Year End Report

Please accept the following words as an overview of the accomplishments made by your Oconee County Fire Service in 2014. The nearly 400 volunteers and career staff commit themselves every day to ensuring that our community and visitors are safe. We are grateful for their service and dedication.

Operations:

Your Oconee County Fire Service responded to 4129 incidents in 2014. A breakdown of the call types is attached. One of the numbers we are most proud of at year end is our response time. Firefighters over the past twelve months have managed to lower the average response time of the "first-due" unit to 8:44. This is a nearly 75 second drop from 2013. While this may seem miniscule to most, this is an incredible improvement on the average of over 4000 responses.

The fire service currently operates a fleet of more than 100 primary response apparatus and assorted support vehicles comprised of the following; 37 Engines, 17 Brush Trucks, 13 Tankers, 4 Squads, 2 Aerial Ladders and 18 Staff/Station Vehicles. Our organization has developed a capital replacement plan to assist in both vehicle purchases and lowering maintenance costs. This plan identifies a life cycle for each vehicle based upon response mission and frequency of use. Frontline fire apparatus and medical response vehicles are replaced at 20 year increments with a 5 year reserve status to follow. Support apparatus (ladders, tankers, service trucks) are at 25 year cycle with no reserve status. This plan is in accordance with recommendations from Oconee County Motor pool and the National Fire Protection Association.

In addition to responding to fires, team members must constantly work to ensure that equipment and personnel are prepared to respond. Crew members flow tested and inspected more than 1800 hydrants and water points throughout the county. This work is completed annually in partnership with the municipal water system operators. The hose on the engines must not fail when needed. Team member's pressure tested more than 51,000 feet of fire hose in 2014. This hose ranges in diameter of 1 inch to 5 inch. In addition to hydrants and hose, annual certification testing was also completed on 354 self-contained breathing apparatus, 176 ground ladders and 37 fire engine pumps.

Fire stations across the county continue the build out of Emergency Reporting Software Database. The database is "cloud based" software that allows team members to submit incident reports, retrieve building plans, manage training and inventory all from one place. The program can be securely accessed from an individual's office, home computer, tablet or smart phone. The program has become the center point for managing daily operations and information sharing.

We have instituted the Active911 System to put critical call information into the hands of 436 team members. The product is installed on the phones and tablets of each responder. The product provides; Dispatch Information, turn-by-turn directions, hydrant/water point location on map, and the ability to see apparatus and manpower responding. The program has been a huge success and implements in three of our surrounding counties.



In the summer of 2014, with the help of several organizations and personnel, we revamped our medical evaluation program. The NFPA requires that each team member receive and pass a physical annually to ensure they are healthy to perform their required duties. The new program matched the physical to the job description of the individual and not a "one size fits all" evaluation. The program saw more than 360 participants this year. In addition to evaluating their fitness for duty, the program has been credited with identifying several unknown medical conditions for our members.

Life Safety

One of the most critical functions we provide to our citizens is the education and resources needed to prevent fires from starting. In 2014, 191 man hours were spent at events throughout the county providing public education regarding the hazards associated with fires. These events were conducted at schools, churches and special events. We installed more than 750 smoke detectors. But, we still have a long way to go. Our staff estimates that more than 50% of the homes and business' do not have a working smoke detector. Property loss from fire in 2014 was just under \$1,000,000.00



Our Fire Investigations Team (FIT) assisted with the investigation of 27 fires, operating on scenes for 232 hours. The FIT is made up of specially trained personnel from both the fire service and the Sheriff's Office. The two agencies bring together experience and knowledge in an effort to stop the growing trend of Arson. Of the twenty-seven incidents that were investigated; six fires ruled accidental, nine fires ruled incendiary or intentional, and twelve fires remain undetermined

One of the best ways to equip our personnel to respond to a building fire is to educate them on the structure and its contents. In 2014, team members conducted pre-incident plans of 948 commercial businesses in the unincorporated areas of Oconee. The plans are loaded into the Emergency Reporting database where they are shared with each station and readily available during a fire. The survey's not only educate out firefighters, but give our business owners the opportunity to meet their fire department and discuss safety related issues.

ISO Evaluation

Oconee County recently underwent an analysis of the fire suppression delivery system used in our community by Insurance Services Office (ISO). The results of the Public Protection Classification Survey analysis has determined that effective January 01, 2015, the Fire Suppression Rating for the unincorporated area of Oconee County is now a 4/10. This classification is based on an alternative water supply, and is not based on hydrant location, therefore if a property is located in the unincorporated area of Oconee County, and is within five (5) road miles of a fire station, the PPC rating is an ISO Class 4.

If the property is not within five (5) miles of a fire station, the PPC rating is an ISO Class 10. This improvement affected more than 26,000 homes and businesses in the unincorporated areas of Oconee and the Town of Salem. According to ISO estimates, Oconee County taxpayers will save \$5,906,097.75 annually on their insurance premiums.

Goals for 2015

Continue to reduce our response time to below 8:00

Complete the construction and place into service the remaining proposed substations

Enhance our medical response support by implementing a SC DHEC approved Basic Life Support Program

Establish a formal training program for firefighters and medical response personnel

Continue apparatus replacement according to capitol replacement plan

Establish a Fire Service Education Program as part of the School District's Hamilton Career Center

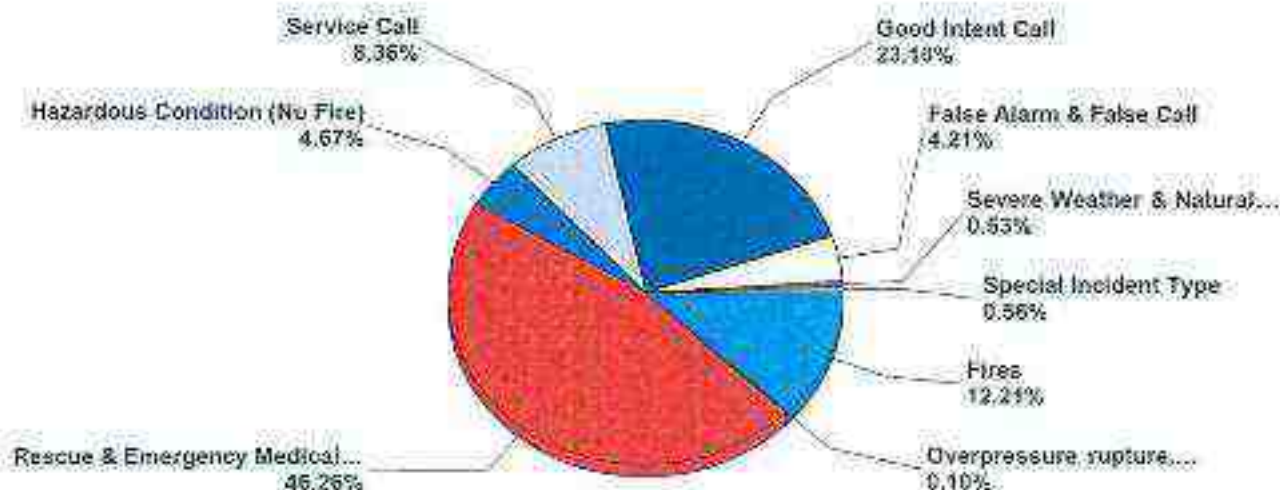

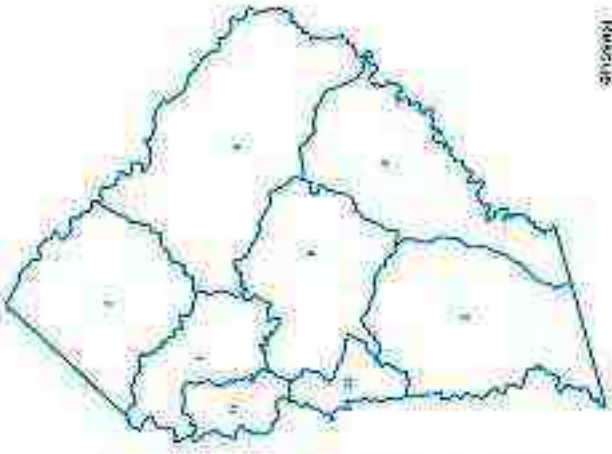

This office has reviewed your Private Facilities permit application(s) and at this time we can authorize the building of the structure(s) you requested within the Project Boundary of a Duke Energy lake. The construction of the facility must be completed as described in the approved application, and **within twelve (12) months from the date of this letter of approval**. Lake Services should be notified upon completion of the structure(s) so that the Shoreline Management Program can be completed; a permit tag will be attached at final inspection (if not one on an existing structure). Please post the enclosed notice(s) at the shoreline of the site so that it will be visible from the lake.

Dock should be constructed as specified in the application. Dock not to exceed a distance of 70ft. from full pond. See attached survey for approved dock location. Please see the attached dock sketch for details on dimensions. The dock should be the dimensions included in the agency approvals of a 25'x20' with a 50'x4' walkway. No vegetation/trees should be cleared from within the project boundary. Total square footage includes all roof overhangs and hand rails. All work must comply with the Shoreline Management Guidelines.

NOTE: APPLICANTS MUST IMMEDIATELY NOTIFY DUKE AND STOP ALL WORK IF HISTORICAL OR ARCHEOLOGICAL RESOURCES ARE DISCOVERED DURING THE IMPLEMENTATION OF AN AUTHORIZED PROJECT.

Please note: 1) This approval does not approve electrical service on dock or piers. Lot owners should contact their county Buildings and Codes office for electrical service requirements and/or restrictions. Some counties may restrict submersible pumps in the lakes. 2) New, expanded or rebuilt facilities or mooring buoys must be situated or constructed in size, dimension, or design such that an average-size (10 foot minimum) moored watercraft will not interfere with access to other facilities and not obstruct ingress and egress of watercraft.



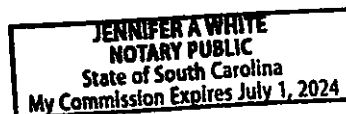
