The Oconee County Council met Tuesday, April 4, 2000 at 7:00 PM in Council Chambers, 415 South Pine Street, Walhalla, SC with all Council Members and the County Attorney present.

Call to Order:

The meeting was called to order by Supervisor-Chairman Orr who welcomed the guests and media.

Invocation:

The invocation was given by Mr. Timms.

Public Hearing Regarding Ordinance 2000-04:

The first item on the agenda was a public hearing regarding Ordinance 2000-04, "AN AMENDED ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE EXECUTION AND DELIVERY OF A LEASE AGREEMENT BY AND AMONG OCONEE COUNTY, SOUTH CAROLINA, AS LESSOR, PINE RIVER PLASTICS, INC. Probate Judge Sandra Orr addressed Council regarding space needs at the courthouse, the Probate Judge's Office is willing to move into the basement of the courthouse for space.

Attorney Bill Derrick addressed Council regarding space needs at the courthouse stating something needs to be done about Family Court and the Probate Judge.

Public Comment Session Continued:

Mr. David McMahan addressed Council regarding the need for a museum in the county and also regarding upholding the Southern heritage.

Mr. Gary Pennington addressed Council regarding the set back requirements in Ordinance 99-14, "UNIFIED PERFORMANCE STANDARDS ORDINANCE AND LAND DEVELOPMENT REGULATIONS".

Mr. B. J. Littleton stated he felt Council is moving pretty good on the courthouse and he felt it would be wrong to put a museum in the old motor pool building. Mr. Littleton further suggested using the old Kenneth Mill for a museum.

Planning Grant:

Ordinance 99-14:

Upon recommendation of Mr. Tommy Abbott, Planning Commission Chairman, Mr. Timms made a motion, seconded by Mr. Hall, approved 5 – 0 that Ordinance 99-14, "UNIFIED PERFORMANCE STANDARDS ORDINANCE AND LAND DEVELOPMENT REGULATIONS" be adopted on third and final reading.

County Museum:

Mr. Thomas, Chairman of the Committee, informed those present that discussion regarding this matter will be a part of their meeting April 12, 2000 at 9:00 AM in Council Chambers.

ATAX Grant:

Upon recommendation of Ms. Geri McSwain, ATAX Committee, Mr. Thomas made a motion, seconded by Mr. Hamilton, approved 5-0 that the attached ATAX grant in the amount of \$5,000 to the Seneca Chamber of Commerce be adopted.

Rural Fire:

Upon request of Ms. Marianne Dillard, Purchasing Agent, Mr. Hall made a motion, seconded by Mr. Thomas, approved 5-0 that the bid awarded to Slagles Fire Equipment March 21, 2000 be amended from \$14,687.93 to \$12,882.95 and Charlotte Equipment be awarded the bid for hose washer and boots at a cost of \$1,711.50. Mr. Hall requested that the Roads & Transportation Committee review the process for scoring roadways for paving purposes.

Budget & Finance:

Mr. Hamilton made a motion, seconded by Mr. Hall, approved 5-0 that the attached proposed budget schedule be adopted and the committee meet all day Monday, April 17, 2000 to discuss the budget and if necessary, meet again April 20, 2000.

Tourism Committee:

Mr. Thomas made a motion, seconded by Mr. Hamilton, approved 5-0 that Kent Todd be appointed to represent District II on the Tourism Committee.

Council Clerk:

Mr. Thomas made a motion, seconded by Mrs. Hughes, approved 5-0 that the Council Clerk place the approval of the minutes immediately following the invocation on the agenda, that the minutes be the top priority of the Council Clerk on Wednesday immediately following the meeting and that all departments be sent a copy of the minutes and that departments affected by action taken at the meetings be contacted directly the day after the meeting.

City of Westminster:

At the request of Mrs. Hughes, Mayor Vera Duke and two Council Members from the City of Westminster were recognized, they addressed Council regarding their not being able to use the county transfer station to dispose of the garbage collected in the City of Westminster by a private contractor.

Mr. Thomas expressed feelings that this needs to be revisited.

Mr. Hall made a motion, seconded by Mrs. Hughes, approved 5-0 that this matter be referred to the Personnel & Intergovernmental Committee.

AMENDED ORDINANCE

AN AMENDED ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE EXECUTION AND DELIVERY OF A LEASE AGREEMENT BY AND AMONG OCONEE COUNTY, SOUTH CAROLINA, AS LESSOR, PINE RIVER PLASTICS, INC. AND CAROLINA FOOTHILLS, LLC JOINTLY AS LESSEE; AND OTHER MATTERS RELATING THERETO INCLUDING, WITHOUT LIMITATION, PAYMENT OF A FEE IN LIEU OF TAXES

WHEREAS, Oconee County, South Carolina (the "County"), acting by and through its County Council (the "County Council"), is authorized and empowered under and pursuant to the provisions of Title 4, Chapter 12, Code of Laws of South Carolina, 1976, as amended (the "Act"), to acquire, or cause to be acquired, properties (which such properties constitute "projects" as defined in the Act) and to enter into agreements with any industry to construct, operate, maintain and improve such projects; to enter into or allow financing agreements with respect to such projects; and, to accept any grants for such projects through which powers the industrial development of the State of South Carolina (the "State") and will be promoted and trade developed by inducing manufacturing and commercial enterprises to locate and remain in the State and thus utilize and employ the manpower, agricultural products and natural resources of the State and benefit the general public welfare of the County by providing services, employment, recreation or other public benefits not otherwise provided locally; and

WHEREAS, the County is authorized by the Act to execute a lease agreement, as defined in the Act, with respect to any such project; and

WHEREAS, the County adopted Ordinance No. 99-13 on October 19, 1999 authorizing the execution and delivery of a lease agreement as defined in the Act between the County and Pine River Plastics, Inc., a Michigan corporation; and

WHEREAS, the County is authorized by the Act to amend Ordinance No. 99-13 to include Carolina Foothills, LLC, a South Carolina limited liability company along with Pine River Plastics, Inc. (referred to jointly hereinafter as the "Company"); and

WHEREAS, the Company has requested the County to participate in executing an Inducement Agreement and Millage Rate Agreement, and a lease agreement (the "Lease Agreement") (Pine River Plastics, Inc. and Carolina Foothills, LLC Project) pursuant to the Act for the purpose of authorizing and of acquiring, by construction and purchase, certain land, a building or buildings, and machinery, apparati, and equipment, for the purpose of manufacturing or assembling plastic injection moldings for highly aesthetic products (the "Project"), all as more fully set forth in the Lease Agreement attached hereto; and

WHEREAS, the County has determined that the Project would benefit the general public welfare of the County by providing service, employment, recreation or other public benefits not otherwise provided locally; and, that the Project gives rise to no pecuniary liability of the County or incorporated municipality or a charge against the general credit or taxing power of either; and,

that the purposes to be accomplished by the Project, i.e., economic development, creation of jobs, and addition to the tax base of the County, are proper governmental and public purposes; and, that the inducement of the location or expansion of the Project within the County and State is of paramount importance; and, that the benefits of the Project will be greater than the costs; and

WHEREAS, the County has determined on the basis of the information supplied to it by the Company that the Project would be a "project" as that term is defined in the Act and that the Project would subserve the purposes of the Act; and

WHEREAS, the County Council has previously determined to enter into and execute the aforesaid Inducement Agreement and Millage Rate Agreement and the Lease Agreement with Pine River Plastics, Inc. and to that end has, by its Resolution adopted on September 21, 1999, authorized the execution of an Inducement Agreement and Millage Rate Agreement containing a fee-in-lieu of tax agreement; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 4-12-30(B)(4)(b)(i) of the Act, the County and Pine River Plastics, Inc. are permitted under the circumstances described therein to include in the Project investments by other members of the Pine River Plastics, Inc. controlled group; and

WHEREAS, the County and Pine River Plastics, Inc. desire to include Carolina Foothills, LLC as a participant in the Project; and

WHEREAS, the County Council has caused to be prepared and presented to this meeting the form of the Lease Agreement by and between the County and the Company which includes the agreement for payment of a payment-in-lieu of tax and an escrow agreement (the "Escrow Agreement") which provides for the reconveyance of the Project to the Company at the end of the Lease Agreement; and

WHEREAS, it appears that the instruments above referred to, which are now before this meeting, are in appropriate form and are appropriate instruments to be executed and delivered by the County for the purposes intended; NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the County Council of Oconee County, South Carolina, as follows:

Section 1. In order to promote industry, develop trade and utilize and employ the manpower, agricultural products and natural resources of the State by assisting the Company to locate an industrial facility in the State, the acquisition by the County and the subsequent lease to the Company of land, a building or buildings, and various machinery, apparati, and equipment, all as a part of the Project to be utilized for the purpose of manufacturing plastic injection moldings for highly aesthetic products, is hereby authorized, ratified and approved.

Section 2. It is hereby found, determined and declared by the County Council, as follows:

- (a) Based solely upon representations of the Company, the Project will constitute a "project" as said term is referred to and defined in the Act, and the County's actions herein will subserve the purposes and in all respects conform to the provisions and requirements of the Act;
- (b) The Project and the payments in lieu of taxes set forth herein are beneficial to the County;
- (c) The terms and provisions of the Inducement Agreement and Millage Rate Agreement are incorporated herein and made a part hereof;
- (d) The Project will benefit the general public welfare of the County by providing service, employment, recreation or other public benefits not otherwise provided locally;
- (e) The Project gives rise to no pecuniary liability of the County or incorporated municipality or a charge against the general credit or taxing power of either;
- . (f) The purposes to be accomplished by the Project, i.e., economic development, creation of jobs, and addition to the tax base of the County, are proper governmental and public purposes;
- (g) The inducement of the location or expansion of the Project within the County and State is of paramount importance; and,
 - (h) The benefits of the Project will be greater than the costs.
- Section 3. The forms, terms and provisions of the Lease Agreement and the Escrow Agreement presented to this meeting and filed with the Clerk to the County Council be and they are hereby approved and all of the terms, provisions and conditions thereof are hereby incorporated herein by reference as if the Lease Agreement and Escrow Agreement were set out in this Ordinance in its entirety. The Supervisor/Chairman of the County Council and the Clerk to the County Council be and are hereby authorized, empowered and directed to execute, acknowledge and deliver the Lease Agreement and the Escrow Agreement in the name of and on behalf of the County, and thereupon to cause the Lease Agreement and the Escrow Agreement to be delivered to the Company and cause the Lease Agreement to be recorded in the Office of the Clerk of Court for the County. The Lease Agreement and the Escrow Agreement are to be in substantially the forms now before this meeting and hereby approved, or with such minor changes therein as shall be approved by the officials of the County executing the same, their execution thereof to constitute conclusive evidence of their approval of any and all changes or revisions therein from the forms of Lease Agreement and Escrow Agreement now before this meeting. The reconveyance of the land and buildings by the County to the Company pursuant to the Escrow Agreement and Deeds maintained thereby is hereby specifically authorized provided the Lease Agreement shall contain a representation and waranty of Pine River Plastics, Inc. and Carolina Foothills, LLC that they are members of the same controlled group as such term is

defined in Section 4-12-30(B)(4)(b)(iv) of the Act and that they will make the minimum level of investment required under Section 4-12-30(B)(4)(b)(i) of the Act.

Section 4. The Supervisor/Chairman of the County Council and the Clerk to the County Council, for and on behalf of the County, are hereby authorized and directed to do any and all things necessary to effect the execution and delivery of the Lease Agreement and Escrow Agreement and the performance of all obligations of the County under and pursuant to the Lease Agreement and Escrow Agreement.

<u>Section 5</u>. The provisions of this Ordinance are hereby declared to be separable and if any section, phrase or provisions shall for any reason be declared by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unenforceable, such declaration shall not affect the validity of the remainder of the sections, phrases and provisions hereunder.

Section 6. All orders, resolutions, ordinances and parts thereof in conflict herewith are, to the extent of such conflict, hereby repealed and this Ordinance shall take effect and in full force from and after its passage and approval.

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE JOINTLY OWNED AND OPERATED INDUSTRIAL/BUSINESS PARK IN CONJUNCTION WITH PICKENS COUNTY, DATED MAY 4, 1998 AND AMENDED ON DECEMBER 7, 1998 AND ON DECEMBER 21, 1999; SUCH INDUSTRIAL/BUSINESS PARK BEING GEOGRAPHICALLY LOCATED IN PICKENS COUNTY AND OCONEE COUNTY AND ESTABLISHED PURSUANT TO SOUTH CAROLINA CODE OF LAWS OF 1976 §4-1-170, ET SEQUITUR, AS AMENDED; TO PROVIDE FOR A WRITTEN AGREEMENT WITH PICKENS COUNTY PROVIDING FOR THE EXPENSES OF THE PARK, PERCENTAGE OF **REVENUE** APPLICATION. DISTRIBUTION OF FEES IN LIEU OF AD VALOREM TAX TO THE COUNTIES AND RELEVANT TAXING ENTITIES; AND, TO PROVIDE THAT JOBS TAX CREDITS ALLOWED BY LAW BE PROVIDED FOR INDUSTRIES LOCATING IN SAID PARK, AND TO PERMIT A USER FEE IN LIEU OF AD VALOREM TAXATION.

WHEREAS, Oconee County, South Carolina and Pickens County, South Carolina (jointly the "Counties") are authorized under Article VIII, Section 13 of the South Carolina Constitution to jointly develop an industrial or business park within the geographical boundaries of one or more of the member Counties; and

WHEREAS, in order to promote the economic welfare of the citizens of the Counties by providing employment and other benefits to the citizens of the Counties, Oconee County, South Carolina entered into an agreement with Pickens County, South Carolina to develop jointly an industrial and business park (the "Park") as provided by Article VIII, Section 13 of the South Carolina Constitution and in accordance with Section 4-1-170 of the Code of Laws of South Carolina, 1976, as amended, (the "Act"),

WHEREAS, the Counties executed an Agreement for Development for Joint County Industrial Park dated May 4, 1998 (the "Agreement") and amended on December 7, 1998 (the "First Amended Agreement") and on December 21, 1999 (the "Second Amended Agreement") (jointly referred to herein as the "Agreement") and the Counties now wish to amend the Agreement.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE OCONEE COUNTY COUNCIL:

SECTION I. Oconee County is hereby authorized to amend the Agreement so as to expand the Park premises located within Oconee County and Pickens County. The form of the third amended joint industrial park agreement (the "Third Amended Agreement") is attached hereto, and all terms of the Agreement, First Amended Agreement, Second Amended Agreement and Third Amended Agreement are incorporated herein. The form, terms and provisions of the

Third Amended Agreement presented to this meeting and filed with the Clerk to the County Council be and they are hereby approved, and all of the terms, provisions and conditions thereof are hereby incorporated herein by reference as if the Third Amended Agreement were set out in this Ordinance in its entirety. The Supervisor/Chairman of the County Council and the Clerk to the County Council be and they are hereby authorized, empowered and directed to execute, acknowledge and deliver the Third Amended Agreement in the name and on behalf of the County. The Third Amended Agreement is to be in substantially the form now before this meeting and hereby approved, or with such minor changes therein as shall be approved by the officials of the County executing the same, their execution thereof to constitute conclusive evidence of their approval of any and all changes or revisions therein from the form of the Third Amended Agreement now before this meeting.

<u>SECTION II</u>. The maximum tax credits allowable by South Carolina Code of Laws, 1976, Section 12-6-3360, as amended, will apply to any business enterprise located in the Park.

SECTION III. Any business enterprise locating in the Park shall pay a fee in lieu of ad valorem taxes as provided for in the Agreement, as amended, Article VIII, Section 13 of the South Carolina Constitution and the Act. The user fee paid in lieu of ad valorem taxes shall be paid to the county treasurer for the county in which the premises is located. That portion of the fees from the Park premises located in Pickens County and allocated pursuant to the Agreement. as amended, to Oconee County shall be paid by the Pickens County Treasurer to the Oconee County Treasurer within five business days of receipt for distribution, such distribution shall be made in accordance with the Agreement. That portion of the fees from the Park premises located in Oconee County and allocated pursuant to the Agreement, as amended, to Pickens County shall be paid by the Oconee County Treasurer to the Pickens County Treasurer within five business days of receipt for distribution, such distribution shall be made in accordance with Agreement, as amended. Payments shall be made by a business or industrial enterprise on or before the due date for taxes for a particular year. Penalties for late payment will be at the same rate and at the same times as for late tax payment. Any late payment beyond said date will accrue interest at the rate of statutory judgment interest. The Counties, acting by and through the county tax collector for the county where the premises is located, shall maintain all liens and rights to foreclose upon liens provided for the counties in the collection of ad valorem taxes.

<u>SECTION IV.</u> The administration, development, promotion, and operation of the Park shall be the responsibility of the county in which each premises of the Park is located. Provided, that to the extent any Park premises is owned by a private developer, the developer shall be responsible for development expenses as contained in the Agreement, as amended.

SECTION V. In order to avoid any conflict of laws or ordinances between the Counties, the Oconee County ordinances will be the reference for such regulations or laws in connection with the Park premises located within Oconee County and the Pickens County ordinances will be the reference for such regulations or laws in connection with the Park premises located within Pickens County. Nothing herein shall be taken to supersede any state or federal law or regulation. The county in which the premises is located is specifically authorized to adopt restrictive covenants and land use requirements for the Park at the county's sole discretion.

SECTION VI. The Sheriff's Department for the county within the Park premises is located will have initial jurisdiction to make arrests and to exercise all authority and power within the boundaries of the Park premises located within each county, and fire, sewer, water and EMS services will be provided by the service district within whose jurisdiction the Park premises are located.

SECTION VII. Should any section of this Ordinance be, for any reason, held void or invalid, it shall not affect the validity of any other section hereof which is not itself void or invalid.

SECTION VIII. The Agreement, as amended, may not be terminated except by concurrent ordinances of Oconee County Council and Pickens County Council. In any event, this Ordinance shall terminate twenty (20) years from the date of its execution by both parties.

<u>SECTION IX</u>. Oconee County hereby designates the following distribution of the portion of the fee-in-lieu of <u>ad valorem</u> taxes received by Oconee County pursuant to the Agreement, as amended, for Park premises located in Pickens County.

SECTION X. Oconee County hereby designates that the distribution of the fee in lieu of ad valorem taxes pursuant to the Agreement received by Oconee County for Park premises located in Oconee County be paid to each of the taxing entities in Oconee County which levy an ad valorem property tax in any of the areas comprising the Oconee Park in the same percentage as is equal to that taxing entity's percentage of the millage rate being levied in the then current tax year for the property tax purposes, provided that the County may, from time to time, by ordinance, amend the distribution of the fee in lieu of tax payments to all taxing entities. A portion of the fee in lieu of ad valorem taxes which Oconee County receives pursuant to the Agreement, as amended, for Park premises may be, from time to time and by ordinance of Oconee County Council or its successor, designated for the payment of Special Source Revenue Bonds issued pursuant to Sections 4-1-175 and 4-29-68 of the South Carolina Code of Laws, 1976 or an Infrastructure Tax Credit issued pursuant to Section 4-1-175, as amended.

SECTION XI. The Ordinance shall be effective after third and final reading and publication.

5.4.13 Minimum Setbacks. Communication towers (not including guy anchors) must be set back as follows:

- A minimum distance equal to one foot horizontally for every one foot in height plus 50 feet from all lot lines of any adjacent property on which there is a residential use;
- b. A minimum distance equal to one foot horizontally for every one foot in height from all lot lines of any adjacent property on which there is a non- residential use
- A minimum distance equal to one foot horizontally for every one foot in height plus 50 feet from all lot lines of properties or districts designated historic;
- d. A minimum distance equal to one foot horizontally for every one foot in height plus 50 feet from all lot lines of properties containing churches, schools, colleges, children's homes and shelters, hospitals and nursing homes; except that communication facilities which meet the definition of stealth tower in Section 5.2 above may be permitted by special exception on these properties;
- A minimum distance of fifty (50') feet from the right of way of all adjacent streets and roads.
- f. The property line setback requirements can be achieved in the form of an easement granted by surrounding property owners. Any such easement shall be recorded as a matter of public record, and shall prohibit any construction in the easement area except for those structures ancillary to the communications tower.
- g. The Zoning Board of Appeals shall have the discretion in any special exception proceeding to reduce a setback requirement to the extent the applicant can demonstrate that a reduced setback meets the spirit and objective of this Ordinance, and will allow the best placement of a communications tower to minimize as much as possible the visual impact of the communications tower, while protecting the public from danger. Any reduced setback shall require that the applicant provide a fall zone letter from a registered engineer certifying the fall zone of the communications tower. The setback shall be reduced no less than the fall zone as certified by the engineer.
- h. For the purpose of measuring the applicable setback, distance measurements on monopole and guyed towers will be made from the center point of the tower footprint. Distance measurements on lattice towers will be made from the legs of the lattice tower.

STATE OF SOUTH CAROLINA COUNTY OF OCONEE ORDINANCE 2000-01

"AN ORDINANCE AMENDING ORDINANCE 99-16 PROVIDING FOR THE TRANSFER OF FUNDS NOT TO EXCEED \$1,500,000 FROM THE FUND BALANCE ACCOUNT OF OCCUPE COUNTY, SOUTH CAROLINA FOR THE CONSTRUCTION OF FORTY-TWO (42) "T" HANGARS AND THREE (3) CORPORATE HANGARS AT THE OCCUPE COUNTY REGIONAL AIRPORT SO AS TO PROVIDE FOR THE CONSTRUCTION OF FOURTEEN (14) "T" HANGARS AT A COST NOT TO EXCEED \$496,122"

WHEREAS, the Oconee County Council adopted Ordinance 99-16 upon third and final reading on December 7, 1999; and

WHEREAS, Ordinance 99-16 provides for the funding of the construction of forty-two (42) "1" hangars and three (3) corporate hangars at the Oconee County Regional Airport; and

WHEREAS, it has been determined that the construction of forty-two (42) "1" hangars and three (3) corporate hangars is not feasible at this time for the amount appropriated in said Ordinance, but that fourteen (14) "T" bangars can be constructed at a cost not to exceed \$496,122; and

WHEREAS, the County Colincil of Oconet County, South Carolina has determined it appropriate to construct fourteen (14) hangars at the Oconec County Regional Amount and cost not to exceeds 49%;122.

NOW THEREFORE, be it ordained by the Oconee County Council in session duly assembled with a quorum present and voting as follows:

SECTION I: It is hereby ordered that Ordinance 99-16 is aniended to provide that fourteen (14) "T" hangars be constructed at the Ocunee County Regional Airport for an affacult not to exceed \$496,722 from the funds appropriated by Ordinance 99-16 for such purpose(s) and that all unexpended funds remain in and/or revert to the fund balance account(s) of Oconec County.

PROVIDED FURTHER, that the applicant to be expended for the project described herein shadows exceed the sam of \$496.122 is thout the prior approval of a majority vistor of the niembers of the Ocques County County given as gestion; stuly assembled, with a quoring present and voting.

SECTION II: All other terms and provisions of Ordinance 99-16 not modified directly or by implication shall likewise remain in full force and effect.

SECTION III: If any portion of this ordinance shall be held to be invalid by a Court of Competent Inrisdiction, such portion shall be deemed severable and such finding shall not affect the remaining portions of this ordinance.
