**MINUTES, OCONEE COUNTY COUNCIL MEETING**

The regular meeting of the Oconee County Council was held Tuesday, June 6, 1995, at 7:00 pm in Council Chambers with all Council Members except Ms. Burrell present. Mr. Cain, County Attorney, was also present.

The meeting was called to order by Supervisor -Chairman Crain who welcomed the guests and media.

Mr. Hamilton made a motion, seconded by Mr. Strickland, approved 4 - 0 (Ms. Burrell absent) that the minutes of the regular meeting held May 16, 1995 be adopted as printed.

Mr. Orr made a motion, seconded by Mr. Williams, approved 4 - 0 (Ms. Burrell absent) that the minutes of the special meeting held May 10, 1995 be adopted as printed.

Upon recommendation of Ms. Dillard, Purchasing Agent, Mr. Orr made a motion, seconded by Mr. Strickland, approved 4 - 0 (Ms. Burrell absent) that the contract with Carolina Benefit Administrators, Inc. be renewed at cost of \$1,018,780 to include a Blue Cross/Blue Shield Network which is estimated to save the county approximately ten percent (10%) in costs for the same coverage the employees currently have. After presentation by Mr. Crain, Mr. Strickland made a motion, seconded by Mr. Orr that Ordinance 95-6, "1995-96 Oconee County Budget Ordinance" be adopted on second reading.

Ord. 95-6

This budget ordinance includes the Classification & Compensation Study conducted by the South Carolina Appalachian Council of Governments, approximately \$3,200,000 for a Health/Science Building at Tri-County Technical College and \$25,911,921 for school operational purposes.

Oconee County's portion of funding for the Health/Science Building at Tri County Technical College is delineated in section 24 of Ordinance 95-6.

Mr. Fred Hamilton, School Board Chairman, and Mr. Buddy G. Herring, Interim School Superintendent, addressed Council requesting that the budget request of the School District be fully funded.

Mr. Hamilton made a motion that the ordinance be amended to include an additional \$1,357,000 for the School District, however, this motion died for lack of a second.

At the request of Mr. Tommy Crumpton, Rock Crusher Director, Mr. Orr made a motion, seconded by Mr. Strickland that the ordinance be amended to change the titles of the Rock Crusher employees back to what they were before the study was completed.

Mr. Strickland made a motion, seconded by Mr. Williams, approved 3 - 1 (Mr. Orr voting against, Ms. Burrell absent) that the amendment be amended to include that the COG representative go out and see the rock crusher in operation and the salaries not be changed until this is done.

The motion as amended was then adopted 4 - 0 (Ms. Burrell absent).

Ordinance 95-6 was then adopted 3 - 1 (Mr. Hamilton voting against, Ms. Burrell absent).

Mr. Crain briefed Council regarding Resolution 95-13, "A Resolution By the Anderson-Oconee-Pickens Technical Education And Training Commission Declaring Its Intent With Respect To The Financing Of A New Health/Science Laboratory Building At Tri County Technical College And With Respect To Future Student Fee Adjustments In Connection Therewith". (See attached)

Mr. Cain, County Attorney, also briefed Council regarding the attached opinion from Sinkler & Boyd, P.A. being a reason opinion, not an absolute opinion regarding the funding of the Health/Science Building. (See attached)

Mr. Strickland made a motion, seconded by Mr. Orr, approved 4 - 0 (Ms. Burrell absent) that JTPA Workers for various county departments be approved. (See attachment)

Mr. Orr made a motion, seconded by Mr. Strickland, approved 4 - 0 (Ms. Burrell absent) that the attached Overall Economic Development Plan as prepared by the South Carolina Appalachian Council of Governments be adopted.

Upon recommendation of Mr. Crain, County Supervisor, & Ms. Marianne Dillard, Purchasing Agent, Mr. Strickland made a motion, seconded by Mr. Orr, approved 4 - 0 (Ms. Burrell absent) that the bid for a copying machine for the Public Service Building be awarded to Kerns Corporation at a total cost of \$19,629.75 with an annual maintenance cost of \$1,750. 

Subject: Heavy Equipment Usage in Oconee County

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In trying to gather as much information as possible concerning heavy equipment usage in the Rock Crusher department, I have spoken to Scott Forrester and John Spires of Blanchard Machinery. This company has sold heavy equipment to the County for use in the Rock Crusher, Roads and Bridges, and Solid Waste departments.

Both gentlemen stated that the equipment itself does not dictate the level of difficulty in equipment operation. Whether an employee is operating a loader, a shovel, a backhoe, a grader, or a dozer, the equipment does not determine the expertise necessary for operation. Rather, it is the work which is being performed with the equipment which will determine the County's need for experienced operators. It is my belief that the County's need for experienced operators is uniform between the Roads and Bridges, Rock Crusher and Solid Waste departments and that one department's equipment is not necessarily harder to operate than another's equipment. They are simply used for different purposes.

*Tommy quoted*  
Mr. Spires stated that in his opinion, big contractors across the state paid the same rate for the above equipment. Differences occurred when employees performed major repair and maintenance on equipment. He mentioned that an employee who is "self-contained," or able to operate and service equipment, is worth more to an organization than an employee whose only function is to operate the equipment.

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I have reviewed the situation within the Rock Crusher department, due to the appeals which were made to County Council on May 31, 1995 and after speaking with you in the telephone on June 1, 1995.

I do understand that there are different goals and objectives for the Roads and Bridges, Rock Crusher, and Solid Waste departments in Oconee County. I also believe that all three departments serve the needs of the County, which serves the citizens. My primary concern is to address the needs of the County by classifying similar positions in different departments similarly.

In keeping with this goal, I have classified three positions within the department as Equipment Operator IV. There were previously seven Operator IV positions. I understand that cranes are being used as well as the crusher and the drop ball. I also understand that you have cross-trained employees so that employees can be rotated on different pieces of equipment. It is my belief, however, that the department should have designated positions for the heaviest equipment. This designation in no way prohibits you, as the supervisor, to assign employees to different tasks.

Many employees within the County are called upon by their supervisors to perform work which is not specifically in the job descriptions for that position. Based upon the immediate needs of the County, an employee may be temporarily assigned certain duties to allow for efficient and smooth operations. Simply because an employee can or may occasionally perform certain duties does not require compensation above and beyond what the normal and typical duties are.

Similarly, I have classified four positions as Equipment Operator III; there were previously three positions. I have classified two positions as Equipment Operator II. There were previously no Operator II positions.

I understand your concern regarding the emotional impact on employees when titles are changed. I do not intend nor did I ever intend this classification as a "slight" to anyone within your department. I believe, based upon the equipment usage, that these positions were misclassified before I

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began this study. I am simply trying to rectify what I perceived as inequity within the County's classification system.

I am forwarding this information to Mr. Crain and the County Council. I believe that the County Council is the proper authority to make any changes to the classification plan which I have presented.

This is in response to the COG classification of positions at the Rock Crusher and the reasons for the reclassification. There are no similar positions in any other county department. While it is true that we operate heavy equipment like some other departments, the equipment we operate is not in comparison to theirs. All of our machines are considerably larger than those that are found in any other department. In addition, the environment we operate on a daily basis is far more hazardous and dangerous than other departments because of working on high walls, ledges and steep inclines.

Also, in response to designated positions for the heaviest equipment, we do not have small pieces of equipment. All of our machines are larger than those in other departments.

We appreciate Britt Franks hard work in appraising our positions, but do not feel that without seeing our operation firsthand, that she can do justice in this area.

We stand firm on our appeals and invite each of you to come and see for yourself, the difference in our operation in comparison to other county operations.

We request that the three (3) Operator III positions be returned to Operator IV and the two (2) Operator II positions be returned to Operator III. According to COG, the County Council is the proper authority to make any changes to the classification plan.

Thank you for your continued support and we look forward to working close with you in the future.

In trying to gather as much information as possible concerning heavy equipment usage in the Rock Crusher department, I have spoken to Scott Forrester and John Spires of Blanchard Machinery. This company has sold heavy equipment to the County for use in the Rock Crusher, Roads and Bridges, and Solid Waste departments.

Both gentlemen stated that the equipment itself does not dictate the level of difficulty in equipment operation. Whether an employee is operating a loader, a shovel, a backhoe, a grader, or a dozer, the equipment does not determine the expertise necessary for operation. Rather, it is the work which is being performed with the equipment which will determine the County's need for experienced operators. It is my belief that the County's need for experienced operators is uniform between the Roads and Bridges, Rock Crusher and Solid Waste departments and that one department's equipment is not necessarily harder to operate than another's equipment. They are simply used for different purposes.

Mr. Spires stated that in his opinion, big contractors across the state paid the same rate for the above equipment. Differences occurred when employees performed major repair and maintenance on equipment. He mentioned that an employee who is "self-contained," or able to operate and service equipment, is worth more to an organization than an employee whose only function is to operate the equipment.

## A RESOLUTION 95-13

BY THE ANDERSON-OCONEE-PICKENS TECHNICAL EDUCATION AND TRAINING COMMISSION DECLARING ITS INTENT WITH RESPECT TO THE FINANCING OF A NEW HEALTH/SCIENCE LABORATORY BUILDING AT TRI-COUNTY TECHNICAL COLLEGE AND WITH RESPECT TO FUTURE STUDENT FEE ADJUSTMENTS IN CONNECTION THEREWITH.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE ANDERSON-OCONEE-PICKENS TECHNICAL EDUCATION AND TRAINING COMMISSION, IN MEETING DULY ASSEMBLED:

ARTICLE IFINDINGS OF FACT

As an incident to the commitment of this Resolution, the Anderson-Oconee-Pickens Technical Education and Training Commission (the "Commission"), the governing body of the Anderson-Oconee-Pickens Education and Training District and the Tri-County Technical College, (the "College") has made the following findings:

1. The College is in need of a new health/science laboratory building (the "Project").
2. The total cost of constructing and equipping the Project is estimated to be \$11,750,000 (the "Cost").
3. Pursuant to Section 59-58-250 of the Code of Laws of South Carolina 1976, as amended, the Cost of the Project is to be borne by Anderson County (50%), Oconee County (25%) and Pickens County (25%).

4. Oconee County intends to fund, in full, its portion of the Cost with a one-time cash contribution to the initial construction funds in the amount of \$3,125,000, such contribution to be derived from proceeds of general obligation bonds of Oconee County.

5. Such contribution of \$3,125,000 by Oconee County represents in full the responsibility of Oconee County with respect to the Project.

6. Anderson County and Pickens County intend to defray their portions of the Cost by initial cash contributions to the construction funds in the amounts of \$588,500 and \$291,500 respectively, and to defray the remainder of their share of the cost by annual contributions in the same respective amounts for an additional fourteen years, such amounts being calculated as the amount necessary to defray debt service on proposed State Institution Bonds to be issued by the State of South Carolina on behalf of the College in the principal amount of \$7,750,000.

7. Such annual contributions from Anderson County and Pickens County will permit the student fee imposed for operating costs on all students enrolled at the College to be decreased in an amount that will offset the corresponding increase in the tuition fee necessitated for actual payment of debt service on the State Institution Bonds, a decrease which is justified in the case of any student whose primary place of residence is in Oconee County by the fact that no part of the State Institution Bonds was necessitated by Oconee County's share of the Cost of the Project.



ARTICLE II

INTENT AND COMMITMENT OF COMMISSION

In the event that either Anderson County or Pickens County or both fail in any year to make the intended cash contribution to the College described in Article I, paragraph 6 above, it is the intent and commitment of the Commission, consistent with and to the extent allowed by State law, not to impose any offsetting operating student fee increases that may be necessitated thereby on any student whose primary place of residence is in Oconee County. The Commission commits to use its best efforts to avoid any such operating student fee increase on such students whose primary residence is in Oconee County, and will further use its best efforts to implement and have approved by any State agency, including but not limited to the State Board for Technical and Comprehensive Education (the "State Board"), schedules of fees and charges upon those enrolled in the College that would prevent the burden of any such failure to make an annual contribution by either Anderson County or Pickens County from falling on students at the College whose primary residence is in Oconee County, due to the fact that Oconee County will have fully funded its share of the Costs of the Project.

**Re: Proposed Funding for Health/Science Lab Building**

Dear Ms. McKinney:

You have requested our opinion with respect to the valid, binding and enforceable nature of an undertaking by the Anderson-Oconee-Pickens Technical Education and Training Commission (the "Commission") with respect to the financing of a new health/science laboratory at Tri-County Technical College (the "College") and with respect to future student fee adjustments in connection therewith. It is our understanding that this undertaking is embodied in a resolution to be adopted by the Commission, a copy of which resolution is attached hereto and incorporated herein.

We have examined the attached resolution; Articles 1, 2 and 3 of Title 59, Chapter 53 of the South Carolina Code of Laws of 1978, as amended (the "Code"); Chapter 107 of Title 59 of the Code; Chapter 112 of Title 59 of the Code; State Board for Technical and Comprehensive Education ("State Board") Statement of Policy No. 7-2-101; and State Board Procedure No. 7-2-101.1. In addition, we have searched for case law from the appellate courts of South Carolina and opinions of the Office of the State Attorney General, and have found none relevant to the matter in question.

The statutory and administrative provisions cited generally give the Commission discretion in setting fees. Section 59-107-20 of the Code, requiring the imposition of tuition fees for debt service on State Institution Bonds, explicitly does not "requir[e] uniformity of tuition fees at such state institutions." Such tuition fees are subject to approval by the South

Carolina State Budget and Control Board, which has not yet approved the issuance of the State Institution Bonds.

Procedure No. 7-2-101.1(I)(E) permits an additional out-of-county instructional fee to be imposed on students from non-supporting counties, in an amount up to 100% of the sum of the base instructional fee and the activities fee. The base instructional fee must be between \$150 and \$500; no limit is set for the activity fee. In addition, Procedure No. 7-2-101.1(II) authorizes a Plant Fee to be established annually with the approval of the State Board to make up any deficit in county allocations and operating costs; it does not, however, specify that such Plant Fee may be imposed disparately on students from different counties.

Only Chapter 107 of Title 59, relating to State Institution Bonds, specifically contemplates a prior commitment to impose fees in a certain manner; it requires a commitment to impose tuition fees sufficient to pay debt service on State Institution Bonds.

Based on the statute law and administrative pronouncements in existence on the date hereof, we are of the opinion that the Commission has the authority to agree to the undertaking set forth in Article II of the attached resolution and that such undertaking constitutes the valid, binding and enforceable obligation of the Commission; subject, however, to its responsibility under the statutes and administrative procedures and under the anticipated State Institution Bond resolution to impose fees and charges sufficient to pay debt service on the "Bonds" (as defined in the attached resolution) and to pay the costs of operating and maintaining the College to the extent that other funds are not available therefor. You should note that the ability of the Commission in the future to comply with the undertaking set forth in the attached resolution and to comply with its responsibilities described in the last clause of the foregoing sentence will be dependent upon, among other things, the number of students in attendance at the College from each county, and the minimum and maximum levels of instructional fees established by the State Board pursuant to Section 59-53-50(5) of the Code, State Board Policy No. 7-2-101, and State Board Procedure No. 7-2-101.1, as each may be amended from time to time hereafter.

This opinion is for the use and reliance of the addressee only and is not directed to or to be delivered to or relied upon by any other party. This opinion expresses the professional judgment of this firm as to the legal issue explicitly addressed herein. This firm cannot insure or guarantee, and by the giving of this opinion, this firm does not insure or guarantee, that expression of professional judgment, the transaction opined upon, the future performance of parties to such transaction, or the outcome of any future dispute or litigation with regard to the matter addressed herein.

We are not counsel to the Commission. Our involvement in this matter is limited to our role as bond counsel to the State of South Carolina for this and the next fiscal year. Because we do not have day-to-day familiarity with the statutes, policies and procedures regarding the state technical colleges, but are instead engaged for this matter only to provide an opinion with respect to the validity of the Bonds themselves pursuant to the State's

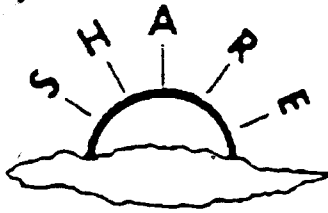

## SUMMARY

### ORGANIZATION AND MANAGEMENT

The S. C. Appalachian Council of Governments' Board of Directors acts as the official Overall Economic Development Plan (OEDP) Policy Committee, and approves the draft OEDP prior to submission of the document to the Economic Development Administration. A broad-based task force was established by the Board to oversee the planning process (see Appendix 8, Overview - Appalachian Regional Development Partnership, Volume II of the OEDP) and plan development. Facilitation of the planning process and plan development were largely carried out by Council of Governments' staff members. Monitoring, evaluating, and reporting on the progress of the program and its results will be the joint responsibility of the Council of Governments' staff and the OEDP task force.

### THE AREA AND ITS ECONOMY

This fast-growing region of 888,057 population contains the state's largest Metropolitan Statistical Area (MSA), encompassing all but Oconee County. The region has numerous locational advantages and a wealth of natural resources which lend themselves to future development.

Environmental issues have grown increasingly more important within the region as continued development occurs. Major areas of continuing concern include water, wastewater collection and treatment, and solid waste management and disposal. The Council of Governments works with the economic development community, regulatory agencies, and other environmentally sensitive groups to ensure a proper balance between economic development and environmental conservation.

The region's economy has diversified rapidly over the past 10-15 years, changing from a textile-based manufacturing economy to a services oriented economic base. The largest single factor expected to influence the area's economy in the near future is the recent decision by BMW to locate a \$625 million automobile manufacturing facility in Spartanburg County, adjacent to the Greenville-Spartanburg Airport. The plant will initially employ 2,000 workers, and another 2,000 jobs are expected to be created in spin-off industries.

While much of the region's infrastructure, such as highways, airports, and educational facilities, are in relatively good shape and can be considered as strengths which can be used to reinforce the region's economic potential, there are certain weaknesses in the total infrastructural system. Fragmentation of service delivery systems, a widespread inability of local sewer service providers to provide adequate service to sustain economic growth potential, new requirements and regulations on water,

wastewater, and solid waste management provider agencies, and diminishing financial resources at the federal and state levels have combined to make addressing infrastructure needs even more difficult.

The Council of Governments continues to work with the region's local governments and the economic development community to help identify and secure sources of financing to make infrastructure improvements, and to identify and plan for regional facilities and services wherever possible, to address needs and opportunities that cross local political boundaries.

### GOALS AND OBJECTIVES

The area's development goals, objectives, and priorities were selected as the result of a cooperative and highly participatory process involving literally hundreds of local government, business, and community leaders. The goals fall into five major categories, including infrastructure, industrial development and recruitment, planning, improving local government, and quality of life. For this summary, the area development goals and objectives are presented together, in order to be more easily related to each other. The goals, listed in priority order, as follows:

#### I. Infrastructure:

##### Sewer:

##### Goal:

Assure the provision of adequate sewer facilities to serve existing and potential residential and industrial areas with high growth and development probability.

##### Objectives:

Plan and construct wastewater facilities to serve key industrial sites in the region.

Establish practical wastewater planning based on drainage basins, emphasizing multi-county involvement to reduce the effects of fragmentation.

Empower county governments or major special purpose districts to operate, finance, designate providers, and coordinate regional wastewater service based on needs within drainage basins.

Regionalize, modernize, and consolidate wastewater facilities wherever possible, to compensate for small stream sizes and improve the efficiency of treatment so that stringent limits may be met.

Water:

Goal:

Establish both the planning for and provision of adequate, long-term supplies of safe, clean water to the citizens and industries of the region.

Objectives:

Provide water service to key industrial sites in the region.

Empower county governments, private utilities, or major special purpose districts to operate, finance, and coordinate water transportation service in the region to reduce the effects of fragmentation.

Plan and construct water transportation systems and linkages with existing providers to satisfy long-term demands (30-50 years).

Assure that surface water is the primary source of all potable water in all water systems in the region.

Roads and Other Transportation:

Goal:

Ensure the adequacy and completeness of transportation planning and facilities for economic development in the region.

Objective:

Ensure that key economic development leaders in the region are involved in state highway planning.

Support the widening of I-85 through all of South Carolina, and develop regional strategies for improving the appearance of the I-85 corridor.

Enhance and take advantage of the economic development benefits that come from the region's airports.

Landfills:

Goal:

Establish regional strategies for meeting federal and state requirements for solid waste management and disposal.

Objectives:

Establish a regional landfill and solid waste research facility at Clemson University, in cooperation with Oconee, Pickens, and Anderson Counties.

Establish regional recycling programs to meet the requirements of the law and take advantage of economies of scale.

II. Industrial Development and Recruitment:

Goal:

The Appalachian region of South Carolina wants, needs, and will seek high quality, environmentally sound growth from new and existing business and industry, both domestic and international.

Objectives:

Each county in the region will have a full-time economic development professional, with adequate support staff and budget.

Each county in the region will have an adequate, up-to-date inventory of its key existing and potential industrial sites.

Develop a regional site inventory.

Each county in the region will closely involve economic development leaders and professionals in planning decisions affecting infrastructure development, so that best use may be made of these costly but essential resources.

III. Planning:

Goal:

Assure that each county in the region has a mechanism in place for continuing participatory






