OCPL Director's Report

March 2024

- 1. Programs and Services: Programs were well attended in January and February. Kasey Swords, Youth Services Librarian, and Shannon Humphries, YS Assistant, have hit the ground running, so to speak, with regular Story Times at three branches (Salem has taken a hiatus due to lack of attendance). They've had good success with a variety of programs (see the Youth Services report for more details). Imelda Lomeli, a part time assistant in Walhalla, and also a Community Health Worker, had a well-attended program on personal growth presented in Spanish (assisted by Amy Saylor, our Spanish Interpreter/Community Resource Assistant). Quientell Walker presented several programs in February on genealogy basics and African-American genealogy. He also presented at Seneca High School along with Jennifer Moss from the Oconee History Museum. See his report for more details.
- 2. Usage Statistics and Narratives: Usage statistics for January and February as well as individual branch/department narratives are attached.
- 3. Finance and Budget: OCPL budget figures for FY24 to date are attached.
- **4. Personnel and Training:** The Branch Services position was converted to an Adult Services position. The position has been filled. Our new staff member, Brittany Castro, starts in late March. One of the responsibilities of this position deals with is our need for more meaningful and more regular staff training (along with adult programming and compiling library statistics). In order to address staffing turnover issues, we have asked the county for an increase in Staffmark pay in the upcoming three-year's budgets.
- 5. Building and Grounds: There was some positive movement with the ADA-compliant ramp in Seneca. An ordinance to use Federal ARPA money was presented to County Council in January 2024. It passed with the third reading in February. We're still having an issue with drainage in the parking lot at the Westminster Branch, but Kyle Reid with Roads and Bridges and Jason Neal with Facilities Maintenance are looking at improving water runoff through installing drains in the parking lot and diverting runoff from the gutters.
- **6. Technology:** We have put the lending of Mi-Fi units on long-term pause. The State Library did not move forward with a program to take the place of hotspot lending through a homework help grant during COVID-19 through Kajeet. As such, the library would have to pay for hotspots and unlimited minutes for users from library funds, which would be around \$40 per month per unit. Given the small number of people who borrowed the hotspots repeatedly, it does not seem desirable at this time to subsidize a small number of repeat users when those funds could be better utilized.
- 7. Friends of the Library: Used book sales have continued each Thursday from 10:00 to 3:30 p.m. The Friends had excellent sales figures in January and February.

- **8. Oconee County:** County employees have completed the study from Evergreen Solutions for a Wage, Compensation, and Time Use. We will not know the outcome until after the budget comes out and County Council begins their deliberations on that. As noted above, in the budget for this year and the next two successive years, I have asked for an increase for the part time pay through Staffmark to be increased to \$12 per hour.
- 9. State Library: The Director and other members of APLA, the Association of Library Administrators in South Carolina, attended the budget hearing of the House Ways and Means subcommittee on K-12 Education in January when Leesa Aiken, State Library agency head, presented her budget there. Bill Whitmire, representative for Oconee and Pickens Counties, is the chair of that subcommittee. APLA is asking for an increase of \$ 0.25 per capita in State Aid to Public Libraries. This would mean an additional \$19,652 in State Aid for Oconee County. The Ways and Means Full Committee adopted the request, and the House of Representative passed the State Library's budget in March. It will still have to go to the Senate of South Carolina and then once those bodies have worked out any differences, it still will need the Governor's assent. The State Library is planning a South Carolina Libraries Directors Summit in March. We have applied for the 2024 Summer Reading grant from the State Library. The maximum award is \$2,000. It comes from Federal LSTA (Library Services and Technology Act) funds.
- 10. Community Involvement: See Kerry Leeper Brock's report for information about her ongoing work with Catholic Charities for the Clean of Heart Mobile Shower unit that is being utilized currently at Our Daily Bread in Seneca every other Wednesday. The Walhalla and Westminster Branches also hosted a USC student to take a survey about the need for increased transportation to health care.
- 11. Other: See Angie Clark's report about our new Bookmobile stop at the mill and store in Newry.

- In the months of January/February, the Salem branch hosted ten programs.
- ❖ January's STEM club program saw the most attendance yet with nine children/adults. Children attending the program were able to take a mini wooden robot that they constructed home. February's session brought in eight children/adults.
- ❖ Page Turners, Salem's monthly virtual book club, had 2 attendees in January. The title discussed was <u>Ginny Moon</u> by Benjamin Ludwig. February's meeting had 3 attendees. The title discussed was <u>The One Hundred Years of Lenni and Margot</u> by Marianne Cronin.

- ❖ On February 1st, the student outreach services at Clemson University inquired about a community survey. Two senior nursing students interviewed the branch manager regarding how the library meets the community needs of Salem.
- In January, twelve craft kits (winter owl magnets) were given out. In February, the Salem branch distributed twelve Valentine's Day craft kits.

Building Maintenance

On January 17th, we were informed that our security alarm had a low battery. Carolina Burglar and Fire Alarm promptly sent a technician the next day to replace the battery. 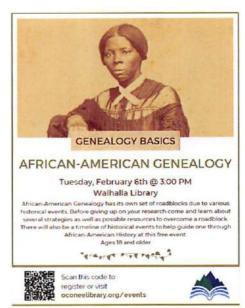
Narrative

Upcoming Digitization Project:

I have taken a break from digitizing the OCPL Scrapbooks, and have focused on an upcoming project with the Oconee History Museum. Together we accessed several local history books for digitization. These books are no longer in print and there is continued public interest in these specific books. I have obtained signed copyright permission from the selected authors, and I will begin the digitization process in April. During the OCPL Scrapbook digitization, I was able to work with Clemson University, and this partnership has now transitioned over to the University of South Carolina. When this project is completed, the digitized books will be available on the South Carolina Digital Library. At this time, I have not determined an official end date. After completing this priority project, I will resume digitizing the OCPL Scrapbooks.

Genealogy Basics: African-American Genealogy:

I have resumed the Genealogy Basics Class Series. This year I developed a new class that pertains to African-American Genealogy. In essence, African-American Genealogy contains multiple roadblocks that impede using traditional genealogy resources. This class discusses the roadblocks, why they exist, and possible ways to overcome these challenges. The first class was on Tuesday, February 6th and part of it aired on a Fox Carolina news broadcast. I did not contact Fox Carolina; instead, they contacted us and I agreed, with approval from the Library Director, to be interviewed. This broadcast has enabled one patron to share the legacy of her Great-Grandmother, who served as a midwife in Oconee County.



Outreach:

I am still taking advantage of opportunities to provide outreach within the community. However, I did not expect my first foray into community outreach would be through a Fox Carolina broadcast. The only statistics I have for that day are the patrons that attended the Genealogy Basics African-American Genealogy class, but I have been informed people in the community saw the broadcast.

On Tuesday, February 20th I gave a presentation to the Lilly McIlhaney Bowen Chapter of the National Society of the Daughter of the American Revolution. This presentation covered the resources in the Rogers Memorial Room, current projects, and a discussion on the importance of adding Women's History into the genealogy/local history collection. This organization provided an unexpected donation, and I used these funds to purchase several books for the Rogers Memorial Room.



The most unexpected presentation occurred on Wednesday, February 28th at Seneca High School. Jennifer Moss, Interim Director of the Oconee History Museum, was invited to speak at the First Annual Seneca High Black History Month Program. She in turn invited me to attend. Although, I had trouble with my presentation slides I was still able to deliver a short presentation on the Ann Rogers' Cemetery and Newspaper Indexes and discuss the life of Mrs. Endy Williams. She was a former slave that was born in the 1830s and died in Easley, SC in the 1940s. Mrs. Williams' life shows how personal stories are overlooked, but through concerted effort, her legacy shall live on.

I have added SC Room Presentations and SC Room Presentation Attendance to my statistics. Beginning with the March/April report, I will discontinue adding the ScanPro statistics. This is due to the unchanged status of the machines.

The study rooms remain popular, especially with tutors and Baby Read sessions.

Staffing: We hired a new full time employee in February. We are currently at full staff. I appreciate myself and the other employees taking on more Saturdays and closing days and desk shifts during periods of illness and short staffing.

In February, Imelda made a presentation about personal growth and self-improvement in Spanish to the community and had twenty people attend.

Community, Staff, and Programming

- January was all about snow at the Westminster Branch. The library hosted an indoor snowball fight
 with 20 adults and children. They had a great time playing around the library (after hours) throwing

- The library also hosted an all ages snowflake coloring contest. We had 12 total participants and gave grand prizes to the best out of the teens, children, and pre-school ages. The snowflakes were on display at the library through February 9th and everyone who participated received a prize. Our youngest winner, Emmerson, returned to the library with her grandparents to show off her work! This is exactly the kind of interactions we like to see when doing something like this.
- Tiffany pulled some great books to be included with the display that focused on snow and snowflakes.
- Through our Community Resource Associate, Kerry, the library hosted a blood drive in January. We had seven total able to give and one attempt.
- Social media has allowed great ways to connect with other library staff and share resources and programs. One of these programs is to host scavenger hunts in the library. We have kind of done this before with a Big Foot Scavenger Hunt many years ago, but had never thought about doing anything else. For February, we decided to do a Love Your Library Scavenger Hunt where participants of all ages could search through the library for hidden hearts. Each heart had a number and letter on it that corresponded with a riddle. They had to find the answer to, "What did one book say to the other?" The answer, "I've been checking you out." We have had great success with this and will be repeating it through the year as a great way to encage users and offer a program that involves little preparation and flexibility. We had 46 participants.
- Our February snowball fight did not have quite the turnout as our January event with only 10 in attendance.
- We had five attendees for the Book Journaling for Beginners program held in February.
- Quientell presented Genealogy Basics and had 3 people attend.
- We have welcomed a new volunteer named Cindy. She is working on volunteer hours for her Master Gardener class. She will be helping us out with packaging seed envelopes for the BBW Seed Library. So far she has spent 26 hours packaging seeds for us.

Building Management

• The fire marshal came and did our yearly inspection on February 9. We had two issues with the batteries in the exit signs. Maintenance was contacted and they promptly replace the batteries.

Resource Allocation

- Due to the popularity of the Reminisce Kits at Seneca with the Dementia Support Group, half of the collection has been moved from the Westminster Library and will have a permanent spot at the Seneca Library. These items are still able to be requested to pick up at any location.
- The original memorial funds have been depleted which is amazing that they lasted for three years. This year we have used some of Westminster's Friends "Wish List" money and gift funds Westminster receives from Schneider Electric's employee program. We were lucky to receive many seed donations for this year and have only had to purchase a few seeds, mostly flowers (which are extremely popular). The biggest cost are the envelopes that are purchased to package the seeds in. A few more displays were purchased which have come in handy since we have even more seeds to offer this year.

Westminster staff Tiffany, Megan, and Patsy have done an AMAZING job of sorting, counting, cutting labels, and packaging all of the seeds that will be available this spring. They packaged over 8,000 packs! Over 1,700 of these packs have been delivered to the Oconee History Museum. All other library locations have pop-up libraries scheduled in March and April. We are excited to see what this new year holds for the Betty. B. Watkins Seed Library. The new season launches March 1.

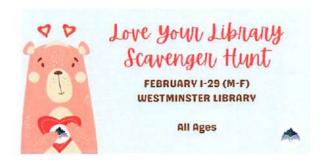

Updates to the Children's and Teen's areas of the Walhalla Branch

Our physical spaces for children and teens at the Walhalla Branch were in need of some updating. I know Darcy had begun that process but wasn't able to finish before her time with OCPL was up. The Children's area was in need of new tables and seating, as well as more storage for our board book collection. Taking inspiration from the landscape of Oconee County, we purchased furniture with a woodland theme resembling logs and other outdoor features. We also added vinyl tree decals to the walls to continue the theme. I encourage you to stop by the library to see the updates for yourself, but I have also added some photos below.

The Teen area also got a facelift. A great desk area had been installed in the Teen alcove, so we added a sign, shelf, desk lamps, and some decorations to help make the area cozier for teens as they use the space for homework, studying, reading, etc. I have also added some photos of the teen area below. Keep in mind that this area especially is still a work in progress, and we hope to add some art supplies, card games, and more ways for teens to express their creativity and ownership of the space.

Summer Reading 2024

It seems like summer is still a long way away, but in the library world we're always thinking about and planning for summer reading. The Youth Services staff is very busy planning for this year's summer reading, featuring the tagline, "Adventure Begins at Your Library," and highlighting pirate-themed materials. Like in previous years, participants will be required to read 600 minutes to complete the program and will be rewarded with prizes like Greenville Drive tickets, free food vouchers, medals, and more! I have added a mock-up of this year's postcard to this report so you can see what this year's materials will look like.

We will also be hosting performances again at the Walhalla Performing Arts Center. This year our performers will be the Critter Keeper and Science Heroes. We have also been in discussions with the Blue Ridge Community Center in Seneca to host two additional performances at their location and hope to have that finalized soon. We will also be continuing with programs throughout the summer featuring the Summer Reading Kick-Off event at High Falls, the End of Summer Bash at South Cove, escape rooms, crafts, and much more!

Programs

After taking November and December to settle into our new roles, Shannon and I jumped into more regular programming in January and February. We continued doing Storytime at Walhalla and Seneca and added back our Storytime in Westminster every Wednesday morning. We were also able to add back Explorer's Club every month at Walhalla and Seneca, where participants take part in a STEM learning challenge; January's program featured an Arctic Adventure where kids learned about the polar ice caps, the effects of global warming, and how arctic animals stay warm. In February, we celebrated Heart Health Month by learning about the structures of the human heart, what a heart rate is and how to take it, and how blood pressure works. In our Homeschool Hangout program that happens each month at Walhalla, we featured a guided painting class and embroidery for beginners.

We also had tons of fun at our monthly LEGO Clubs at Walhalla and Seneca, as well as our Sensory Bin playtime at Walhalla.

The Youth Services department has also been doing programs for Teens and Tweens again, but we're having some trouble getting the word out to local teens. Our attendance has been very low. Teens are a historically difficult group to reach for libraries, but we're hoping continuity and excitement over summer reading will help bring more teens and tweens into the library and to programs.

Community Outreach

The Youth Services department has continued with our outreach to local Childcare facilities including: Tamassee DAR, Trinity Baptist Preschool, Golden Corner Preschool, and The Learning Center at Open Door Baptist Church. We also attend the Bookmobile's visit to Golden Corner Preschool two times a month to assist.

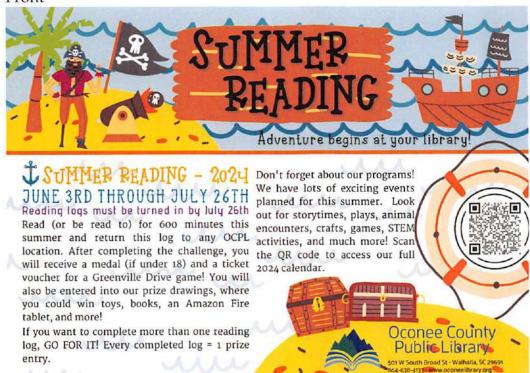

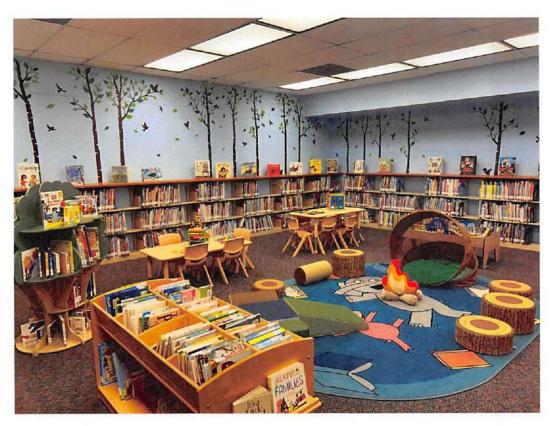

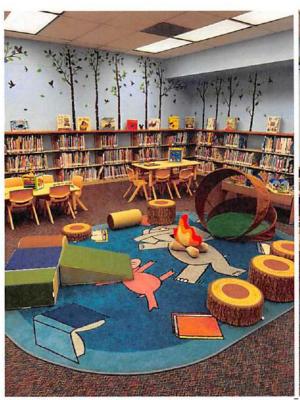
