Their median household income is \$43,503. Compared to the overall U.S. traveler household head, the *(continued on next page)*

In the table below, households of U.S. visitors to South Carolina's heritage sites are categorized by lifestyle and stage of life based on age, marital status, and children in the household. Substantially more couples make up heritage travelers than comprise state visitors overall.

Length of stay and other trip features


Heritage travel parties to South Carolina average 2.2 visitors and stay an average of 4.6 days. Twenty-three percent (23%) of heritage travel parties include at least one child.

Heritage visitors are more likely to use air transportation than total travelers to come to South Carolina (16% vs. 9%) and more likely to use rental cars (7%) as their secondary mode of transportation (versus 5%). Heritage visitors travel in group tours as often as total travelers to South Carolina (both 3%).

About 84% of Heritage visitors stay overnight on their South Carolina trips, compared to only 64% of South Carolina travelers in general. For their lodging, heritage visitors are most likely to stay in hotels (57%) or private homes (23%). Their use of condos is slightly higher than for travelers overall (12% vs. 9%). *(Percentages are based on total visitation, not overnight visitors only.)*

Heritage travel peaks in South Carolina during spring and summer.

historic traveler household head is somewhat older, more likely retired, more highly educated and more highly compensated.

S.C. Heritage Sites

The S.C. Department of Parks, Recreation and Tourism reports that the state's top draws among historic attractions include Patriots Point, Fort Sumter, Charles Towne Landing, Old Dorchester State Historic Site, S.C. State Museum, Cowpens National Battlefield, Kings Mountain State Park and Oconee State Historic Site.

Kings Mountain (1780) and Cowpens (1781) National Military Parks are considered by many historians to be the turning points of the American Revolutionary War. Two other recommended places with Revolutionary ties are Ninety Six National Historic Site and Historic Camden.

Civil War expert and writer Clint Johnson credits South Carolina with having three of the nation's top six Civil War sites: Fort Sumter, Boykin's Mill (the last battle in the state) and Port Royal where the Emancipation Proclamation was first read.


Historic site for historic site, Charleston can match any city in the nation. It was once the center of one of the richest cultures in history—the rice culture. Unlike Colonial Williamsburg and Greenfield Village, downtown Charleston is real and much like it was before the Union bombardment in the Civil War. And unlike Boston and other old cities, Charleston has kept its historic district intact without the intrusion of new modern structures. Instead, almost every old building has a modern function.

Heritage travel destinations & trip activities in South Carolina

The top S.C. destinations for Heritage visitors are Charleston (56%), Myrtle Beach (10%), Columbia (8%) and Hilton Head Island (8%).

Many of the heritage pleasure visitors to South Carolina are on trips to visit friends or relatives (26%), followed by entertainment purposes (24%). Besides visiting historic places and museums during their trip, these visitors enjoy shopping, beaches, state parks, cultural events/festivals, and outdoor recreation, e.g. hiking/fishing/hunting.



Heritage interest among South Carolina residents

In the South Carolina Recreation Participation and Preference Survey of 1994, 49 percent of South Carolina residents reported that they visited a historic site and 37% said they visited a museum. Participation was highest among children 12-17 (reflecting in-state school tours), followed by ages 30-45, 46-64, 18-29 and 65+. Female participation was higher than male for historic sites and roughly equal at museums.

International heritage travel to S.C.

Some 46 percent of overseas travelers to South Carolina, predominately from the U.K. and Germany, visit historical sites during their stay, making it their number one leisure activity.

Many of South Carolina's settlers migrated from the U.K. and Germany, creating a common cultural heritage still evident in many of the state's towns and cities. Historic Charleston is a preferred destination for more than a third of these visitors.

Marketing Heritage Tourism in S.C.

Among PRT's advertising strategies in the 1990s has been to tap into the growing trend of history/heritage travel. With unique historical sites statewide and continual events, this segment encourages travel not only during the state's peak summer season but year-round.

In fiscal year 1998/99, targeted media for history/heritage niche travel included a mix of special interest publications and travel or lifestyle magazines.

Small space black and white ads were placed in *Historic Traveler* and *Smithsonian* for both fall 1998 and spring 1999. Additionally, the state was listed in the travel directories of *Preservation* and *American Heritage* both seasons.

In SC PRT's 1997/98 advertising campaign, an eight page section with 50 percent advertising and 50 percent editorial was placed in *American Heritage* to provide additional reach of the history/heritage target audience.

The South Carolina Heritage Corridor And other notable heritage programs

The South Carolina National Heritage Corridor is a Congressionally designated national heritage area, one of only 16 in the nation. It is 240 miles in length and includes 14 counties, arching from the historic Charleston seaport to the Savannah River Freshwater Coast to the Blue Ridge Mountains. Its objectives are to generate 700,000 visitors and \$83.5 million in tourism revenue each year. Once is successful, the State plans to extend the initiative to other similarly important areas across the state in the form of other corridors.

The Heritage Corridor capitalizes on the uniqueness of this setting and culture:

- The culture of the Corridor is alive and vital.
- The region needs appropriate economic development to replace jobs lost in many communities.
- The local constituency is enthusiastic and ready, with nearly 1000 volunteers participating in the original grassroots planning process.
- The state recognizes and strongly supports tourism development.

By following two recommended routes, the Discovery Route and the Nature Route, Corridor visitors will learn of rice and indigo, pirates and patriots, slaves and freemen, cotton fields and mill villages, swamps and waterfalls, railroads and backroads, soul food and "pig-pickins," spirituals and bluegrass. Highlights include the Fort Hill home of John C. Calhoun, the S.C. Piedmont Harmony project preserving folk music traditions, the Park Seed and Greenwood Festival of Flowers, the River Oaks Arena for rodeos and concerts in Ware Shoals, the Agricultural Heritage Center in Blackville. Others include the Rayrode Daze Festival in Branchville, Denmark's Dane Theater, the Francis Beidler Forest, the ACE Basin (now featuring a triathlon), North Augusta's new 18-hole golf course on the Savannah River banks, the former Charleston naval base and the Ashley River plantations.

The Corridor became a physical reality in 1998. The state installed signage along the routes. The Wren House opened in the South Carolina Botanical Garden at Clemson University as one of four Discovery Centers. The first corridor-wide brochures were distributed. The state added the Corridor routes to its 1999 state highway maps. Over 1500 volunteers worked on the Corridor projects.

In another heritage trail venture, South Carolina and North Carolina are jointly promoting the Carolinas' Backcountry Trails that played significant roles in the Revolutionary War and American independence. South Carolina sites include Historic Camden, Ridgeway, Winnsboro, Landsford Canal State Park, Bethesda Presbyterian Church, Historic Brattonsville, Bethel Presbyterian Church, Kings Mountain National Military Park and Cowpens National Battlefield.

The Overmountain Victory National Historic Trail, administered by the National Park Service, a 300-mile-long car route, traces the route of frontier militia volunteers along their march to defeat the Loyalist army at Kings Mountain in 1780. It crosses South Carolina, North Carolina, Virginia and Tennessee. Kings Mountain and Cowpens in S.C. are major sites. In 1995, visitors in 15 Trail counties generated an estimated \$22.4 million total impact on local economies.

Recommendations

Programs such as the Heritage Corridor can extend South Carolina's share of the heritage tourism market substantially. They nurture the critical mass of activities and services that are needed around successful heritage sites, including restaurants, shops and entertainment. Given worthwhile venues, heritage tourists nationally have shown their willingness to stay longer in paid lodging, spend more money and support numerous activities beyond heritage ones.

Charleston has been a pioneer in demonstrating the effective economic benefits of genuine, authentic heritage sites. Other locations should emulate this model. Real history is literally around every corner in the state--in churches, battlefields, homes, mills and country stores. Hardly a single town lacks a quality museum.

Promoting the sites is very important. One example: How many people have ever heard of the National Park Service's Overmountain Victory National Historic Trail, whose two leading sites are in South Carolina?

Partnering is a concept discussed constantly in today's tourism market. Few niches are more suited for it than heritage tourism. Two key potential partnerships are between culture and heritage tourism, as demonstrated by the Heritage Corridor's Piedmont Harmony project, and between African-American travel and heritage travel. After all, South Carolina is "Ellis Island" to African-Americans. There is also a natural partnership with other genealogical interests. South Carolina once settled Mississippi and Texas, and it is the place these residents return to for their roots.

Historically, there has been much more interest in South Carolina in the Civil War than in the American Revolution, which South Carolinians largely helped win. Heritage tourism is bringing the earlier forgotten war into the spotlight, along with other remarkable success stories such as the early rice culture and the textile mill culture.

Sources and Methodology

SC Visitation, Demographics and Travel Characteristics






