First of all, thank you to my Councilman Paul Cain for getting this Resolution before you so quickly and to all of you for considering this Resolution.

I would first like to say, that I would suggest changing the language in the second paragraph of the Resolution from: "the issue of resettlement of refugees from the Middle East" to "issue of resettlement of refugees from anywhere outside the borders of the United States".

Secondly, this Resolution has nothing to do about Immigration.

Jeff Duncan, our House Representative for the 3rd District in Washington has publically called for a "pause" in the Refugee Resettlement, together with several of our SC Senators and House Representatives.

Pickens, Anderson and Beaufort County Councils have already passed this Resolution. Greenville, York, Laurens, and many others are taking it up in December.

Governor Haley has joined in with 27 other states to not accept Syrian refugees and while one can appreciate that turn around on her part, we must put a pause on all refugee resettlement and let what is happening in a ligtning speed to be evaluated and investigated.

This Resolution simply sends a message to Governor Haley to immediately cease and desist from all placements of refugees anywhere within the state of South Carolina until the South Carolina Legislature convenes and passes legislation reflecting the will of the people in SC by approving a state public policy on any and all refugee resettlement within South Carolina. It is Governor Haley's signature on the State Plan, she is the one that has to pause this process. This Resolution simply states the voice of Oconee County and together with other counties sending this message, it is our only way to get this message to her.

A few facts:

- 1) We know by the ongoing investigation in Paris that at least one of the refugees was a "vetted" refugee from Greece. From early October when he was vetted he traveled from Greece to Paris and on November 13, 2015 he along with other terrorists took the lives of 140+ innocent citizens and destroying countless numbers of families and France closing it's borders. So to the people and our Governor that say we only take "vetted" refugees, this should be quite alarming to you. Just this morning reports that an Algerian refugee was part of the Paris attacks.
- 2) Our FBI Director testified in hearings and openly admitted they can not adequately vet and assess these refugees who may pose a threat. This is in

direct contradiction to our Governor saying all refugees are fully vetted before being relocated. This weekend Rep Peter King stated we cannot vet refugees and he is the chairman of the House Homeland Security Committee. Jeff Duncan has also posted that you can actually get a false passport when you cross over to Turkey for about \$200 because there are so many false documents and things that have been stolen in Syria and are now available to these mirgrants who want to change their identities as they flow into Europe.

- 3) For the money side: There are 9 major contractors who relocate refugees using U.S. taxpayers funds. It costs U.S. taxpayers 1 Billion per year and this does not include federal, state and local expenditures and when you total all expenditures it runs between \$10 Billion to \$20 Billion per year.
- 4) For each refugee, the satellite office which relocates them in to communities, receive \$1875 per refugee and out of that \$750 is kept by that satellite per refugee. Human trafficking is illegal.
- 5) South Carolina's proverty level is 18.6%, Oconee County's proverty level is 19%. The latest count that I could find for homeless vets in SC is 1,000+. As elected officials, your first priority is to your constituents and their protection, which is stated in the Oconee Conty Council mission.
- 6) From the Office of Refugee Resettlement Annual Report to Congress (ORR) here are the statistics:

91.4% on food stamps

73.1% on Medicaid

68.3% on any type of cash assistance

32.17% on SSI

19.7% on public housing

17.3% on general assistance

10.9% on refugee cash assistance

In closing, this Resolution is about wanting citizens to know this process is safe and under control via our state and nationally, and to educate that this process is being run by the United Nations and coordinated with U.S. officials (not elected officials) and private organizations who get paid to bring these refugees here – it is a money making business to them. We are simply asking Governor Haley to stop this process and until this State Plan is fully investigated by its citizens and elected officials.

To suspend the admission into the United States of refugees in order to examine the costs of providing benefits to such individuals, and for other purposes.

- 1.Short title ☐ This Act may be cited as the Resettlement Accountability National Security Act of 2015.
- 2.Suspension of admission of refugees ☐ Beginning on the date of the enactment of this Act, the Secretary of Homeland Security may not admit into the United States an alien under section 207 of the Immigration and Nationality Act (8 U.S.C. 1157) until such time as Congress passes a joint resolution giving the Secretary authority to resume admitting aliens under such section.
- 3.GAO study Not later than 90 days after the date of the enactment of this Act, the Comptroller General of the United States shall submit to Congress a report that includes, for the 10-year period preceding the date of the enactment of this Act, for aliens admitted into the United States under section 207 of the Immigration and Nationality Act (8 U.S.C. 1157), the following information:
- (1)The average duration for which such an alien received benefits under a program described in section 4.□(2)The percentage of such aliens who received benefits under a program described in section 4.□(3)The cost, per year, to each program described in section 4 for such aliens.□(4)The number of such aliens who paid Federal income tax or Federal employment tax during the first year after being admitted to the United States.□(5)The cost, per year, to the program described in paragraph (5) of section 4 for such aliens.□(6)The number and percentage of such aliens who received benefits under a program described in section 4—□(A)2 years after being admitted to the United States;□(B)5 years after being admitted to the United States; and□(C)10 years after being admitted to the United States.□(7)The cost, per year, to the Federal Government, to State

RESOLUTION R2015-15

A RESOLUTION EXPRESSING INTENT TO CEASE COUNTY MAINTENANCE ON, AND TO AUTHORIZE COUNTY CONSENT TO JUDICIAL ABANDONMENT AND CLOSURE OF, A PORTION OF A CERTAIN OCONEE COUNTY ROAD; AND OTHER MATTERS RELATED THERETO.

WHEREAS, Thunder Valley Road (CE-33) (the "Road") is currently an Oconee County public road that is maintained by Oconee County. See Attachments 1 and 2 to the Staff Report of Findings, prepared by Mack Kelly, County Engineer, dated October 13, 2015 ("Staff Report"), attached hereto as Exhibit A and incorporated herein by reference. See also an annotated map of the subject area, attached hereto as Exhibit B and incorporated herein by reference; and,

WHEREAS, the owners of property abutting the Road (hereinafter referred to as "Owners" whether one or more) have requested that Oconee County abandon a certain portion of the Road ("Portion of the Road to be Abandoned"), as evidenced by letter dated July 24, 2015, as shown on Attachment 4 to the Staff Report; and,

WHEREAS, the Portion of the Road to be Abandoned begins approximately three thousand, four hundred and seventy-five (3,475) feet from the intersection of the Road and Tokeena Road (SC-59) and extends a distance of approximately four hundred and twenty-five (425) feet to a point of termination, as shown on Exhibits A and B.

WHEREAS, with respect to the Portion of the Road to be Abandoned, Oconee County has complied with § 26-9 of the Oconee County Code of Ordinances pertaining to cessation of maintenance and consent to judicial abandonment of Oconee County public roads; and,

WHEREAS, none of the procedures undertaken by Oconee County have shown a need for the Portion of the Road to be Abandoned to be maintained by Oconee County or to remain a public road, and the Oconee County Transportation Committee and Oconee County staff have recommended that Oconee County consent to the requested judicial abandonment; and,

WHEREAS, in accordance with § 26-9 of the Oconee County Code of Ordinances, the Owners must fully comply with all applicable law, including, without limitation, S.C. Code § 57-9-10, as amended, (providing all required notices and service of process to interested parties in accordance with applicable law and filing a proper petition with a court of competent jurisdiction). Additionally, the Owners must construct a cul-de-sac of adequate turn around dimensions, as determined and approved by Oconee County, at the newly proposed end of the Road to be maintained by Oconee County; and

WHEREAS, Oconee County, a body politic and corporate and a political subdivision of the State of South Carolina, acting by and through its County Council, desires to express its intent to cease maintenance of the Portion of the Road to be Abandoned, contingent on the understanding and qualification that such abandonment and closure will be at no expense or prejudice to Oconee County and so long as the Owners meet the requirements set forth in § 26-9 of Oconee County Code of Ordinances and South Carolina state law; Oconee County further desires to express its intent to authorize consent to judicial abandonment of the Road:

NOW, THEREFORE, be it resolved by Oconee County Council in a meeting duly assembled that:

- 1. Oconee County, acting by and through its County Council, hereby states that Oconee County will no longer maintain that portion of the Road beginning approximately three thousand, four hundred and seventy-five (3,475) feet from the intersection of the Road and Tokeena Road (SC-59) and extending a distance of approximately four hundred and twenty-five (425) feet to a point of termination.
- 2. So long as the Owners fully comply with all applicable law, including § 26-9 of Oconee County Code of Ordinances and S.C. Code 1976, § 57-9-10, as amended, that the Owners construct a cul-de-sac of

adequate turn around dimensions, as determined by Oconee County, at the newly proposed end of the Road to be maintained by Oconee County, and contingent on the understanding and qualification that such abandonment and closure will be at no expense or prejudice to Oconee County, Oconee County consents to the judicial abandonment and closure of the portion of Thunder Valley Road (the Portion of the Road to be Abandoned) as specifically set forth above.

- 3. All orders and resolutions in conflict herewith are, to the extent of such conflict only, repealed and rescinded.
- 4. Should any part or portion of this resolution be deemed unconstitutional or otherwise unenforceable by any court of competent jurisdiction, such finding shall not affect the remainder hereof, all of which is hereby deemed separable.

5. This resolution shall take effect and be in force immediately upon enactment.



Recommendations


Thunder Valley Road is used by the general public. Property owners Tim and Amy Fendley abut the approximately 425 ft. section of Thunder Valley Road on which they are seeking abandonment. The Fendleys own the property on both sides of the road where abandonment and closure would take place. The Fendleys have requested that the County consent to abandonment and closure of the road. In the course of our investigation, we have determined that the 425 ft. section of Thunder Valley Road is not in use by the general public. My recommendation is to bonor the request of the Fendley's to remove Thunder Valley Road from County Maintenance and that the Transportation Committee support this recommendation. I also recommend that abandonment and closure of this portion of Thunder Valley Road be contingent upon a cul de sac being added at the gate where County maintenance will end. If

this recommendation is supported by the Transportation Committee, the Transportation Committee should make a recommendation to County Council as to whether the request for abandonment and closure should be honored. If this recommendation is not supported by the Transportation Committee, no further action is needed.



Dear Mr. McCell,

We are requesting that a portion of Thunder Valley Road (CB 33) be abandoned by Oconee County. We live at the end of Thunder Valley Road and the read dead ends in our front yard. We own the land on both sides of the road for the last 425 feet. We are asking Oconee County to abandom Thunder Valley Road at the point where the road enters our property.

There are several reasons that we are asking that this portion of Thunder Valley Road be abandoned. Since we moved to this location in 1996, we have been robbed twice. In the first robbery, we lost approximately \$800 worth of tools and lawn equipment. We lost a \$4,100.00 dump trailer in the last robbery (Figure 1). In December 2014, a fugitive (domestic violence) from the Occase County Shariff's Department drove through our yard and parked in our pasture approximately 200 yards behind our house. This individual was ultimately apprehended in our yard by officers of the Occase County Shariff's Department. Some people who drive to the end of Thunder Valley Road use our circular drive, endangering our pet, while others turn around across our lawn. From time to time other types of damage occur to our property (Figure 2). Litter is a continuing problem. The worst instance of littering occurred 4-5 months ago when a shower stall was dumped on the side of the road (Figure 3). Because the shower stall was apparently on the road right-of-way, we called Roads and Bridges. They advised us that they were not responsible and said we should call Solid Waste. Solid Waste stated they were not responsible and suggested the Shariff's Department; the Shariff's Department said they were not responsible. Thus, we had to have the shower stall to the landfill.

Therefore we are exking that Occure County abandon the last 425 feet of Thunder Valley Road so we can gain a degree of security from robbery, vandalism, and littering.

Sec. 26-9. Road closure and abandonment.

(a)

Prior to any request for abandonment and closure of an Oconee County public road being brought before county council, county staff, including, without limitation, the Oconee County Roads and Bridges Department, will conduct a thorough investigation, adequate to determine: whether the road in question is, or ever has been, a county road; whether the road still is a county road; whether the road is still in general public use or has been practically abandoned; whether the county has any documentation relating to the status of the road, such as a dedication of right-of-way or easement, or a deed, or whether such road was subject to a prescriptive easement or easement by usage; whether there is any other information which would assist county council in determining whether the best interests of the Occnee County public will be served by consenting to the abandonment and closure of the road in question or by not so consenting. As a part of the investigatory process addressed herein, the Oconee County Roads and Bridges Department will post, adjacent to the road in question, a sign, marked so as to be as conspicuous as possible, prominently providing notice that the road, or portion thereof abutting the sign, is proposed for abandonment and closure, soliciting citizen comments concerning such proposed abandonment and closure, and providing notice of address and telephone number at the Occnee County Public Works Department to which concerned citizens may forward comments concerning such proposed abandonment and closure.


Following the investigation referred to in paragraph 1, supra, county staff will make a recommendation to the Transportation Committee of Oconee County Council, which, in turn, will make a recommendation to Oconee County Council as to whether the request for abandonment and closure should be honored or not, and provide the results of the staff investigation to county council for its use and final determination whether the county will consent to such abandonment and closure. Included with the recommendation will be any public comments received and the recommendation(s) of county staff and the transportation committee.

(c)

County council shall then, in public meeting, make a determination as to whether the request for abandonment and closure should be consented to by the County, acting by and through county council, and shall signify its decision by motion, if such decision be negative, and shall signify its decision by resolution of county council, if such decision be positive.

if county council consents to the abandonment and closure of a county public road, as addressed herein, the resolution of county council consenting to such abandonment and closure shall state, with particularity, the road, or section thereof, to be closed; the basis for county council's decision to consent to the abandonment and closure of the road; and the absolute requirement that, prior to the road, or portion thereof, in question being closed, the primary private party(les) in interest (unless the county, liself, is the party requesting the road closure, in which case the county will be the primary party in interest to comply with this section) shall fully comply with all applicable law, including, without limitation, S.C. Code 1976, § 57-9-10, as amended, and shall provide all required notice and service of process. Only upon the meeting of such conditions and the fulfillment of such procedures will the county council consent to such abandonment and closure be considered final, and that shall be stated in such resolution.

WHEREAS, the issue of the resettlement of refugees from the Middle East and/or other illegal aliens is a matter of the most urgent concern, as it involves vital issues of national security, terrorism, public health, and public safety, as well as the expenditure of public funds.

NOW, THEREFORE, be it resolved that the Oconee County Council will not approve or proceed with all or any part of the Refugee Resettlement Program within the borders of Oconee County, South Carolina; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Oconee County Council calls on all South Carolina public officials, and governmental and non-governmental entities, to immediately cease and desist from the placement of refugees anywhere within the state of South Carolina until the South Carolina Legislature convenes and passes legislation reflecting the will of the people in South Carolina by approving a state public policy on any and all refugee resettlement related issues within the state of South Carolina.

BACKGROUND DESCRIPTION:

The Kubara tractor and bount mower already purchased under Leisse Purchase realized a savings of \$14,838. The printer head attachment for the Kubata tractor is approved for \$26,500 and this item costs \$19,838 for a savings of \$6.662. Total savings on these two items is \$21,500 which will cover the overage on the two Tri-Axle tracks.

Please note on the initial loading capacities, all manufacturers generally rate machines by the "maximum initial loads" that the machine can handle. What we tell you is, while we rate our machines the same as the other manufacturers, all the hype of the maximum initial load quantities are not optimal for machine longevity and efficient operation. If you think of it in terms of your car.....it may be rated to go 120 MPH, but you'll get optimal performance (best gas mileage and length of service) by driving it at 50 - 60 MPH. Cremation equipment is no different and as such we recommend initial loading of 40 – 50% of the maximum rated initial load. 

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



Sheriff Deputy Retention Analysis / Short & Long Term Strategies

Ms. Cammick turned over discussion of this matter to Mr. Moulder and Sheriff Mike Crenshaw who jointly addressed the Committee utilizing a handout [copy filed with these minutes] outlining both short and long term strategies to address concerns related to sheriff deputy retention. Mr. Moulder reviewed the plan noting two specific issues with retention [1] new recruits – 3 or less years of service, and [2] certified officers – 5 to 7 years of service.

Highlights from Mr. Moulder's presentation include:

- Analysis based on actual salaries for each position within the Sheriff's office including the Detention Center, Communications & Animal Control
- Proposed Program

Action Needed to Restore LGF

If the LGF is ever going to be funded appropriately, YOU must contact your members of the General Assembly. Now, in this election year, it is time to ask your House and Senate members if they believe in local government and property tax relief.

As the enclosed articles point out, the General Assembly will spend an additional \$1.2 billion dollars, \$766.5 of which is recurring, during the next legislative session. This will mark the 6th consecutive year of robust revenue growth at the state level and ensures that the General Fund far outstrips pre-recession levels.

Meanwhile, South Carolina counties continue to operate as if in a recession, cutting important services, digging into reserves and increasing millage rates on property taxpayers. These local revenue issues are largely a result of legislatively imposed millage caps and the failure of the General Assembly to fully fund the local government fund (LGF).

If your members of the General Assembly will not commit to protecting the interests of their and your constituents, perhaps it is time for them to be returned home from Columbia, so they can see for themselves the implications of their failure to fund local government.

A refusal to fund the LGF is a refusal to fund promised tax relief to the people of South Carolina. Every property tax dollar that is spent on a state mandate because the LGF is not fully funded is a dollar taken from the property taxpayer and lost in state bureaucracy!

IT IS UP TO THE COUNTY OFFICIALS TO ENSURE THE RESTORATION OF THE LGF. PLEASE CONTACT YOUR MEMBERS OF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY TODAY.

Lawmakers mull plans for unexpected revenue boon

COLUMBIA — State government coffers suddenly are awash in money.

The state's economists have projected lawmakers will have almost \$1.3 billion to spend next year in unexpected additional money, the result of a thriving state economy and leftover funds from the previous year.

Lawmakers are listing flood relief, road and bridge repairs, and addressing a decades-old education funding equity lawsuit as some of the state's immediate needs that could be addressed, but some of them also want to look at some form of tax relief.

"The disturbing pattern in Columbia is that the so-called needs in government seem to correspond with how much money is being taken in from taxpayers," Sen. Tom Davis, a Beaufort Republican, told The Greenville News. "As we go about deciding how to best spend that money, if we go ahead and identify the core infrastructure needs we have and we have sufficient funds to take care of those items, the balance of the money ought to be sent back to the taxpayer."

Senate Majority Leader Harvey Peeler of Gaffney, a senior member of the Senate Finance Committee, listed tax relief as among the items he said the new money should enable.

"Income tax reduction would help our economy as much as anything," he said.

Rep. Chip Limehouse, a Charleston Republican and first vice chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee, said he thinks tax relief should be the priority of spending what is available in the new money.

If the money could be used to remove the income tax and corporate tax, even for a year, it would produce an economic "boon," he said.

Sen. Mike Fair, a Greenville Republican and a member of the Senate Finance Committee, said the money should help negotiations over a compromise on road funding.

The money could shore up the position of those who want to support a reduction in income tax as part of a package to spend more money on roads, as was proposed earlier this year by Gov. Nikki Haley, he said. The Senate failed to pass any roads plan this year, including a GOP plan that would have included tax relief.

Opponents of pairing an income tax reduction with roads funding had argued the state could not afford such a cut in income tax revenue.

Fair said the new money could be used to "leverage" a compromise on roads, providing tax relief as well as road and bridge improvements.

"I like the idea of using excessive revenues to enhance our (income tax) reduction in getting our roads bill passed," he said. "We can get a permanent tax rebate by not collecting the tax in the first place on their income."

Rep. Gary Simrill, a Rock Hill Republican who chaired a committee last year that crafted a road-funding plan, said the \$1.3 billion does not change the fact that the state still needs a sustainable and reliable source of new revenue for infrastructure.

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Some of the new money should be used for taxpayers, he said.

"I think certainly this is an opportunity for a tax rebate to the citizens of South Carolina as well as tax reform," he said.

Rep. Garry Smith, a Simpsonville Republican who sits on the House Ways and Means Committee, said using some of the new money on a tax rebate merits consideration, "particularly when you are talking about things you are already taking out of the taxpayer's pocket."

"If you have a lot of surplus, one thing you should certainly look at is giving some of that back to the taxpayer, putting it back in their pocket," he said.

Lawmakers said they are unsure how they will approach the new money until they know more about the state's major needs.

Rep. Dwight Loftis, a Greenville Republican and member of the Ways and Means Committee, said he is open to the idea of tax relief but first wants to know the state's tab for flood damage.

Officials say that number may not be known until next month.

Sen. Nikki Setzler, leader of the Senate Democrats and a member of the Senate Finance Committee, earlier this week said he planned to file legislation for the state to borrow up to \$500 million to help pay for flood damage, with 25 percent of that reserved for local roads.

The projections of \$1.3 billion might not alter any plans for a bond bill, one option, he said, in a menu of choices facing lawmakers. Simrill also said he believes a bond bill remains viable, even with the new money.

Setzler said a significant portion of \$1.3 billion is one-time money that legislators can't use for recurring needs. According to the state Revenue and Fiscal Affairs Office data, \$458 million of the amount is one-time revenues.

"We still have huge, huge issues to deal with," he said, referring to flood damage and road repair needs as well as the education-funding lawsuit. "I think it has to be a bi-partisan solution in dealing with the roads issue in this state and it's going to take a menu of options."

Asked about a tax rebate, Setzler said "anything is on the table, but I think the first thing we have to deal with is flood damage."

Rep. Kenny Bingham, a Lexington County Republican who sits on the Ways and Means Committee, said flood damage, infrastructure and education funding are among the state's most pressing needs.

He said it's premature to say whether the state should or should not borrow money for flood damage.

"I think you take it one step at a time and use the resources you have on hand in the most conservative way possible to deal with the issues facing the state," he said. "After that is allocated and there is a need that rises to that level, then you look at bonding."

Peeler said the new forecast takes pressure off lawmakers to borrow money, or at least not to borrow as much.

Davis said however the money is spent, he hopes lawmakers will focus on the state's needs and not those who will lobby for the money.

"They'll be descending on Columbia like locusts," he said. "Everybody is going to want that money and we're going to have to remain focused and make sure the money goes where it's actually needed and not for some wish-list projects."

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State revenue forecast bumped to \$7.9B as economy fires 'on all cylinders'

The S.C. Board of Economic Advisors has bumped the state's revenue forecast by \$343.1 million to \$7.9 billion for the current fiscal year, chairman Chad Walldorf said Tuesday.

In addition, the board issued a preliminary General Fund revenue estimate of more than \$8.2 billion for fiscal 2016-17, or a growth of 4.8%. This forecast is mostly based on continued personal income and employment growth, key economic factors which account for 85% of the total General Fund revenue, a release said.

"Our state's economy continues to fire on all cylinders," Walldorf said. "As a result of strong employment growth and increased consumer spending, the state General Fund continues to benefit from higher income and sales tax collections."

The current fiscal year increase was made because of higher-than-expected revenue collections at the end of the prior fiscal year, which have continued through the first four months of the current one. Through February, revenue grew at a steady annual rate of 2.1% and in the last four months increased sharply to 6%. This created a \$131.4 million surplus in 2014-15 over revised projections, the board said.

The board met with regional economists prior to making its forecast in order to develop an expectation on key economic factors. In doing so, the board now projects a personal income growth of 5.25% for the current fiscal year and an employment growth of 2%.

In 2016-17, it anticipates personal income to decrease to 4.9% and employment growth to remain consistent at 1.9%.

Greenville County Council helps drive Upstate's economy

The recent innouncement by ScanSource that the company will invest \$6 million in a new building on its campus and create 100 new jobs over five years perfectly illustrates the direction of South Carolina's economy, and the combined team effort that is making great things happen in Greenville County.

ScanSource already employs 650 people at its Greenville County headquarters. It is a home grown company that was started in 1992 by six local partners. They focused on the emerging technology in point-of-sale systems and bar code scanners. Since then, ScanSource has expanded its scope to include communications and data, networking and physical security, 3D technology and emerging technology – the "Internet of Things," The company reached \$3.2 billion in annual net sales in 2015. ScanSource has become an international leader in technology products and solutions while firmly and proudly maintaining its roots in South Carolina: The company employs 2,100 people worldwide.

ScanSource joins an impressive list of 18 companies that have announced over \$375 million in new investments this year in Greenville County, which will add about 1,900 new jobs. These include Erwin Penland, Magna International, Bausch & Lomb, Mitsubishi Polyester Films, Cold Mountain Material, Synnex and CH2M Engineering. Several more exciting announcements are in the pipeline.

There is one constant factor among all of these new announcements: These companies could have gone elsewhere with their jobs, expansions and new facilities. But, they chose Greenville County for specific reasons – good people, good location, good business environment and the enthusiastic support of state and local governments.

In his announcement remarks, ScanSource CEO Mike Baur thanked the SC Department of Commerce, the Greenville Area Development Corp. (GADC) and Greenville County Council, along with the company's employees and customers. How does county government contribute to our success in attracting large investments and good paying jobs?

Greenville County Council is authorized by state law to enter into fee-in-lieu-of-tax (FILOT) contracts with eligible companies in exchange for their investments in Greenville County. In the case of manufacturing, the FILOT simply reduces the company's property tax liability from a

10.5 percent assessment to 6 percent assessment – the same as commercial and non-owner occupied residential proporties. Investments over \$400 million may earn a "super fee" with a 4 percent assessment.

As an added incentive for companies to invest more, a special source revenue credit (SSRC) may be included in the incentive contract. Basically, an SSRC is a short-term credit against FILOT payments given to offset expenditures by the company on infrastructure costs. Companies must invest certain amounts in order to qualify for incentives, Companies must put their money in first before FILOT related incentives are activated. These performance based incentives help ensure the employment and investment benchmarks are met.

In Greenville County, incentive contracts are negotiated by GADC's professional project managers and then approved by County Council in the form of a county ordinance. The revenue derived from FILOT payments goes into a county budget category separate from the general fund.

FILOT revenue is used to pay for infrastructure such as county road improvements and for the costs of economic development activities by GADC that benefit Greenville County. GADC works closely with the state Department of Commerce, the Upstate SC Alliance, the Greater Greenville Chamber and other local chambers of commerce, and a number of other organizations dedicated to carrying out a coordinated economic development strategy. The focus on business sectors best suited to Greenville County's future – advanced materials, automotive, aviation and acrospace, biosciences, data centers, logistics and distribution, and office and corporate headquarters – is paying off.

In his announcement this week, ScanSource's Mike Baur pointed out that ScanSource is responsible for S8 million annual economic impact to the local community and \$2.5 million in annual philanthropic contributions. In addition, company employees contribute over 3,000 annual volunteer hours in local schools. He also credited Greenville County and the GADC for their continued support as partners in the company's impressive growth that has allowed them to be more than just another corporate citizen.

The fact is, the benefits of new jobs and investment these companies bring far outweigh the incremental incentives provided by Greenville County. Companies like ScanSource are driving our economy, making it possible for entrepreneurs to start small businesses, innovators to develop new products, and individuals across the diverse spectrum of our citizens to find beneficial employment. It all works together.

Greenville County Council has always been consistently unified in maintaining sound policies in carrying out its relatively small, but vital role in keeping the county's economic engine humming. It is important that it stays that way.

Commerce secretary: Lack of regional cooperation, industrial sites hampers development

EASLEY — Pickens County is missing out on South Carolina's economic growth boom because of its lack of cooperation with regional marketing efforts and its shortage of sites ready to be developed, the state Secretary of Commerce told business leaders Thursday.

"If you look around and say, we haven't gotten our share, it's because we weren't ready," Bobby. Hitt told members of the Easley Chamber of Commerce.

South Carolina has become the No. 1 state for foreign investment per capita, and No. 4 overall, and nearby counties of similar size such as Octmee and Laurens have been pulling in their share of that, Hitt said.

The most recent new industry announcement from the Commerce Department for Pickens County was in September 2011. The department didn't put out a press release about TaylorMade Golf's announcement in April 2013 to move its operations from an old plant in Oconee to a new facility in the Pickens County Commerce Park because it wasn't a net gain for the state but only movement from one county to another.

Pickens County pulled out of the Upstate Alliance, an economic development coalition that touts the region as a great place to do business, more than three years ago, with County Council members saying they didn't see any benefit from the \$55,000 a year the county was paying the organization.

"I am a regionalist. I believe it would be best if Pickens County was in the alliance: I've been unabashed about that," Hitt said.

Only two counties in the state aren't part of a regional economic development alliance. Hitt said.

"If a company is coming in and they see a hole in the middle of an alliance, they wonder what's happening there," he said.

The county's terrain also makes recruiting big business more difficult. It's hard to find good, accessible flat land, he said.

Speaking to *The Greenville News* after his talk, Hitt said he is working with the county on finding ways to open up more sites at the county's commerce park, as well as in other locations around the county.

"We've got a lot of counties that can be more aggressive and do a better job," he said. "My job is to help the ones that are aggressive.

"Economic development is a local function. My job is to support that local function."

Pickens County has all the other elements it needs for solid economic growth, with a good school system with a great Career and Technology Center topping the list, he said.

"Your friends and your neighbors in Oconee County, they get it," Hitt said.

The city of Easley has decided to take up the business of economic development itself because of the county's faltering efforts, Mayor Larry Bagwell said.

The city joined the Upstate Alliance and is considering creating a Greater Easley Economic Board, he said.

"We feel like the county was not doing what they should be doing as far as getting more outside investment into the county," Bagwell told *The Greenville News*.

Brian Swords, director of Tri-County Technical College's Easley campus and chairman of the Pickens County School Board introduced Hitt, saying, "We've got all the tools here in Pickens County to pull this off. All the pieces are here.

Hitt, he said, "is throwing fast balls right down the middle. What we need is somebody to step up and hit them."
